Japanese Continue Their Advance

CHRISTMAS ALL YEAR

Work Such as Gyro Club Carries Out For Children is True Expression of Goodwill—Pastor Delivers Xmas Talk

Community activities such as the Gyro Club engages in for the betterment of conditions for boys and girls are in themselves an expression of the Christmas spirit of giving and goodwill and an important feature of them is that they are carried on not only at this season but throughout the year, said Rev. Edwin E. Brandt, pastor of First Baptist Church, in a thoughtful Yuletide talk before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Brandt told of the traditions as to the origin of Christmas observance in such countries as Scandinavia, Greece, Rome and Egypt. At one time it had been a celebration of the commencement of the lengthening days of the year in the Northern Hemisphere.

Miss Mary Gladwell, who for years taught school at Prince Rupert, died in the Vancouver General Hospital on Sunday. She had lived in retirement at Garrows Bay, North Vancouver, for some time.

Continuing his discourse on the development of Christmas customs, Mr. Brandt told how the Christmas tree idea had originated in the Scandinavian countries.

The "Sign of the Babe" for Christmas was a practical sign of human personality. Christ, as a babe, was God speaking to men in a language they could understand.

Mr. Brandt held up the Bible as the greatest existing inspiration. The Book of God held up an ideal and showed how that ideal could be reached.

More Italians Going To Spain To Help Rebels

LONDON, Dec. 23: (CP)—The Daily Herald, Labor newspaper, reports that eight thousand more troops have been sent from Italian East Africa to reinforce the Spanish insurgents following their recent reverses. Meanwhile it is reported from Teruel, insurgent stronghold, which is reported captured by the loyalists, that the rebel retreat is continuing steadily northward and that the fall of Albarracin to the government forces is imminent.

Mussolini Denies That Piece of Italian Somaliland is to be Given to Germany

ROME, Dec. 23:—Premier Benito Mussolini denies reports that Italy is to give Germany a portion of Italian Somaliland as a Christmas gift. Il Duce says that the particular area which it has been reported Italy would give Germany would be useless for colonial purposes and it would be only insulting Germany to offer it to her.

Beer And Wine Resorts Will Be Open Later

OLYMPIA, Dec. 23:—The Washington State Liquor Board announces that beer and light wine establishments in Washington will be permitted to remain open until 3 o'clock in the morning of New Year's Eve, two hours later than the usual closing hour.

POINT BARROW, Alaska, Dec. 23: (CP)—Sir George Hubert Wilkins, noted explorer, here to resume the search for Sigismund Levaneffsky and other Russian trans-polar fliers who have been missing since last August on a projected flight from Moscow to the United States, announces that unfavorable weather has made it necessary for him to abandon the plan to make moonlight flights this month.

First Murder In Thirteen Years There

SAINT JOHN, New Brunswick, December 23: (Canadian Press)—Saint John has had its first murder in thirteen years. A fifty-eight year old shopkeeper died of gunshot wounds received at the hands of a hold-up man who robbed his store. The bandit made his getaway and police are now endeavouring to locate him.

BUILDING OF HOMES

Plan Contest is Announced By Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance

OTTAWA, Dec. 23: (CP)—A new plan for building loans in Canada under the Home Improvement Plan was suggested by Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance. Loans for \$2500 homes would be made available in British Columbia and \$3000 elsewhere.

Air Service To New Zealand Is Being Started

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, December 23 (Canadian Press)—inauguration of the first air mail and express service between United States and New Zealand will take place with the expected arrival of a plane here from Honolulu on Wednesday of next week.

Capt. Edwin Musick, veteran explorer of the Pacific, left Honolulu today for Auckland, pioneering the new commercial air route which will be known as the Samoan Clipper service.

Welsh Sitdown Strikers Win

CARDIFF, Wales, December 23—Fourteen Welsh coal miners ended a sitdown strike last night when the mine owners agreed to their demand for increased wages.

League Council Session Called For January 17

GENEVA, Dec. 23:—The council of the League of Nations has been called into session here for January 17. There is a feeling in some quarters that, in view of the withdrawal of Italy from the League and the threatened withdrawal of other nations as well as the apparent ineffectuality of the League in dealing with international disputes and aggression, that this may be one of the last sessions of the council.

