END OF CIVIL WAR IS SEEN

WHOLESALE EXECUTIONS

Russian Oppositionists Lined Up Right After Trial Without Chance of Appeal

MOSCOW, May 21: (CP)—The executions of 44 oppositionists at Svobodny on May 9, as announced yesterday in an official communique, were the first of the type to be carried out since Joseph Stalin, Secretary-General of the Communist party and dictator of Russia, last March called for greater vigilance to wipe out spying and sabotage, declaring that the "enemy must be exterminated mercilessly."

LONDON, May 21:—British financial circles report that Japan is arranging for a large loan in London with which to purchase British machinery and manufactured goods.

EDMONTON, May 21:—Major C. H. Douglas may come from England again this year to assist in a new effort to establish Social Credit in Alberta, it was stated here yesterday.

CANDIDATE IS SPEAKER

Capt J. Bowen Colthurst Addresses Meeting in Moose Hall And is Critical

"We show the way out," declared Capt. John Bowen Colthurst to an audience at the Moose Hall last evening. "Issue your own credit!"

Capt. Colthurst divided his address into two parts. He spent most of the first part of the evening in belaboring the Prime Minister. At the end of that period a collection was taken to help defray the cost of the hall and, just before the collection half the audience left. The other half a hundred remained to hear the exposition of Social Credit.

The speaker expressed appreciation of Dr. Lyle Telford taking up the study of money. That authority had suggested to him that Social Creditors should not take part in politics. In this he was following the idea of Major Douglas in England where an effort was being made to influence members on both sides to study social credit. In Canada, however, there was a difficulty of nationality. This country had ten parliament and the only way to put over social credit was to take it up provincially.

Mr. Colthurst paid a compliment to Hugh Savage M.L.A. of Duncan. He was an exponent of the Oxford Group Movement and of the British Israelite theory. He was a straight and honorable man who thought all changes should be changes of the heart. He, Colthurst, suggested that what was needed was a political change.

World Wide Movement

Social Credit was started in 1918 by Major Douglas. In Alberta Social Credit had not yet been carried out. The movement in this province had nothing to do with Alberta. It was a world-wide movement. There were at the present time seventeen social credit members in the Dominion House.

"The cause of all our troubles is private ownership of credit," declared the speaker. "We are producing more than we can use and the people have no money to buy." There was liberty in everything in this country except financial liberty. Liberty of the subject was the first principle of Social Credit. Life was intended to be lived in a broader and fuller way.

The Captain facetiously remarked at the beginning of his address that he had done no work for his money and he had no intention of doing any. He read an editorial article from the Daily News and expressed the opinion that our democracy was based on constructive criticism. He referred to facing the Premier in his own home town and paid his respects to the press which he suggested was a "lied press." The United States, he claimed, had changed from being the land of the free and the home of the brave to "the land of the spree and the home of the knave."

In the course of the criticism of Mr. Pattullo, he said he was one of those who helped place him in power. At the time of the last election he had been vice-president of the Sooke Liberal Association. Mr. Pattullo, when in opposition, once advised the government of the day to use the national credit to get the province out of the hole.

Capt. Colthurst read the Liberal platform of three years ago and blamed the Premier for breaking his pledges. Joseph Lee Thomasson presided.

STRIKE END EXPECTED LONDON—Decision of Allied Street Car Workers, as officially announced yesterday, not to support the strike of 25,000 bus conductors and drivers is considered in responsible circles to mean a speedy collapse of the bus work stoppage.

VICTORY FOR LEWIS PITTSBURG—Union labor forces of John L. Lewis emerged triumphant by better than two to one margin in balloting of 24,000 workers of the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation in the biggest industrial election ever supervised by the United States government.

NEW RADIO STATIONS REGINA—Three new 50,000 watt radio stations—two in Quebec and one in Ontario—will be established by the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Corporation, it was announced here yesterday by L. W. Brockington, chairman of the Corporation. The Corporation will operate all larger stations in Canada. Private stations will be limited to 1000 watts power.

TO RACE TO PARIS

Jimmy Mattern and Dick Merrill May Start From Toronto—Lindbergh Silent

TORONTO, May 21:—Jimmy Mattern, noted American long distance flier, stated here yesterday that arrangements had been commenced for himself and Dick Merrill to start a trans-Atlantic air race from here to Paris this summer in connection with the Paris Exposition. Permission to start the race from New York has been denied by the American authorities on the grounds of unnecessary risk. The race is to be held as a celebration of the tenth anniversary of the crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Lindbergh Unperturbed

WEALD, Kent, Eng., May 21: (CP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh yesterday studiously avoided any fuss or celebration on the tenth anniversary of his solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean from New York to Paris. "I did it. Why should I celebrate it?" he was quoted by a friend as saying.

