Bus Drivers' Strike Causes Serious Blockade-Miners Ordered To Strike

LONDON, May 1: (CP)-Great Britain, with its capital in the grip of a vast surface transportation strike, faces the prospect today of more than half a million coal miners leaving work in three weeks.

With the Coronation less than two weeks off and the city overflowing with visitors, London buses did not stir out of their garages today. Drivers and conductors, numbering 25,0000, began to strike at midnight last night with a view to obtaining shorter hours and a slowing up of what they describe as "killing" sche-

The city's traffic snarl is duplicated in practically all of South England where more than 100,000 drivers and conductors went on strike.

A coal strike has been ordered by delegates of the Mine Workers' Federation. It will be effective May 22 unless a settlement is reached in the Federation demand for complete recognition in the Nottinghamshire area.

Japan Persists

A Canadian Press dispatch to the Daily News yesterday intimated that the Japanese intend to pursue their surveys of international fishing waters off the North American continent, more particularly Alaska and British Columbia. The ultimate intention, of course, is to in- O.B.E. stitute fishing therein, probably on a mass scale. Fearing that the results of years of careful and self-sacrificing conservation of the salmon and halibut fisheries in these waters may be undone with a brief period of intensive fishing by the Japanese, who have already depleted their own waters and to considerable extent those of Russia, Canadian and American fishing authorities have already protested against the threatened Japanese incursion. This, apparently, has had no effect upon the Japanese. In any case, they announce officially that they are going ahead with their surveys.

If diplomatic reasoning proves unavailing, then some other method of heading off the threatened invasion of Howard Forrester. North American continental waters will have to be found. It would be regrettable if economic reprisals would have to be resorted to. They seldom, if ever, accomplish anything in the long run.

Meantime, about the only thing for our authorities to do is to continue to endeavor to make the Japanese see the justice and reason of our claim to exclusive rights to the fisheries which we have so assiduously endeavored to build up and maintain. 
