Roosevelt Puts Emperor On Spot

Hangchow Next Objective Personal Apology Is Demanded

Conquest Of Nanking Appears Complete; To Move On Seaport

Provisional Government For All China Set up by Japanese With Headquarters at Peiping—Will fight Chiang Kai Shek and Communism

SHANGHAI, Dec. 14: (CP)—With the Rising Sun flag of Japan fluttering on each corner of Nanking's walls and within the ancient stone battlements of the abandoned capital of the Chinese government which is reported in flames, Chinese sources today reported that Hangchow, seaport about one hundred miles south of Shanghai, would be the objective of the next major Japanese campaign.

A new provisional government for all China, under the aegis of conquering Nippon, has been formed at Peiping. The guiding principles of the new regime, as reported by Domei, Japanese news agency, are vigorous opposition to the harassed government of General Chiang Kai Shek, suppression of communism and co-operation with Japan and Manchoukuo.

Meagre reports from Nanking say that several Chinese detachments have been trapped within the city but are continuing the virtually suicidal struggle with the Japanese in street fighting while clouds of smoke shroud the city.

Although the Japanese invaders have been making further headway in Nanking, the Chinese bitterly dispute that they have completed the capture of the entire city. "Suicide troops," it is claimed, have not only been holding certain sections of the ancient capital but have actually caused the Japanese to retreat at some points. The capture of nearby Fukow by the Japanese is denied.

Gratitude Of Saskatchewan

Appreciation of Relief Sent From Here to Drought Sufferers

The following is a copy of a letter from Dr. J. W. Hedley, chairman of the Saskatchewan Voluntary Rural Relief Committee, sent to Rev. J. C. Jackson, Secretary-Treasurer of the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association:

"Saskatchewan is very grateful to you and your people for the assistance rendered in alleviating the suffering of the residents of our drought stricken areas. While our people have suffered at the hands of nature, they have much to be thankful for, particularly this year as many of them are provided for better than they have been for some years. We sincerely trust that this may be the last year outside assistance is required.

"Could we extend to you and through you to everyone concerned a very heartfelt message of thanks for the assistance rendered and the time spent on behalf of our people?"

"Now that the moving of fruit and vegetables is about at an end, we are concentrating on the clothing problem, particularly for school children. Consequently some of our letters of appreciation are a little late in reaching those concerned but let us assure you it is not because of lack of appreciation."

Defense Program Is Revised; Concentrating On This Coast, Particularly On Vancouver

TORONTO, Dec. 14: (CP)—Speaking here last night, Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defense, announced that Canada's fortification program on Pacific and Atlantic coasts had been completely revised and was now being concentrated on the Pacific Coast. The aim, the minister said, was to provide adequate armaments, not for aggression but for national security and the preservation of neutrality.

Capt. Mackenzie said: "In accordance with announced government policy, we are paying particular attention to coast defenses. At present, we are concentrating expenditures on the Pacific Coast for strategic reasons you will all appreciate.

"New armaments have been ordered and construction of new fortifications at Esquimalt, Vancouver and Yorke Island (in the entrance to Sunderland Channel, Johnstone Straits) is actually under way. It is hoped that funds may be available to enlarge this program and place orders for further equipment next year.

"The most important factor of coastal defense is an adequate Air Force with a threefold aim—co-operation with the militia in air observation for fixed gun defenses, co-operation with the navy in protection of seaborne trade and neutrality and defense against air attack.

"A survey has just been completed of the whole Pacific Coast and, as a result, suitable bases to meet both peace and wartime requirements have been located and certain properties are being procured to be used as advanced operational bases."

VISITED BY FIRE

Blaze in Gordon's Hardware Caught in Nick of Time—Some Damage Is Done

Fire of undetermined origin did some damage shortly after 7 o'clock this morning around a staircase in the rear of Gordon's Hardware on McBride Street. The premises were also smoked up rather badly and some of the stock was affected from that cause. A good deal of cleaning up will be required.

It is believed that, whatever the cause, the fire must have been smouldering for some time. There had been no one in the store since last night, as far as is known. The heating plant is not believed to have been the cause. Nor was it in a position where electrical wiring would have been likely to have started it.

The alarm was turned in by Capt. Harry Calderwood while on his way to the Digby Island ferryboat Catherine B. He noticed the smouldering. Had the fire been detected much later, there would, undoubtedly, have been a much more serious conflagration. There is insurance.