TALK WITH INDIVIDUALS

Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau Does Not Favor General Monetary Conference

WASHINGTON, May 21: (CP)—United State Treasury authorities disclosed yesterday that Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau is opposed to any general monetary conference with other nations. He thinks that stabilization should be worked out in talks with individual nations.

VICTORIA, May 21:—Adam Bell, deputy minister of labor, yesterday announced an increase in the minimum wage for janitors and janitresses in British Columbia.

Italy and Germany are Ready To Withdraw From Spain And Co-operate in New Truce Plan

NO HERRING- REAL ISSUE

C. C. F. Could and Would Extend Franchise to Orientals, Says Vancouver Speaker

VANCOUVER, June 21:—The question of extending the vote to Orientals born in British Columbia is not a "red herring" but a "live issue" in the present provincial election campaign, declared Tom McInnis in a speech here last night. The C. C. F. could and would grant the franchise to British Columbia born Orientals at the first session should it be returned to power. Mr. McInnis predicted. The next step would be to extend it to Orientals born in any British possession including Hong Kong. Mr. McInnis referred to numerous declarations of the C. C. F. that it would enfranchise Orientals. Any province had the right to decide who should vote without reference to Ottawa. Mr. McInnis declared. In his opinion, although he had every respect for the Orientals, the time had not yet come for them to be granted the franchise.

Mr. McInnis further asserted that the C. C. F. would take the farms away from the farmers as well as manufacturing and industrial plants and turn them over to an army of political bureaucrats. The result would be confusion, suffering and possibly disaster. He warned the people against being led to their undoing by Marxian fanatics.

Official Protest At Cleric's Speech

Berlin Communicates With Washington Over Utterances Of Cardinal Mundelein

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 21: (CP)—Official protest has been delivered to the United States government by Dr. Hans Dieckhoff, German ambassador at Washington, at the anti-Hitler speech of Cardinal George Mundelein of Chicago who gave his opinion in regard to Chancellor Adolf Hitler and Minister of Propaganda Joseph Goebbels in no uncertain terms. Cardinal Mundelein made his remarks in the course of a diocesan speech in which he declared that German trials of priests and lay brothers on charge of immorality constituted propaganda worse than atrocity tales of the Great War.

Mussolini Reported to Have Notified Insurgents That He Is Withdrawing—How Peace Would Be Brought by British

LONDON, May 21: (CP)—Simultaneously with reports that British proposals for an armistice in Spain were meeting with no opposition from Italy and Germany, Reuters News Agency dispatches from Gibraltar today said that reports were current there that Premier Benito Mussolini had informed the Spanish insurgents that Italian troops will be withdrawn from Spain. Associated Press quoted "well informed diplomatic personages" as saying that both Italy and Germany are now ready to join in a general discussion of a British scheme for an armistice in Spain and for the withdrawal of foreign volunteers. For several weeks the British government, through embassies and legations abroad, has been sounding out the attitude of various powers on the armistice plan.

The plan, it is said in Paris, calls for dispatching of international commissions to Spain and gradual application of the truce until it covers all government and insurgent-held territory simultaneously, disarming and sending home foreign soldiers.

Fighting Continues

HENDAYE, May 21: (CP)—A Spanish insurgent broadcast announced that incendiary bombs dropped during an insurgent-Basque government air clash had fired the Basque yacht Glozokozarra carrying refugees out of Bilbao. Other insurgent reports said that the ship was carrying several high Basque officials.

Meanwhile on land militiamen went over the top in a series of stabbing counter-attacks to beat the insurgent invaders back from the city's last fortification line.

Captain Hatfield Is Back in Canada

Reparations Fraud Trial Opens In Ottawa, Being Adjourned Until May 28

OTTAWA, May 21:—Capt. Freeman Hatfield, extradited from the United States, appeared before a magistrate in Ottawa yesterday on a charge of fraudulently collecting \$78,000 in reparations for the torpedoing of his ship Gypsum Queen by the Germans off the Irish coast during the Great War and was remanded until May 28. Captain Hatfield has just been brought to Canada after fighting extradition for two years.

