PASTOR'S ADDRESS

Home and Religion" Subject Of Address Before Parent-Teachers By Rev. J. C. Jackson

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers Association was held last evening in the Borden Street School.

The recent telephone bridge, it is reported, had been very successful and thanks were expressed to the conveners, Mrs. J. W. Kilbrick, Mrs. N. M. Carter and the committee.

Following the short business meeting, Miss Janet Rochester dedicated the audience with her skillfully rendered pianoforte solo entitled "Hungarian Dance."

"Home and Religion" was the theme of an interesting and thought-provoking address by Rev. J. C. Jackson, pastor of First United Church.

Mr. Jackson called attention to the beautiful description of home life as portrayed in the chapter of Proverbs. There is danger in the present ever-changing and complex state of society where speed and efficiency are much worshipped that the ideals of the Christian would suffer.

Too often the amenities and privileges of home in the matter of ineffectual Christian faith and ideals are relegated to outside organizations to the detriment not only of family life but also to the detriment of society in general.

The home was still the fundamental unit of society in which the child received his first training in religion, authority, obedience, loyalty, love, service and all the human virtues. These fundamental functions of the home were needed today more than ever.

"We are passing through a crisis in our home life," said the speaker. "The instability of the modern family is a matter of serious concern to society and is a problem which we must face squarely."

Otherwise there is grave danger of losing both home and religious life. The deep religious faith of our fathers and mothers is needed more today than ever. Only the force of such a Christian faith can give the force of a religion, as deep as the faith our fathers held, and as broad as the social conditions which we live, can bring about a social order wherein increasing dwellers righteousness."

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Miss Rochester and Mr. Jackson.

At the close of the meeting refreshments were served and a pleasant social hour enjoyed.

ORGANIZED IN SECRET

French Authorities Conducting Inquiry Into Activities of "Hooded Ones"

PARIS, Nov. 18: (CP)—Authorities reported five new arrests yesterday in a nation-wide inquiry into a secret military organization known as the "Hooded Ones" which was uncovered in France two months ago.

Minister of the Interior Marx Dormoy said that the investigation was merely routine but the French press asserted that a new attempt against national security had been unearthed.

CONVICTS RE-TAKEN

Police Catch up With Two of Three Kidnappers Who Escaped From Prison

SYRACUSE, Nov. 18: (CP)—Detective Sergeant William Metzger of the Syracuse police department said yesterday that the police had captured John Oley and Harold Crowley, two of three convicted kidnapers of John O'Connell Jr. of Albany, who escaped early Tuesday from Onondaga Penitentiary. Percy Geary, the third man to escape, is still at large. He leaped from the window of a rooming house to make his getaway as the other two men were being taken.

IS TAKEN BY DEATH

B. E. Webster Expires at His Home on Atlin Avenue After Lengthy Illness

Bertram E. Webster, for some twenty years a resident of Prince Rupert, passed away at 11 o'clock last night at his residence, 1718 Atlin Avenue, after an illness of several years. Before his illness made it necessary to relinquish work, Mr. Webster was identified with the office of the B. and N. Department of the Canadian National Railways. He was well known and highly esteemed and many friends will regret to hear of his passing.

Deceased came from Derbyshire, England, and was upwards of sixty years of age. He is survived by a widow who will have the sympathy of friends in her bereavement. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of B. C. Undertakers.

NOME PLANE HERE

On the way from Nome to Seattle, a flying boat piloted by Hans Mirow was here overnight arriving at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and leaving at 10 o'clock this morning in continuation of the flight south. Passengers were D. L. Freidmann, Fred Maves and Louis Nashenweg, all of Nome.

HERRING SEINING

With three seineboats engaged in taking the fish, the herring harvest in Prince Rupert Harbor has started earlier than usual this winter. A good run developed near the surface last night when one boat took eighty tons. This morning Capt. R. Gammon got a catch of 200 tons. The herring are of good size and fat. The fish so far caught are being taken by the Tucks Inlet reduction plant but it is possible some may be taken later to Namu or Port Edward reduction plants.