PLANT HAS BEEN BUSY

So far seventeen shipments of ore have been treated through the local smelter.

Within the past two months since the local ore sampling plant opened seventeen shipments have been made to it and very soon the first shipment will be made to the smelter. Three of these shipments have been made by water and the others from the interior. This is considered satisfactory to start with as the work should gradually develop as time goes on.

The shipments have varied in size from ten tons down to less than one hundred pounds, a number having been good sized shipments.

PREMIER KING'S BIRTHDAY

OTTAWA — Premier William Lyon Mackenzie King is expected to return to Ottawa this week from his two weeks' holiday trip to Florida. There is no definite time for his return but it is expected it will be before his sixty-fourth birthday on Friday.

BULLETINS

YOUNG WOMAN MURDERED VANCOUVER—The body of 25-year old Mrs. Althea Mason was found early today on the East End Viaduct and police say she might have been thrown from a speeding automobile. It was at first believed she had been the victim of a hit and run driver but further investigation led to the belief she may have been killed previously. Her head was battered and her leg broken.

EASY WIN FOR MAX NEW YORK—Max Schmeling signaled his return to the fight wars last night for the first time since he knocked out Joe Louis in the summer of 1936 by systematically cutting down Harry Thomas, Chicago lightweight, in the eighth of a scheduled fifteen round bout before a crowd of fifteen thousand fans in Madison Square Garden. Schmeling, who hails from Eagle Bend, Minnesota, for six rounds and then dumped him with right which left the westerner bewildered. Referee Arthur Donovan then awarded a technical knock-out. Prior to that Thomas had gone to the canvas seven times. Schmeling, who got for two percent of the gate leaves tomorrow night by the Europa on his return to Germany.

WAS AFIRE AT SEA VICTORIA — The Japanese freighter Shunsho Maru docked here today and H. A. Barnett, mariner surveyor, said that fire was smouldering at the bottom of 130 tons of Formosa coal in her bunkers. He recommended that the coal and another 550 tons of other fuel be removed to permit the fire being extinguished. The Shunsho Maru, which had loaded pulp at Port Alice, was two days out when the fire was discovered and Capt. T. Ota decided to return to British Columbia. A salvage boat had been sent out to meet her in case she needed assistance.

ARMY OFFICER DIES VICTORIA—Sir John Charles Radcliffe K.C.M.G., retired British Army officer, died here yesterday. He had lived here in retirement since 1921.

DOBBIN FORCED VICTORIA — Adverse weather forced Pilot Ted Dobbin back here yesterday after he had left for Kyoquot on the west coast of Vancouver Island with a doctor to attend a seriously ill patient.

HART TO OTTAWA VICTORIA — Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, will leave for Ottawa about the end of January for conferences prior to the presentation of British Columbia's case to the Rowell Commission on Federal-provincial relations.

STORM IN OLD LAND GLASGOW—Scotland and Northern England are virtually smothered by the worst snow-storm in years. A fifty-mile gale in the English Channel caused the French liner Normandie to snap her anchor chain and she had a close call from going aground.

Insists on Full Indemnity, Punishment of Those Responsible and Insurance Against Further Incidents—American and Italian are Killed

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 14: (CP) — President Franklin D. Roosevelt has demanded a personal apology and full satisfaction from Emperor Hirohito of Japan for the bombing and sinking of the American gunboat Panay in the Yangste River. The demand has been transmitted through Hiroshi Saito, Japanese ambassador to the United States. It was delivered in Tokyo today. The Emperor is believed bound to reply personally. In addition to a complete apology, the President demands full indemnity and compensation, punishment of those responsible for the incident and adequate steps to prevent recurrence of such an incident. "I have been deeply shocked by the bombing of the Panay and other such incidents in China," declared the chief executive.

Ambassador Saito has already delivered a message of regret on behalf of his country, explaining that the planes were pursuing Chinese craft and mistook the identity of the American gunboat and the tankers which were sunk at the same time. Japan, Saito pointed out, would have no object in sinking a foreign warship.

On the other hand, American observers have reported that the bombing was "undoubtedly deliberate."