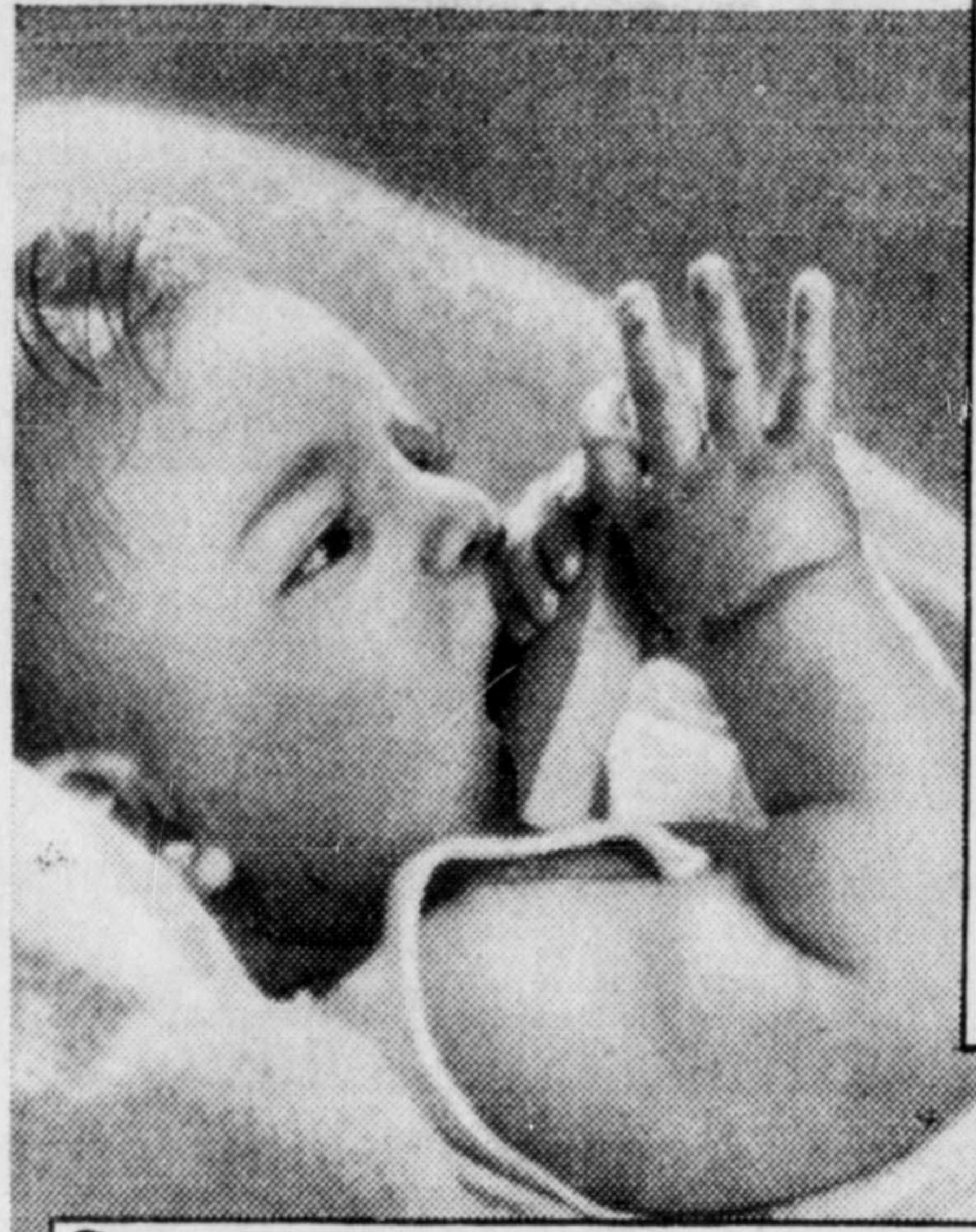

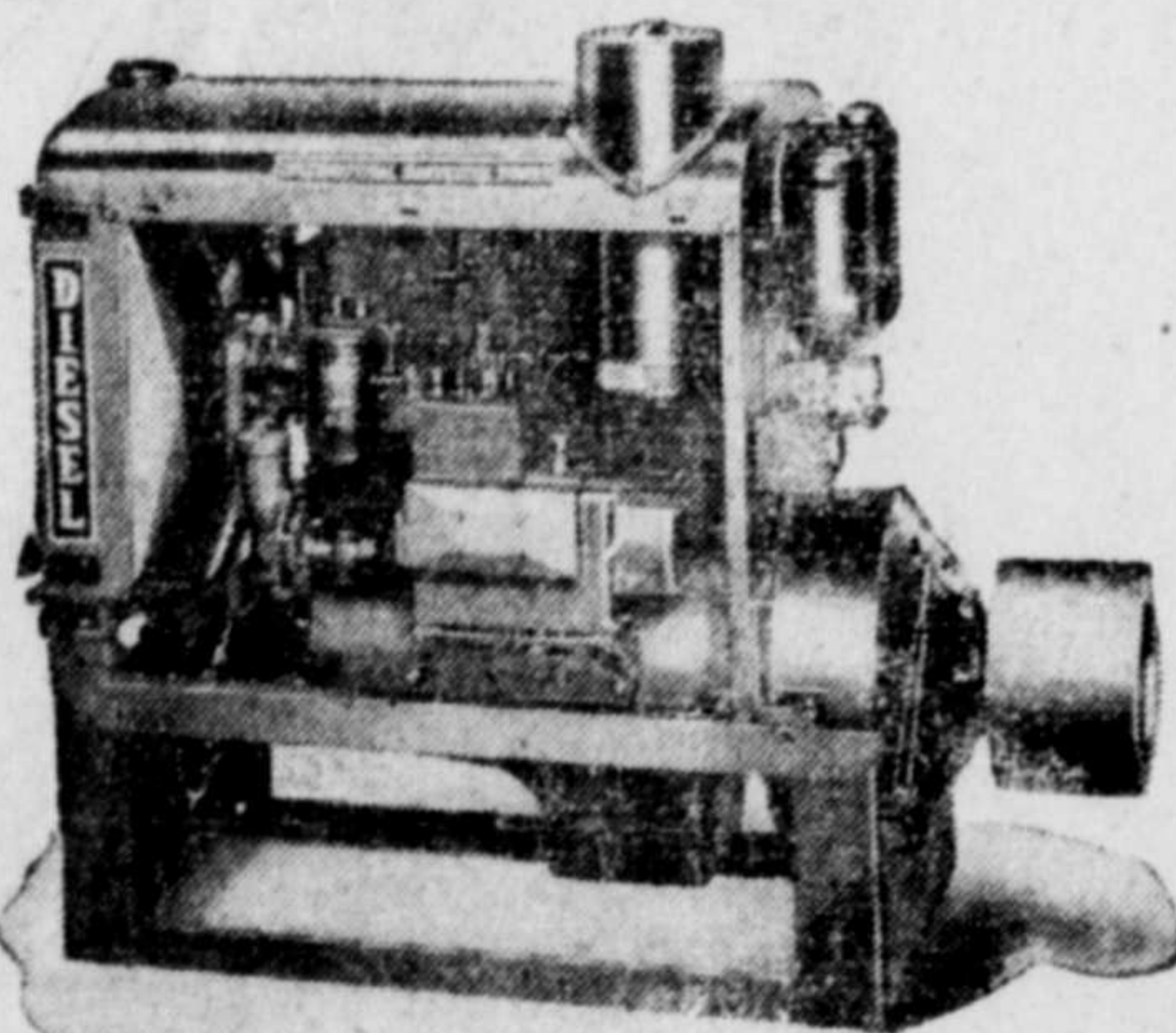

- 1.—He gave \$1,000 of his own money in the early days of the city in order to keep the telephone franchise from being alienated to a private company. This is today our best paying municipal asset.
- 2.—He secured the Woodworth Lake water rights for the city when the Tories had alienated the same to a former president of the Vancouver Conservative Association.
- 3.—He insisted upon the building of the present \$500,000 Court House against adverse criticism from all over the province and when southern political interests used all their power to defeat him.
- 4.—He advocated and inaugurated the building of the new trunk road out of the city, upon which approximately a half million dollars has been expended to date.
- 5.—He put through a provincial act allowing the city to refund its bonded indebtedness at a lower rate of interest which resulted in an immense saving to the taxpayers of Prince Rupert.
- 6.—His government has given the new and valuable post office site to the Dominion government in order to expedite the building of the new post office building in a proper location.
- 7.—He has caused to be voted a large sum of money for the erection of an ore sampling plant in the city; something desired by prospectors and miners all over the north.
- 8.—He has for years worked hard to secure a pulp mill for Prince Rupert and has just recently placed a reserve on sufficient timber adjacent to the city to supply a 500-ton pulp mill for 30 years.
- 9.—He granted the request of the fishing interests of the city and created the present halibut marketing scheme which provides for the orderly marketing of the catch of the halibut fleet. This should result in better prices and a greater measure of prosperity to the fishing industry.