WILL GET AIR MAIL

WASHINGTON D. C.—United States postal officials announce that a branch air mail service will be established between some southeastern Alaskan city and Whitehorse to connect with the United States-Fairbanks route.

ANTI JAP-DEMONSTRATION

VANCOUVER—An anti-Japanese demonstration on the Vancouver waterfront yesterday resulted in the arrest of twenty-two men and four women on charges of obstructing. The demonstration was in protest at the landing of Japanese goods from the steamer Empress of Canada on her arrival from the Orient.

B.C. TRADE BENEFITS

OTTAWA—A trade treaty has been negotiated between Canada and the Central American republic of San Salvador, it was announced yesterday by Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce. Canada's goods are given general entry. British Columbia canned salmon and vegetables will benefit.

ANGLO-AMERICAN PACT

WASHINGTON D. C.—United States and Great Britain have agreed to negotiate for a reciprocal trade pact. The decision is fraught with far-reaching economic and political implications.

WAR RISK LESS

LONDON—British marine insurance underwriters have made sharp reductions in war risk rates on shipping both to the Orient and the Western Mediterranean.

TRAIN KILLS SIX

VINELAND, Ont.—Three men and three girls were killed last night when a Canadian National freight train travelling fifty miles an hour struck an automobile at the station crossing here. The men were from Welland while the girls, unidentified at once, are believed to be from Thorold, Ont.

CHARGE BY ROME NOW

Says Russia Has Been Active for Loyalists—Japan Recognizes Franco

LONDON, Nov. 18: (CP)—Russia's acceptance of a compromise in connection with non-intervention in the Spanish civil war has brought a charge from Italy that the Soviet had been landing large amounts of fighting supplies and had sent heavy reinforcements to assist the loyalists in prosecuting the war in Spain.

In Tokyo it is announced that the Japanese government will formally recognize General Francisco Franco's insurgent regime in Spain on November 25, the same day on which Italy and Germany will recognize Manchukuo, the Japanese puppet state in China.

In Barcelona the president of loyalist Spain said today that evacuation of foreign volunteers would adversely affect his side.

SEARCH IS HAMPERED

Ice Forming on Skeena River Renders Finding of Mrs. Swain's Body More Difficult

TERRACE, Nov. 18—Ice forming on the Skeena River is rendering more difficult search operations for the body of Mrs. H. A. Swain who is believed to have dropped into the river from the Lakelse bridge last Friday morning. There has been no further clue since the finding of Mrs. Swain's handbag yesterday caught in the steelwork beneath the bridge span. She had been seen walking toward the bridge on Friday morning.

Mrs. Swain had no family at Terrace but relatives in Portland, Oregon, have been notified of the tragedy which was conceded a few days ago. Mrs. Swain was the widow of the late H. A. Swain who died a couple of months ago. Just before Mr. Swain's death, they had completed the building of a new \$2000 home.

DAVISON IS RE-ELECTED

Mayor of Calgary is Once Again Successful at Polls in Prairie City

CALGARY, Nov. 18: (CP)—Within two hours after the losing of the polls in Calgary's municipal election last night, re-election of Mayor Andrew Davison for his fifth consecutive two-year term was conceded.

Davison, an outspoken opponent of Social Credit, had six thousand majority on the first count in the proportional representation balloting over A. J. Leisner, Labor candidate who was supported by the Social Credit League. Davison got 19,479 votes, Leisner, 13,361, and James Gillman, Independent, only 444.

Exiled Bolshevik Leader Pays Over \$500 to Government of Norway, it is Announced

OSLO, Norway, November 18: (CP)—Leon Trotsky, exiled Russian Bolshevik leader, has settled his tax dispute with the Norwegian government by the payment of \$500. Trotsky is now residing in Mexico.

IS NAMED CARDINAL

Archbishop Hinsley of England to be Elevated at Rome Next Month

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 18: (CP)—Most Rev. Arthur Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, will be among five new cardinals to be named at a consistory on December 16, it is officially announced. Archbishop Hinsley succeeded the late Cardinal Francis Bourne last year as Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in England.