Both Houses of Congress were deeply concerned and agitated over the incident. In the Upper Chamber, Senator Key Pittman of Nevada, chairman of the foreign relations committee, declared that the series of incidents was becoming intolerable. Continuous apologies could not be accepted if nothing was done to prevent their recurrence.

Latest reports here are to the effect that eight persons are still missing following the sinking of the Panay. The wounded number fifteen, eight seriously and the known dead are two. Of the seventy-two persons aboard the two tankers, only thirteen are known definitely to have been rescued. All the missing are believed to have been Chinese refugees.

Fifty-two survivors of the Panay have made their way from an island and refuge back toward the Yangste River, carrying with them two dead and the eight seriously wounded.

The two dead are identified as Charles L. Ensminger of Ocean Beach, California, and Sandro Sandri, Italian, representative of the Turin newspaper La Stampa. Refugees from the Panay were imperilled again today by a clash between Japanese and Chinese troops around Holsien, hindering rescue efforts of foreign naval vessels on the Yangste.

British Protest LONDON, December 14 (Canadian Press)—Capt. Anthony Eden Foreign Secretary, told Parliament last night that a strong protest had been sent to Japan at the attack on the British gunboat Lady Bird in the Yangste River at Wu hu. The government, he added was in consultation with the United States in regard to the situation in the Far East.

NEED OF ASSAY OFFICE

Elsewhere is told the record of the first two months at the new sampling plant at Prince Rupert in which seventeen consignments of ore have been sampled and paid for and where preparations are being made for the first shipment to the smelter. So far the plant has served its purpose very well, the purpose being to encourage the prospector in developing his claim and, by means of payments made for the ore, enabling him to carry on his work. It is capable of great extension if the prospectors of the district make full use of its facilities.

In order to bring the plant up to date and make it fulfil its purpose it is very desirable that an assay plant should be added to the sampler. The establishment of this would enable much quicker service to be given than is possible under present conditions and also it would encourage a very considerable extension of its operations. It is a necessary part of the present plant if it is to fulfil all its functions properly. It is to be hoped that the Provincial government may see its way clear to equip the plant so that it may be fully modern.

Prince Rupert is the point that serves the whole north coast best. It is where rail and water meet, the pivotal point. It serves a territory on the coast both north and south and also the interior to the eastern boundary of the province. The Queen Charlotte Islands also can ship ore or send samples to the plant. It is too far away from the southern centres to make it possible to use the facilities offered there to advantage.

FEARS NAZI INFLUENCE

Recently the Consolidated Paper Company gave an option to purchase the Island of Anticosti to a syndicate composed mainly of Dutch and German citizens for the purpose of erecting and operating a sulphite pulp mill that will employ from 1500 to 2000 men. Objection is taken to this on the ground that there is a possibility the island may be used as a military base by any foreign country which may be at war with the British Empire. It is pointed out in one of these papers that at the time of the last war against Germany cement foundations were discovered in the same district which, while ostensibly for industrial purposes, might have been used for mounting guns.

Anticosti is an island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence containing 3,000 acres and it is so situated as to command the entrance of the St. Lawrence River, the front door entrance to Canada. The Quebec Chronicle demands that the government prevent the island getting into any hands which might be favorable to Nazi, Communist or Fascist movements. It objects to the settlement of thousands of Dutch and German settlers which might prove to be a centre for Nazi propaganda from which the whole province of Quebec might be poisoned. It suggests that the government should act immediately and stop at all costs the sale of Anticosti to interests under Adolph Hitler's thumb.

HERE'S ODD XMAS GIFT

Trade in London Gargoyles Takes Spurt With Busy Season—Gypsies Predict Lucky Year

LONDON, Dec. 14 (CP)—Christmas shopping in London's shops and markets promises to establish a record. Yet all the buying of presents is not confined to the shops. Down in a sheltered corner in Westminster busy trade goes on every day. Carved gargoyles, stone Tudor roses, weather-worn heads of stone saints and kings are being bought as Christmas gifts. They are bits of the sandstone stonework being removed from the parliament buildings as unsafe—and not quite a century old. The department of works started the renovations six years ago. Sale of the stonework has gone on since then but always increases around Christmas time.

The larger pieces, priced about \$25, are bought to give as garden ornaments, the smaller ones, some as low as \$1, are frequently mounted on wood for use as paper weights, book ends or door stops. Americans outnumber the other nationalities as purchasers but the souvenirs of the home of the Mother of Parliaments have been despatched to Canada, Australia, Sweden, South Africa and Ceylon. A Japanese purchased with glee the ugliest gargoyle of the lot.

