ALARMING LAG IN SOVIET RUSSIA

SHIP WAS ATTACKED

Insurgent Sloops Force Government Vessel Aground—Loyalists Continue Land Advance

Rebel Revolt

All Not Harmony in Ranks Of Insurgents—Resent Italian Control

BAYONNE, France, March 30: (CP)—The 3080-ton Spanish government steamer Mar Caspio of Bilbao was attacked in French territorial waters by two armed insurgent sloops yesterday and run aground off Cape Breton. It is reported. No lives were lost. Meanwhile at Madrid it was stated that the government suddenly shifted the scene of operations to northwest of Madrid and, arriving out a 36-mile arrowhead, menaced insurgent divisional headquarters at Avila. Nationalist is the peak of the salient formed by the swift government advance and its fall would mean the end of the insurgents' northern concentrations point to the west of Madrid.

Following the serious reverses sustained recently in the Guadalupe sector, there have been a number of uprisings in insurgent ranks both in Spain and Morocco, it is reported. Principal cause of trouble, it is said, has been the question of authority of Italian forces over Spaniard fighting forces. Mass executions have been ordered throughout insurgent-held Spain in view of the unrest and anarchy.

Are Not Liable OTTAWA, March 30:—It was stated in Department of Justice files yesterday that five Canadians reported to be held with a number of Americans in France after having allegedly attempted to break the non-intervention blockade and get into Spain are not liable to prosecution under Canadian laws.

Refunding of City's Bonded Indebtedness Near Complete; Commissioner's Annual Report

At the close of the fiscal year 1936, under the "Consolidated Refunding Act," \$1,699,693.63 of the old outstanding bonds had been exchanged for the new 4% issue, thus leaving only \$35,900.00 unreported, announces City Commissioner W. J. Alder in the annual report of the City of Prince Rupert for 1936 which has just been issued. The sinking fund has been substantially increased during the year. At December 31, 1936, the debenture debt of the City of Prince Rupert amounted to \$1,735,593.63, and the sinking fund to \$245,460.87 at par, as against \$188,675.32 at par on December 31, 1935.

FEARFUL OF BIG STRIKE

British Defence Officials Keeping Close Watch on Glasgow Situation

LONDON, March 30: (CP)—British defence officials were reported to be anxious today lest a two thousand Scottish steel workers mushroom into a nationwide work stoppage by 120,000 persons and cripple Great Britain's vast five year rearmament program.

Government observers are keeping a close watch on a strike by workers of Bairdhead Forge of the William Beardmore Co. at Glasgow to determine whether to intervene to prevent a halt in admiralty work.

AIDING MINERS

John L. Lewis Turns His Attention From Auto Workers For Time Being

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 30: (CP)—John L. Lewis, key figure in the Chrysler Automobile Corporation strike, swung to another front yesterday in the campaign to impel the growth of his Committee of Industrial Organization in the United States.

While negotiations for a settlement of Detroit's three week old automotive tie-up were scheduled to proceed without him, the port J. I. O. leader took up the cause of 400,000 soft coal miners in New York. The miners seek a fifteen percent pay increase and a reduction of the work week from thirty-five to thirty hours. Operators stand for the present wage scale and an increase in the work week to forty hours. It is felt that Lewis, who was president of the United Mine Workers for eighteen years, will help to compose the difference.

WINDSOR PLANT CLOSES

WINDSOR, Ont., March 30:—The Windsor plant of the Chrysler Motor Corporation, employing some 2000 men, closed today on account of shortage of materials supplied from the strike-tied plants of the company in Detroit.

MAY CLEAR UP KIDNAP

Significant Statement Made By New Mexico Sheriff Following Arrest

TUCUMCARI, New Mexico, Mar. 30: (CP)—Sheriff Fred White, after arresting and holding Vern Chalton of Washington State here in connection with the kidnap-slaying of Charles Mattson at Tacoma last December, said: "We expect this thing will clear up by tonight."

White would not amplify the statement but it was taken to mean that outside developments were awaited.

Production Fails To Reach Mark Expected In Anniversary Year

First Quarter of 1937 is Proving Disappointment to Government—Backwardness in Spring Planting Campaign

MOSCOW, March 30: (CP)—The Russian government discloses an alarming industrial and agricultural lag for the first quarter of 1937 in a program designed to force production even beyond the point fixed by the second five-year plan. Backwardness of the spring planting campaign has alarmed the government and raised fears that the scale designed as a celebration of the first twenty years of Soviet rule.