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FURTHER CHINESE RETREAT

Counter-Attack Yesterday was of but Brief Duration—American Leaving Nanking—Coast Blockade

PARIS, Nov. 18: (CP)—The French Foreign Office and the Japanese embassy formally denied today that France had received an "ultimatum" from Japan to cease transporting war materials to China over the French-owned railroad from Indo-China to Yunnan. Senator Henry Berenger, chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, who declared in a speech that Japan had "warned" France, still insisted his statement held good although he had not used the word "ultimatum."

SHANGHAI, Nov. 18: (CP)—Chinese defenders of General Chiang Kai Shek's "Hindenburg Line" between Shanghai and Nanking were retreating again today after a brief and desperate rearguard counter-attack yesterday which, together with heavy rains, slowed up the Japanese advance toward Nanking for a time.

Japanese army spokesmen announced today that Japanese troops were driving to break through the Chinese "Hindenburg Line" and had captured one gate of the walled city of Kashing, southern keystone of the line. For twenty-four hours the Chinese had held their own along the length of defenses to which they retreated after Shanghai fell into Japanese hands. The Japanese were, however, unable to push forward on the northern end of the Chinese defenses.

The evacuation of Nanking continues. Fifty United States citizens were today awaiting the arrival of an American gunboat to transport them to safety. Nanking is still technically the seat of government but senior officials who remain are ready to leave on short notice.

The Japanese announced last night that they would undertake a blockade of the entire Chinese coast in order to prevent the entry of any materials of war into China.

Brotherhood At Bella Bella In Annual Meeting

The Native Brotherhood of British Columbia announces that the annual convention of the Brotherhood will be held at Bella Bella on November 30 as originally planned. Arrangements have been made for the accommodation of all visitors and delegates at Bella Bella.

Alfred Adams, president of the Brotherhood, Oliver Adams, Ivan Adams, James Collison and Wilfrid Parnell arrived in the city on the Prince John yesterday from Massett, being on their way to the convention.

The Hazelton branch of the Native Brotherhood has named Vice-President Charles Patsy and Secretary Charles Clifford Jr. as delegates to the convention. The delegates will leave Hazelton next Thursday for Prince Rupert enroute to Bella Bella where they will place a number of grievances before the convention.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Premier Pattullo is in agreement with Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King that the only effective way to deal with unemployment insurance is for the federal government to handle it. In order to do so this it will be necessary for the provinces to agree to the jurisdiction of the Dominion in the matter of employment. The two largest labor organizations in Canada are in agreement with the government in its efforts to bring about this much needed change at the earliest possible moment.

LOAN TO ITALY

Italy is needing money and needing it badly and a loan from Great Britain is being discussed in London. Germany is also badly in need of ready cash and would like to touch some wealthy nation such as United States or Britain. It is said in London that the Vatican has been backing Mussolini's notes for some time past but that just recently this backing has stopped. Evidently the Vatican does not agree with Italy's virtual endorsement of German "paganism." So the European dictators are having their troubles. The shortage of money will be a very powerful factor in keeping them from entering any dispute that may arise between Russia and Japan. They could do little anyway. If they behave they may get the loans for which they are looking.

SAD MESS IN SPAIN

Spain is still in a sad mess. While the country is at war, the people continue to go about their business as if nothing unusual was taking place. Naturally travel is confined to the areas controlled by either side but each side has its seaport so supplies from overseas can enter the country.

What a pity it is that some strong power cannot go in and take charge and tell the leaders to go home and get to work!

FRATERNAL OBLIGATIONS

Editor, Daily News:
 In yesterday's editorial speaking of fraternal obligations you say you are wondering how often, if ever, these sacred obligations are remembered. said "Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" and yet too many of those who have been chosen to represent the powers of church and state have left out such words as duty, justice and charity from their lexicon of speech.

Speaking of duty the French virgin heroine said "When God has told you what you ought to do, He has already told you what you can do." So we find the small word "duty" gives us the right to do and the power to do that which we ought to do.