XMAS TRADE IS AVERAGE

Little Difference Seen in Volume of Business As Compared With Year Ago—Better Than Depression

Christmas business appears to be about average in Prince Rupert this year. Some merchants report it better than a year ago. Some say it is not so good. Others see little difference.

Special Christmas stocks seem to be getting pretty well cleaned up now although there are still plenty of attractive offerings. There may have been extra help taken on in a few stores here for the Christmas rush but normal staffs in the most of cases appear to have been sufficient to handle the trade.

Best Since Depression Storekeepers throughout the province looked happily at rapidly diminishing stocks today and estimated that generally their Christmas business rush would at least equal and probably exceed last year's total.

The cheerful attitude of average tradesmen was reflected in reports from such widespread points as Stewart in the north and Trail in the West Kootenay interior.

Former Premier Belgium is Invited to London LONDON, Dec. 23: (CP)—Former Belgian Premier Paul Van Zeeland of Belgium has been invited to London to make his report on a world economic survey which he made last year at the request of Great Britain and France.

JAP TROOPS ARE MOVING FAR AFIELD

Garrison at Hong Kong to be Increased with Scots Battalion From Bombay

BRITONS FLEE HANKOW HANKOW, December 23 (Canadian Press)—Three hundred British and other foreigners have fled, fearing a Japanese attack on the temporary seat of the Chinese government since the withdrawal from Nanking.

British Reinforce

Tsingtao and Other Chinese Coastal Cities Are Expected to be Attacked Shortly

SHANGHAI, Dec. 23: (CP)—Reports that thirty thousand Japanese troops have left Shanghai for an unknown destination and that eight transports are ready to take additional troops give impetus to fears that Tsingtao as well as other Chinese coastal cities are to be attacked.

With two Japanese columns reported closing in on Hangchow, one being eighteen miles away and the other twenty-five miles, the Japanese today demanded evacuation of Hangchow by the Chinese in order that the ancient city with its historic treasures might be saved the destruction involved in heavy bombardment if there is no immediate surrender.

Japanese officials here announce the formation of a new autonomous government at Nanking presumably replacing the Chinese regime of Premier Chiang Kai Shek which fled the former capital a month ago.

British Troops Going to Hong Kong The War Office announces that the British garrison at Hong Kong will be strengthened. The troopship Dunera is prepared to leave Southampton to take aboard the 25th Battalion of Royal Scots at Bombay. They will reach Hong Kong on January 28.

Was An Accident? TOKIO, Dec. 23: (CP)—The Japanese Foreign Office today offered a new explanation for the recent incident of the sinking of the United States gunboat Panay in the Yangtze River. It is now suggested that it was an accident due to mistaken identity.

That killed and wounded several Japanese. These claims are in direct contradiction of the American reports that Japanese bombs machine-gunned the Panay after the bombing after which the Japanese came aboard and then left the sinking vessel without offering any assistance whatever.

Col. Hashimoto, who was in charge of Japanese river forces during the Panay incident, has been relieved of his post. (Continued on Page 2)

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### A MIDWAY POLICY

In dictatorship states such as Russia, Italy and Germany there is only one party and the government does not allow opposition. Those only are loyal citizens who agree with the policy of the dictator. Those who do not agree are looked upon as traitors and are dealt with accordingly. We see that almost every day in Russia today. We saw it in the German purge and we are told that a similar condition exists in Italy. In democracies we go to the opposite extreme. In this country we pay the leader of the opposition a special salary to act in that capacity and his duty seems to be to oppose and criticize everything the government does, irrespective of its merits. That is surely wrong.

No government is always wrong and no government we assume is always right. If the parliamentary system is to be a success official opposition parties will have to use more discretion in the manner in which they oppose and criticize, looking rather to the good of the country than to party advantage.