Joseph Stalin, Soviet dictator, in a statement last night, described capitalism, Trotskyism and conceit as the three major enemies of Russia.

Native Merchant Prince And Noted French Business Man Are Expelled From Ethiopia

ROME, March 30: (CP)—Gironale d'Italia disclosed today that the Mohammed Ali, head of Ethiopia's largest merchandising organization, has been expelled from the country by the Italian Viceroy, Rodolfo Graziani, on charges of spying for the British Intelligence Service.

At the same time the French merchant Besse, director of Besse & Co., also a large commercial house with many branches, has been fined about \$75,000, placed in jail and then expelled for allegedly having engaged in arms trade during the Italo-Ethiopian war.

PRINCE IN VANCOUVER

Brother of Japanese Emperor On Way to London to Attend Coronation

Day on Coast

Royal Visitor to be Honored By Compatriots Across Canada

VANCOUVER, March 30:—Prince Chichibu, brother of the Emperor of Japan, and his suite arrived in Vancouver at 6:30 last evening at Pier B-C aboard the Japanese liner Heian Maru which passed quarantine at William Head at 10 o'clock in the morning. The Prince is on his way to London to personally represent the Emperor at the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth. Dr. Hugh L. Keenleyside, first secretary of the Department of External Affairs at Ottawa was here to extend an official welcome on behalf of Canada to the Prince and will accompany the party east, representing the Canadian government.

When their Royal Highnesses Prince and Princess Chichibu leave Vancouver over Canadian National Railways this evening on the second lap of their journey to London it will be the signal for Japanese across Canada to meet the special train carrying the emperor's brother.

Leaving here at 7:30 p.m. the special is scheduled to make stops of from five to ten minutes at New Westminster, Port Mann, Matsqui and Fort Langley in order that Japanese farmers in the lower valley may pay their respects to Prince and Princess Chichibu.

Further east the Japanese residents of Winnipeg, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal will mass on railway platforms for similar greetings.

Day in Vancouver

Due to the late arrival of motorship Heian Maru last night, several hours behind schedule, the itinerary of the royal party has been changed. A visit to Niagara Falls is now cancelled thus saving a day for the extensive Japanese colony in Vancouver to carry out its plans for celebrations which otherwise would have been cancelled.

Today Prince Yasuhito Chichibu and the Princess were taken on a tour of Vancouver and received delegations of Japanese residents.

In the west the special train will stop at Jasper for 30 minutes Wednesday afternoon while the party drives to Jasper Park Lodge for a glimpse of the mountain resort. Arriving in Winnipeg at 6 p.m. Thursday it spends a half hour there and reaches Toronto Saturday morning at 7:15 a.m. and departs two hours later for Ottawa.

After a day's stay in Ottawa the party will leave for New York via Montreal to embark for England. On board the train will be a royal suite of eight. Its members are Viscount Maudsair, Grand Master of Ceremonies to the Emperor; Baron Tomii, Counsellor of the Japanese Embassy in London; Major General Masaharu Homma, M. C.; Rear Admiral Masachi Nimi; Captain Sadao Yamaguchi, Equerry to Prince Chichibu; Baron Kikukawa, Master of Ceremonies to the Emperor; Madame Shisuka Yamasa, Lady in Waiting to Princess Chichibu.

Five Japanese newspaper correspondents are reporting the movements of the royal party, following them from Ogoka and Tokyo. A squadron of seaplanes and numerous gaily decorated Japanese fishing boats met the Heian Maru off the mouth of the Fraser River as the vessel approached Vancouver with the royal party on board.

TO STAND ON BUDGET

Alberta Political Crisis Will Have To Be Settled on Floor Of House—Aberhart

EDMONTON, March 30: (CP)—The Aberhart government will stand or fall by the budget now before the Legislature and opposed by insurgent groups of Social Credit members. Premier William Aberhart announced the government's stand during a press interview yesterday. "This matter will have to be settled on the floor of the House," the Premier said.

If the motion to pass the provisional estimates as presented yesterday afternoon by Hon. Solon Low, provincial treasurer, was defeated, the debate would continue. "We would go to vote on the budget," Premier Aberhart declared. The House last night refused leave to withdraw the budget for the time being and proceed with provisional estimates instead. This was a reverse for Premier Aberhart. The budget debate will now go ahead.

Insurgent Plan

Provision for a monthly "consumer's" dividend is provided for in a proposed Provincial Income and Credit Issue Act sponsored by the insurgent group of Social Crediters in the Legislature. The plan calls for a commission to administer Social Credit and the establishment of a credit house in Edmonton with branches throughout the province.