Speaking of liberty Goethe said: "Any liberty that does not require an additional self-mastery is a ruinous liberty."

And again we read: "Faith without works is nothing."

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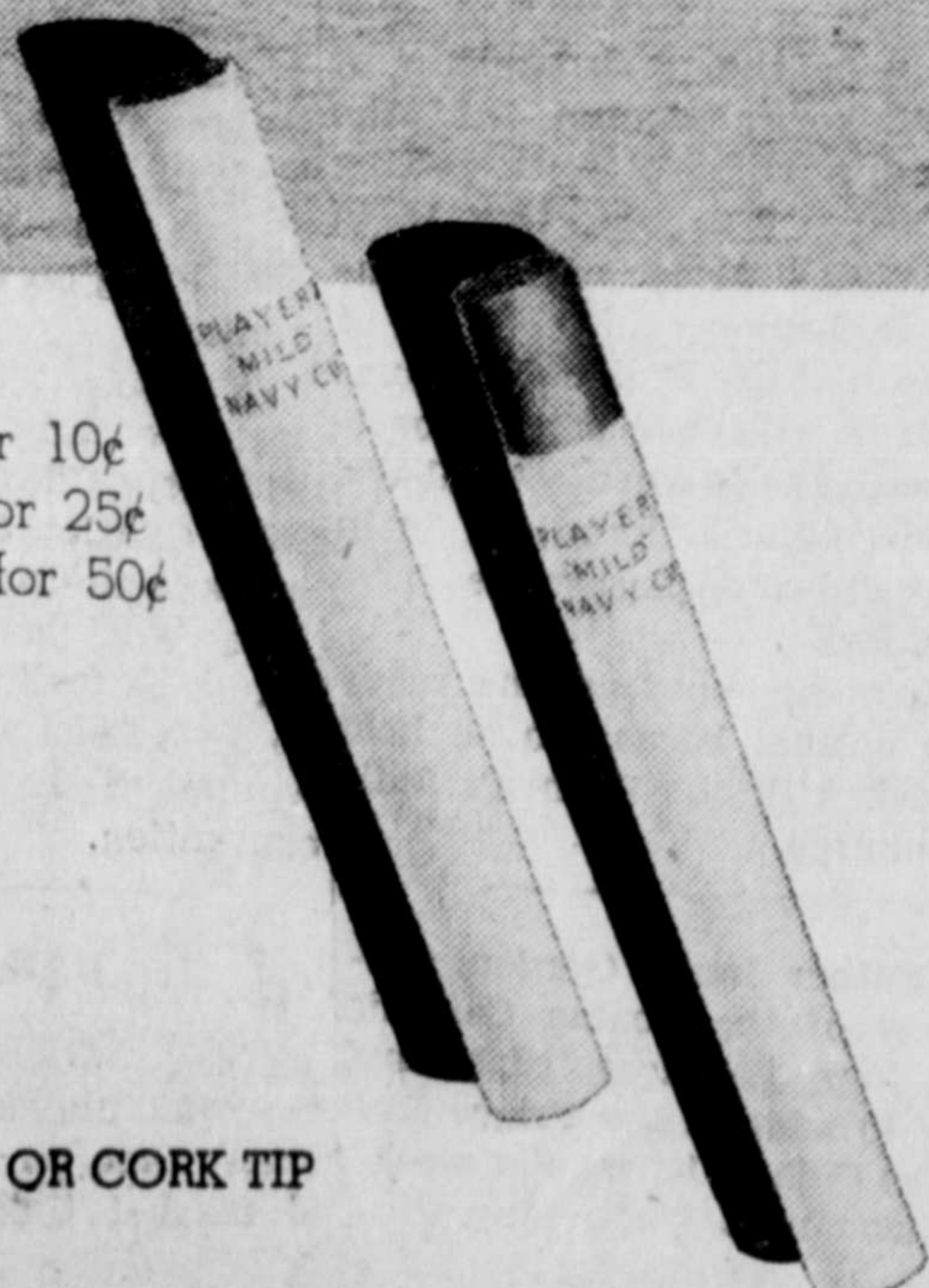

SHOULD BE PREPARED

Is Best Way to Avoid Such Horrors as Those of Oriental War, Declares Winston Churchill—House Adopts Bill

LONDON, Nov. 18: (CP)—Speaking in Parliament, Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill said the way to prevent such horrors as were being enacted in the war in the Orient was to be so obviously prepared for them as to make the crimes not worth while committing. Churchill expressed alarm at the vulnerable character of Great British cities such as London.