Gypsies predict a lucky year ahead for England. They have been able to gather mistletoe unseasonably early in Dorset and say "Christmas kisses have been bestowed five weeks in advance, so witches are flinging away their broomsticks in disgust and cows will give more milk than ever next year." These prophecies are solemnly quoted by London newspapers.

Hear Early Carols

Signs the holiday is not far off are the trees with twinkling lights outside shops on Oxford Street and the change in the programs of the street singers who now render carols in preference to the latest song hits.

Schlaparelli borrowed considerably before Christmas for novel ideas that appeared at her mid-season showing in London. New necklines were held in place by clips shaped like a tiny angel's wings in colors of Christmas tree tinsel. Buttons were made like flat

candlesticks complete with tiny tapers. The eerie pink—usually associated with caps out of crackers—tinted a whole new clothes series from evening gowns to striking woolies and was renamed "Shocking."

Little gifts are as much in demand as always. The favorite new novelties displayed at bazaars and in shops dealing in such trifles are brocade-covered match boxes for bedroom use. Both Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary have bought a number of these to send as just-a-little-more-than-a-card gifts.

Upholstery brocade is much in use, not only for evening wraps and house coats of romantic design, but also for short jackets of the tunic blouse order. The refurbishing of the palaces has necessitated the weaving of fascinating old designs in the finest of silks. Though the use of these designs elsewhere is discouraged by custom, small pieces do become available and one West End actress appeared recently at a party in a gorgeous crimson damask tunic. She told her friends it was "just the same as the sofas in Marlborough House."

According to one arrival in London lately, there is to be a great revival of the "blouse and skirt" mode. Marcus Hellitzer, whose father introduced the blouse to America, has been visiting London and, though his factories turn out 220,000 blouses a year at present, he predicts a still greater demand for the useful garments, which he said were originally developed from men's shirts.