CHINAMAN DIES

Wong Dong Soon, 61, Chinaman, died last night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. He was a laundryman and lived on Third Avenue. He had been 40 years in Canada, 15 of which were spent in Prince Rupert. He is a widow in China.

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## Every Reason to Expect

The Financial News of Vancouver is one of the critics of the present provincial government. We have no objection to this criticism although we do not agree with it. It is done in a fair manner from the Vancouver point of view. What interests us more than the criticism is an admission based on a survey of the situation. The News says in part:

"Unless one is so loyal to some other political faith that he can not see the signs, it must be admitted that there is every reason to expect that the Liberal government will be returned to office when it goes to the country this summer.

"It will probably be elected, not because it has been any paragon of political virtues, but because its opponents are hopelessly divided and disorganized.

"The best that the Conservatives can hope to do is to elect a number of good men as Conservatives and not as independents, and then to build around this nucleus of a hard-hitting and effectual opposition a party which has 'found itself' once more.

"The C.C.F. divided into the Telfordites and the Connelites or the continuing C.C.F., as distinct from the Reconstructionists, has divided again by expelling a number of its leaders with influential followings. The Communists, cause of all the dissension, are still an entity crying for amalgamation under the United Front."

## The Criticism

The criticism of the Financial News, as we understand it, is that too much money has been expended in the outlying districts and not enough on the paving of main highways in the south. That, of course, is something to which we take exception. In the south they have passable roads, in the north the roads are often not passable. Also new roads are required such as the highway east from Prince Rupert, and highways leading north from Stewart, and connecting Smithers with Babine. Every community has its road problem and there will be very strong opposition to the whole of the appropriation or anything like all of it being spent in the neighborhood of the big cities in the south. We do not care whether the highways are handled by a commission which would have to take its orders from the government or by the government direct under its own engineers. It makes very little difference, as we see it, except that the commission members would draw down big salaries which would mean less money to spend on the roads. What we need is roads, not commissions.

Chichibu issued a statement expressing the wish that traditionally friendly relations between Canada and Japan would continue and become more friendly.

During the Coronation ceremonies at London, Prince Chichibu will bestow on King George the Supreme Order of the Chrysanthemum, at present held only by the Emperor of Japan and Prince Kanin, elder field marshal of Japan. On Queen Elizabeth will be bestowed the First Class Order of the Sacred Crown, held by only a few Imperial Japanese Princesses.

From the Waterfront

Capt. Mounce Appointed to Pilotage at Victoria—Seattle Halibut Landings Heavy Vancouver Prices Low.

Capt. William Mounce, well known as an officer of Union steamships on the north coast for twenty years or more and recently in command of the steamer Cardena, made his final call here in the service of the Union company at the end of last week prior to joining the coast pilotage service with headquarters at Victoria as from April 1. Capt. Mounce qualified some time ago for the pilotage since which time he has been awaiting call to assume his new work. He has virtually risen from the ranks with the Union Steamship Co. and for years was pilot of the steamer Catala. For the past year or so he has been in command of various of the company's ships. It is understood Capt. Ernest Shepard will be making a couple of trips as master of the Cardena pending the return of the regular skipper, Capt. John Boden, who has been on annual vacation.

Northland Transportation Co's motorship liner Northland, Capt. Len Williams, was in port from 4 to 8:30 Saturday evening discharging two carloads of fresh fish and one carload of frozen for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways. The vessel came here from Ketchikan and proceeded to Seattle. She had forty-one passengers on board, all going through.

Effective henceforth the steamer Catala will make weekly calls at Arrandale and Kincolith on the Naas River. The vessel will make fortnightly calls at Mill Bay, it is announced.

## C. N. R. Garden Improvements

Thousands of Seedlings Being Raised in Greenhouse and Cold Frames for Railway Gardens

Some rather important improvements have been made to the Canadian National Railway sunken gardens this year. ## TUGS FOR FAR NORTH

Seven Flat Cars Required to Take Craft from Quebec To Waterways

MONTREAL, March 30—An eighty-three foot power tug, constructed at the Sorel Shipyards and designed for use in Northern Alberta, passed through Montreal yesterday on seven flat cars of the Canadian National Railways on its long journey to the near Arctic regions. Two of these tugs have been built for the Northern Transportation Company Ltd., operating during the season of navigation from the end of steel at Waterways, Alberta, down the Mackenzie River system to Great Bear Lake. The second tug will be leaving Sorel shortly.

