Woodstock and London Area Hard Hit-Five Are Dead-Thousands Leave Homes

WOODSTOCK, Ont., April 27:-Serious floods, resulting in the deaths of at least five persons, have occurred in the Woodstock and London area of Ontario.

Two were killed when a train struck a wash-out near Woodstock, the track having been undermined by high water.

A doctor lost his life by drowning when his car crashed through a weakened bridge. Six thousand people in the vi-

cinity of London have evacuated their homes. Only the tops of many houses in West London could be seen.

There have been torrential rains in this district and elsewhere in Ontario during the last few days.

RECEDING TODAY The swollen Western Ontario rivers and streams were slowly receding today as the flood grip "radually lessened. The people of the harassed London district were breathing easier as the Thames River began to drop.

Acquisition of Yukon Would Make B. C. Nearly Largest of Nine

VICTORIA, April 27:- The addition of Yukon Territory to British Columbia, acquisition of which by this province has been agreed upon subject of assent by the British Columbia Legislature and federal Parliament, would add a population of 4,230, according to the last census, to British Columbia and, with Yukon's area of 207,076 square miles, would make the size of British Columbia 573,331 square miles, second in extent only to Quebec which has 594,534 square

Acquisition of Yukon would not add to British Columbia's net financial responsibilities, it is stated here. All administration buildings in the territory would, under the agreement, be taken over by the province without charge.

In announcing the prospect of British Columbia pushing its frontiers to the Arctic Ocean, Premier T. D. Pattullo stated yesterday that he believed the acquisition would find response from the youth of the province. The Yukon would come to the province without debt and, for the first five years, the federal government would pay the province \$125,000 a year as a special grant.

The Auditor-General's report last year showed the territory's cost to the Dominion was \$96,902.

The Political Situation

Reviewing the provincial election situation from a political standpoint in its news columns, the Prince George Citizen, which usually takes an independent and impartial stand, says that "Had Premier Pattullo been made generalissimo of all the conflicting forces in British Columbia he could hardly have arranged matters more to his liking than the form they are now taking."

The real test of a political platform is the calibre of the men who advance it. 
