

In 1895, Burns threw the chamjion, Tom Jenkins, for the heavyweight title, but held it only two years. Not long after, he discovered Frank Gotch behind a plow in lowa and introduced him into the nat game with such success that Jotch ruled the heavyweight ranks for many years.

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