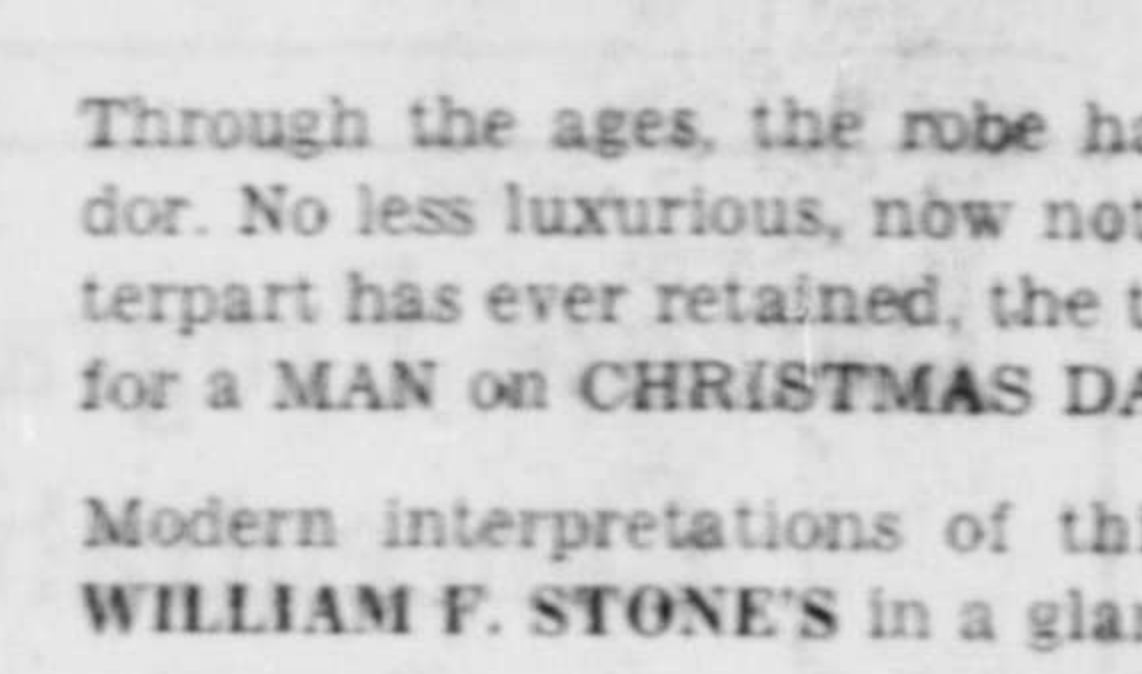

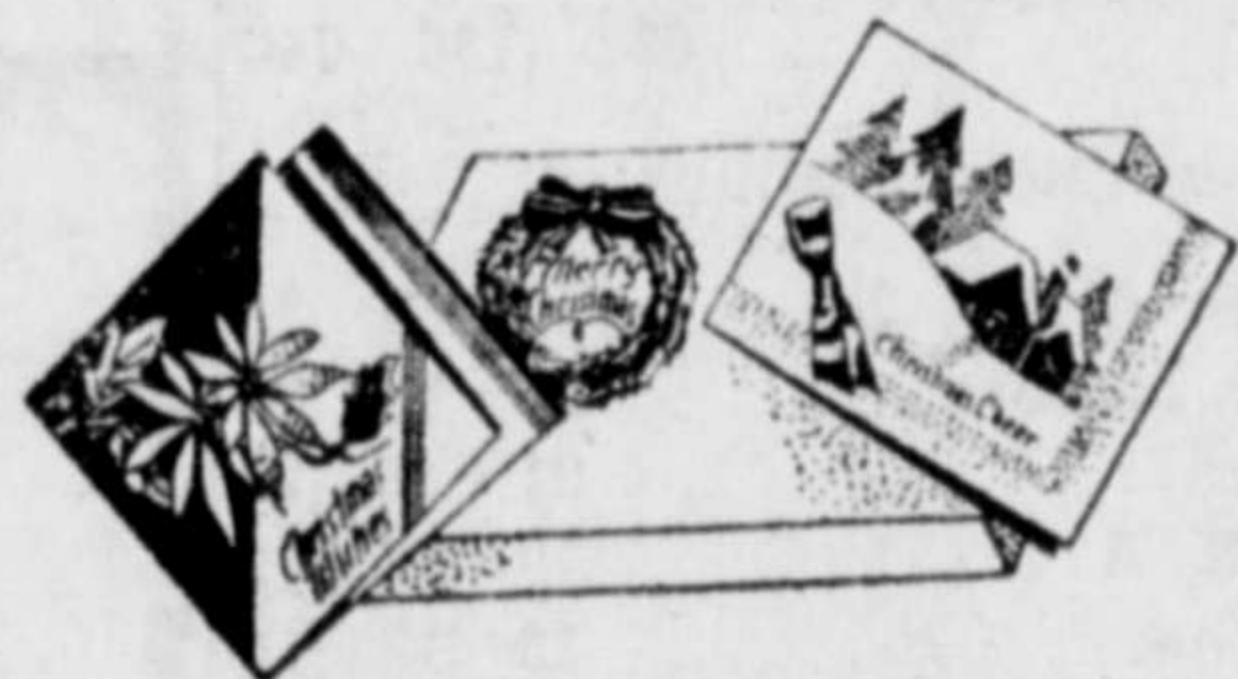

On one occasion here he came up to a beautiful follow-through but what was his dismay to see the ball still balanced on the little red peg. This misfortune brought forth simply the exclamation, "Mais je ne sais vraiment pas jouer aujourd'hui!" ("Well, I simply can't play at all today!")

But he doesn't miss them very often. The former monarch goes around the longer 18-hole course 28 up (spread 9999) pnoio is re compared to the 75 par.

He is accurate in his approaches to the green and seems to be less handicapped by over-intensity on these shorter shots. On the green itself he is at his best and is known to be a very good putter.

The Duke is a patient player and has never been known to become angry at bad luck. If he misses a shot, however, he upbraids himself audibly.

He wants to be left alone and is considered as just another player. The Duke sometimes plays the shorter course at St. Cloud, despite his preference for the longer course, merely to remain less conspicuous.

His most constant companion on the fairways is Percy Boomer, 50-year-old English professional at St. Cloud, just outside Paris.

He does not play with the Duchess. She has never accompanied him to St. Cloud. She used to walk around the course with him at the Chateau de Candé before their marriage but has not actually played for nearly a year.