In addition to the unusual nature of the boats themselves there is the fact that they will not be launched until they are approximately 3,000 miles or so away from the shipyards. They have been completed at Sorel ever to the installation of engines, then cut into sections and shipped by rail to the northern points from which they go into service.

One of these tugs will operate on the northern section of the route between Fort Smith and Fort Norman and the second is to go into service on the Athabaska and Slave Rivers between Fort McMurray and Fitzgerald.

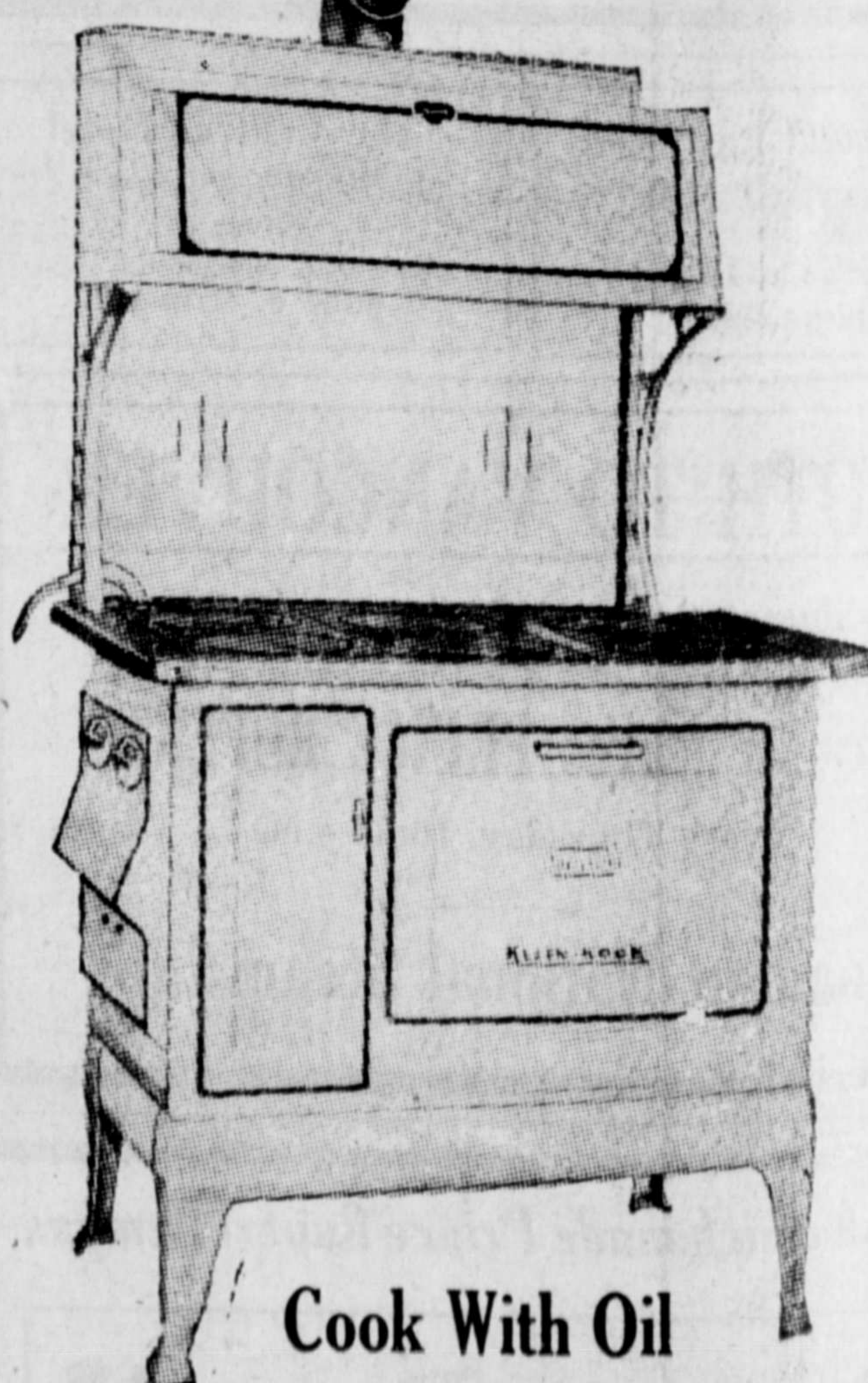