George Lansbury, veteran Labor leader, said it was nothing short of blasphemy that, in these days of so-called civilization, it was necessary that a country should have to protect itself from such attacks. The government's air defence bill passed the House. It goes so far as to provide for evacuation of the British government in event of air attack.

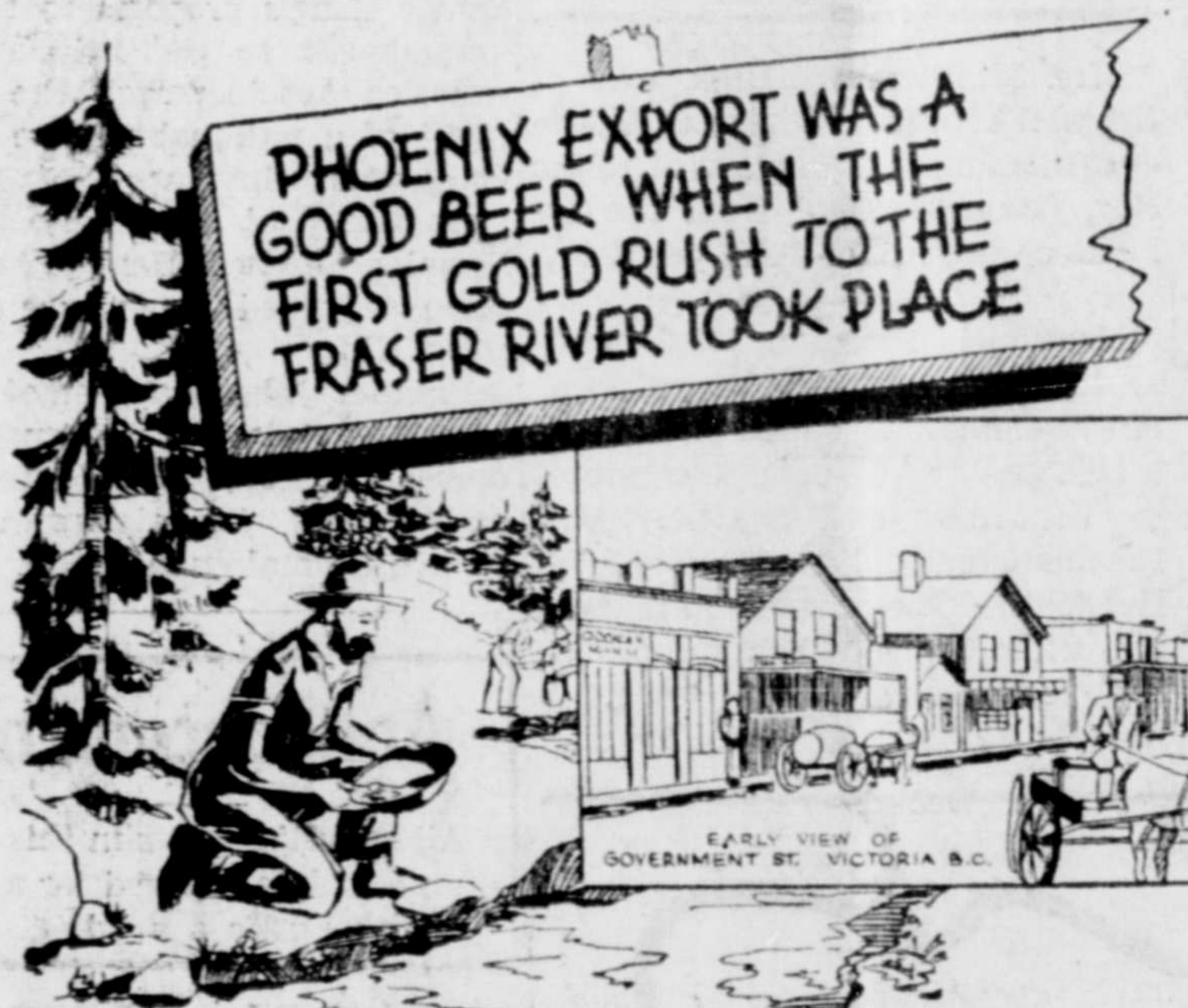

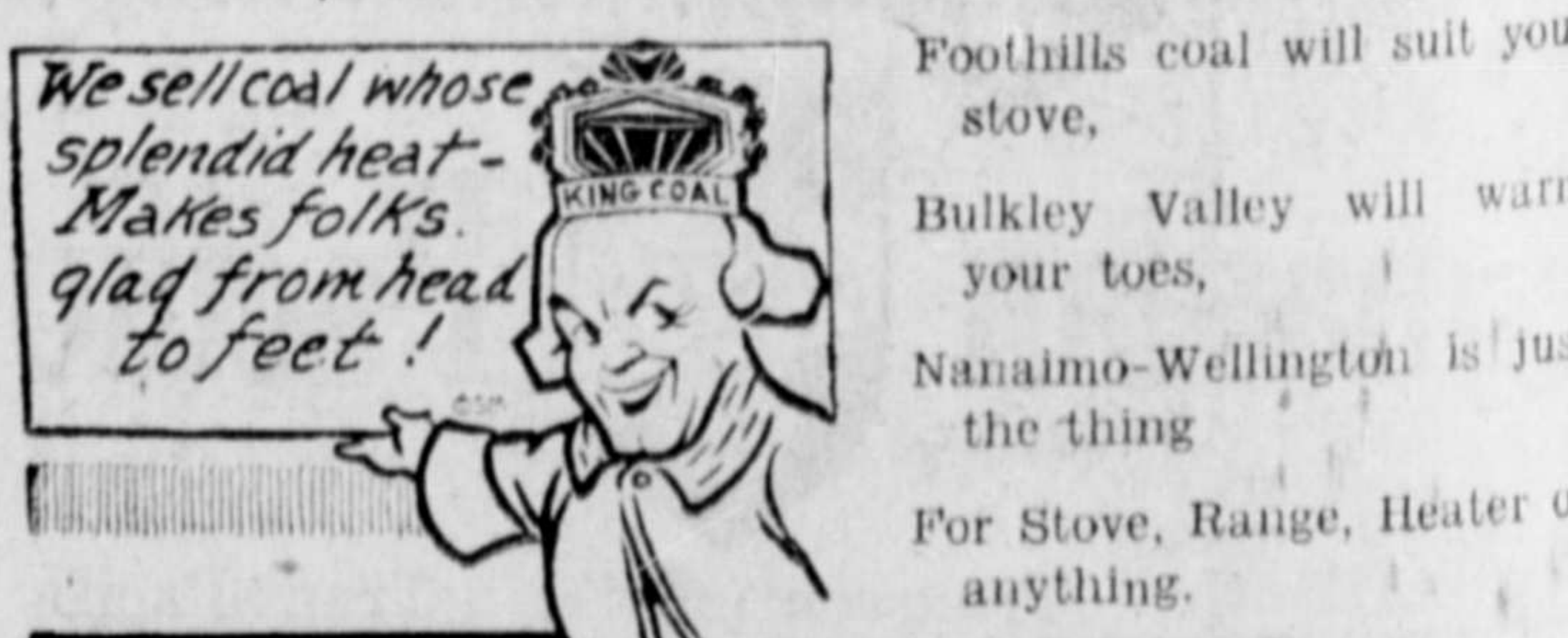