PR. CHARLES TAKES RUN

Coming North Tomorrow in Place of Stranded Steamer Prince George, Now Undergoing Repairs

The steamer Prince John, due tomorrow from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, will take the run to Anyox and Stewart north from here, leaving after the arrival of the Prince Charles and returning on Friday. The Prince Charles will sail south from here on schedule at 11:15 Thursday night.

The Prince George grounded in a snowstorm at Kingsome Point north end of Princess Royal Island, last Friday. She was held up for a time but was able to refloat herself and proceed south under her own steam. She suffered a bent stem and three damaged bow plates and is reported to have been leaking on arrival at Vancouver.

The Message Of Minerals

At Museum Of Northern British Columbia

In the Museum of Northern British Columbia at Prince Rupert is a display of minerals which marks the milestones of progress of the great Northern Empire to which the flower-decked city of Prince Rupert is the gateway. There repose shiny, sparkling, gaudy, pompous stones; demure, modest, retiring and outcast stones; stones flashing with the glitter of the stars, scintillating with the iridescence of the peacock, and stones with the drabness of the sparrow, withdrawn and unpretending.

Stones, just stones? To some, perhaps, only that! Yet, gaudy or drab, every one of them sons of Vulcan, conquering soldiers of progress, your humble servants stones building a world of wonders, tools of civilization hammering at the wilderness barricades of Northern British Columbia! Beautiful, pretty, colorful; plain ordinary, shabby, shapeless things, reposing placidly in their glassed show-cases at the Museum! Cold, hard, soft, tough, brittle, malleable, heavy, light, golden, silver, red, blue, yellow, green, black, brown, grey, white, angular, symmetrical, formless and jagged things! Things elemental and simple; things compounded and profoundly complex in chemical composition! Individuals, every one of them, endowed with natural quality and oddity, well defined as in human beings!

And in them is the gripping story of romance and tragedy set in scenes of far places—mountains, snowfields and glaciers; valleys, rivers and creeks; snarling rapids and placid lakes; voracious mosquitoes, boring black-flies; a tent, a cabin, a bed of brush under a sheltering tree, the silence of the Kingdom of Nowhere, the darkness of the forest, moonlight, the howl of the lurking wolf, the curl of the campfire smoke, the aroma of strong coffee, bacon, beans and "bannock." They tell an epic of adventurous and unheralded heroes, courageous pioneers, horny-handed prospectors; grim, sweating, panting, climbing men, laden yelping dogs, groaning and stumbling pack-horses. It is the story of the vanguard of advancing civilization, the cavalcade of dawning industry, the record of the blossoming of Northern British Columbia.

Land of Promise

In those little pieces of white quartz with a few, almost invisible specks of gold, silently reposing in a little card-board box, is the romance of the first gold discovery in the Dominion of Canada on the Queen Charlotte Islands in 1851, an event that directed the eyes of the world to a new Land of Promise and supplied the advance guard of adventurers whose followers were destined to lay the foundation for penetration of industry into a wilderness.

Those round, white pebbles, like marbles, recite the hectic drama of the Klondike gold rush—Skagway, Atlin, Dawson. There, in those drab and mottled chunks of rock is the romance of wondrous dreams come true—"Scotty" Dilworth, a Scottish sailor whose prospecting resulted in the discovery of the great Premier Mine with its millions in gold and silver; the dramatic yarn of David James Rainey with its text of knavery, comedy, tragedy and ultimate fulfilment in the budding of the colorful town of Stewart at the head of Portland Canal. Over there, the glistening pieces of silvery and leaden minerals tell the story of old Frank Roundy, the Esperanza and Dolly Varden mines with their silvery promise, the narrative of the town of Alice Arm, its anticipation, dreams, suspense and fortitude. In those brassy-colored specimens is the memoir of the great Hidden Creek deposits, the sulphurous town of Anyox with smoke-belching smelteries and 685,000,000 pounds of copper.

Stones of gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, iron, molybdenum, coal, limestone, marble, graphite, mica and many others collected from the four corners of this great Northern Empire illustrate a land with the key to the coffers of progressing industry. Most of it is still wilderness, a new land, a vast strong-box as yet unopened but pregnant with rich promise that envisions highways, railways, a busy seaboard, factories, a port of call for vessels from the four corners of the globe, thronged cities, beauty and culture. Its minerals tell us it is a land that cannot, and will not be denied and Prince Rupert is the capital city of this great Northern Empire. The stones, in their little card-board boxes at the museum, speak of wondrous things; hope, opportunity, confidence. To gaze at them and understand their language is tonic to the dejected, a bulwark to morale.