Last year the country found Mr. Bennett taking that ground but he seems to have deserted it under pressure from his followers and of late he has been condemning everything including the defense scheme, the Rowell Commission, and the extension of trade and commerce policy. Liberals have done likewise when they have been in opposition. It is up to the reasonable people on both sides to insist that their leaders support good measures irrespective of party demands, and that they oppose policies they do not think would be for the good of the country even when initiated by their own party.

### POOR RELATIONS

An Ottawa press correspondent speaks of the lesser provinces of Canada as the "poor relations to Ontario and Quebec." This is what the west resents. The prairie provinces and British Columbia have been the great market for Ontario and Quebec factories and, as such, have been the chief contributing factors to the prosperity of those provinces, a prosperity which has made them rich.

Our opinion is that the west would benefit greatly by being cut off altogether from the rest of the Dominion although we are not suggesting now the dividing up of the country into independent nations. That would be only a last resource. We are proud of our Canadian nationality but we do not want to be classed as poor relations and we think the Premiers of Ontario and Quebec are showing very poor taste and poor statesmanship in pretending that they are the rich uncles who are supporting their impecunious nephews.

## MADE SURE OF OFFICE

Political Expedient Started Frank Kellogg On Illustrious Career

ST. PAUL, Dec. 22 (CP)—In 1877 the late Frank B. Kellogg, American statesman, who died here, was admitted to the bar. The next year he was elected city attorney of Rochester. In 1890 he formed a partnership with Nurt W. Eaton but clients were few, and the firm went into politics. The two ran for the office of district attorney in 1881, Kellogg as a Republican and Eaton as a Democrat, because the salary of \$3000 a year was needed for the firm. Kellogg won.

On October 1, 1887, he moved to St. Paul and achieved a reputation as a corporation lawyer. Kellogg was picked by President Theodore Roosevelt for some of his administration's most famous "trust busting."

In 1916 he turned to politics, ran for the United States senatorship and was elected, serving the 187-23 term. The farmer-labor landslide of 1922 in Minnesota defeated him as a candidate for reelection. In 1924 he was appointed by President Coolidge as ambassador to the court of St. James's. He remained in London a year, representing the United States at a conference on Dawes plan procedure in August, 1924, and being credited with

breaking a deadlock which threatened to stymie that scheme for collecting and distributing war reparations from Germany.

He was made secretary of state when Charles Evans Hughes, after serving in the Harding-Coolidge cabinet, decided to resume private law practice when Coolidge's own administration took office March 4, 1925. Kellogg's flair for diplomacy had full play in the four years he held the cabinet post. In addition to the multilateral anti-war pact, he guided negotiations that resulted in more than 80 international agreements, many of them providing for arbitration, conciliation and other peaceful means of settling disputes between nations.

Kellogg, silent, stoop-shouldered and in his 73rd year, was about ready to call "quits" with active life when he finished his four years as secretary of state. But a year and a-half later Hughes, appointed chief justice of the United States, resigned his place on the bench of the world court and the League of Nations, in September, 1930, chose Kellogg as his successor. One of his outstanding findings as an international jurist was a dissenting opinion when the court ruled against a proposed customs union between Germany and Austria. Kellogg held the plan entirely legal, discarding the idea that it contravened the German territorial limitation clauses of the Treaty of Versailles.

Kellogg was a bachelor until his fortieth year. In 1896 he married Clara M. Cook of Rochester, Minn.

### PIONEER OF RING IS DEAD

Jack Kilrain, Great Heavyweight of an Earlier Day, Passes—Met Sullivan in 78 Rounds for Title

QUINCY, Massachusetts, Dec. 23: (CP)—Jake Kilrain, old time heavyweight boxer, died here yesterday after a long illness at the age of seventy-eight years. He was a veteran of the old days of pugilism when championships were settled with bare fists. The funeral will take place tomorrow.

Kilrain engaged in at least 150 bouts in his day and the most notable was his fight for the title against John L. Sullivan in 1889 in Mississippi. This fight went seventy-eight rounds before Kilrain's seconds threw in the sponge. Kilrain had been knocked down forty-eight times and Sullivan, twenty-seven times. Kilrain always said that, if his seconds had not intervened, he would have won this fight and the world's heavyweight title.