Milestones of Progress

Minerals are milestones of progress civilization and culture. Throughout the ages man has advanced only in accordance with his increasing knowledge of minerals. They have served to improve the conditions of human beings. Through the use of them and the discovery of new uses man has notably enlarged his capacities. What minerals have done for other parts of the world they can and will do for Prince Rupert and Northern British Columbia. The story of minerals is the story of the world from the dawn of time, advancing of peoples and nations. In them is the trumpeting of conquerors, the wail of the shackled, the sobbing and tears of the heart-broken, the laughter of the joyous. They harbor the culture and beauty of the arts, the learning of the sciences, the printing press; the canker of war, the solace of peace; the miracles of medicine, engineering, transportation, communication, entertainment; reading, writing, the comforts of home, heat, light, eating, sleeping, birth, life, sickness and death. In all of these is the record of man's conquest of minerals. By his mastery of minerals man has increased his stature. Like a Moses minerals have led mankind from the darkness into the light.

From the ages of stone, bone, smoke and drum signals through the age of bronze, iron and steel, to the telegraph, telephone, moving picture and radio, to railways, automobiles and aeroplanes; from the light of the moon to tallow candle to the brilliance of electricity, minerals have led mankind Gaze upon our minerals in the Northern British Columbia Museum, read and understand their story and drink their message of hope, promise and "Happy New Years" for Prince Rupert and Northern British Columbia!

ARE PROUD OF STATUE

Haig's Hair Points To Merits Despite Criticism of Widow And Others

LONDON, Dec. 14 (CP)—Winds of controversy whirled about Field Marshal Haig in the declining years of his life. The storm persisted more than nine years after the death of the Field Marshal who commanded the British forces during the last three years of the Great War.

The present controversy does not concern the man himself. It revolves about the nation's tribute to his memory—the giant equestrian statue in historic Whitehall unveiled recently by the Duke of Gloucester.

Since the original design was submitted about eight years ago by the sculptor A. F. Wadsworth there have been numerous signs of discontent. The Field Marshal's widow criticized the proposed design as "monstrous" and despite certain modifications in the work as finally accepted, declined to attend the official dedication ceremony.

However the statue has the blessing of the Field Marshal's 19-year-old heir. "Whatever may be the technical faults of the horse, it is at the rider that one looks and that is as it should be," said the second Earl Haig. "The statue has strength and originality. As such it is bound to be criticized. But, even though some people may have strong feelings about it, we must agree that the country paid my father a fine tribute of which he would have been and of which his family is really proud."

The statue, of bronze, weighs four tons and stands 14 feet high on a 13-foot stone pedestal, designed by Rowland S. Price. The distinguished soldier, bareheaded and wearing a full-length greatcoat over his military uniform, is depicted in a normal attitude, grasping the reins to his left thigh. Little fault has been found with the modelling of the man. But the horse on which he sits has aroused an outburst of violent criticism.

Would Destroy It

The "exquisite" protest that the enormous quarters—stretched out behind like a hackney in a show ring—exaggerate an unnatural stance. The right foreleg is planted so far forward as to make it doubtful whether a horse could stand in such a manner. The other is raised

in the conventional "pawing" attitude, conveying the idea the horse is being sharply reined in. Yet, the critics say, the rider's hands show no indication of performing such an operation. Nor do the reins indicate any apparent pressure on the horse's mouth. And they complain the head is flexed back, tucking the chin into the chest in the accentuated manner of a circus horse.

Lord Gisborough, retired cavalry officer, suggests a crusade should be launched "against this horrible monstrosity" and never ended until it has been destroyed. He believes the artist and present cavaliers and hunters who would gladly give 10 shillings each to pay for a new statue.

The horse is an anatomical impossibility, according to Col. Paul Bovisanko, former director of the 14th Free State Cavalry School. "It is a shame that a great cavalier, who all his life was surrounded by the beauty of horses, should be handed down to posterity on such a misshapen mount," he said.

T. W. Ears, art critic of The Daily Mail, Telegraph and Morning Post, branded the statue as "a sad confusion of style and sculptural impulse."
