Suggested Cure For Subversive Activity

We are publishing a letter today from Rev. E. J. Springett, Dominion Commissioner of British Israel World Federation, who claims that atheism is the result of the teaching of evolution and modernistic doctrines. He would have people give up their beliefs as the only way out of the difficulties which confront us. He urges a period of national repentance and prayer.

We have no desire to annoy those people who take the view that absolute faith in the scriptures is the cure-all for all our national difficulties. There are, doubtless, many who believe this and who object to the teachings of the theory of evolution and other modernistic ideas. Old Paul Kruger, doubtless, believed he was right when he steadfastly affirmed his belief that the world was flat and that any other teaching was modernistic, subversive and contrary to the scriptures. We have no objection to anybody believing these things or even believing that the moon is made of green cheese but we object to having these ideas thrust upon us in the name of God and humanity.

If we are to have a sane democracy we must be ready and willing to allow every person to exercise his own freedom in the matter of religious or scientific beliefs. We are thankful for the British Empire because in it we are allowed this freedom of thought and a right to keep pace with the findings of scientific students. Anything which suggests that the human mind should be bounded between the covers of one book or that the only wise and inspired men were those who lived from two to four thousand years ago should be frowned down upon in a free country. Anyone who believes this should have perfect freedom to do so but those who think otherwise should also be given freedom of thought and expression without being branded as atheists or fomenters of subversive movements.

Doubtless, the minister of justice is a good Catholic and believes in the ministrations of that church to help him in his work in behalf of humanity. Because some others believe in other doctrines or movements does not detract from their worth. All have their place, even Mr. Springett, but we do not like to be the means of over-emphasizing any one doctrine without pointing out that there are others, just as likely to be true and effective.

Many very good people will be glad to hear of a spiritual awakening in the country but that does not mean that they will revert to the mental processes of the middle ages. The religious heritage of the present day is one of advancement, not retrogression. We do not believe that this age is a bad one or that the efforts to secure better living conditions are inspired by the Devil. We do not even believe that Communists, Atheists, Russians, Socialists or even the members of the C. C. F. are bad people. Neither are Conservatives or Liberals all bad. They are searchers like ourselves and possibly they may help us to find that for which we are all looking.

Mr. Lapointe's suggested cure for subversive activities is that there should be a campaign of education and that all classes should unite to improve conditions so as to make impossible any campaign of violence such as that urged by the Communists and their allies in this and other countries.

The Letter Box

AWAKENING PUBLIC OPINION

Editor, Daily News:

One of the clearest evidences of the awakening of public opinion against the menace of subversive movements so active in Canada and throughout the world at the present time is given in the statement by the Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, in the House of Commons on March 30. In his statement the Minister of Justice clearly indicated that one of the bulwarks of modern civilization is the form of justice administered in the British Commonwealth of Nations and that sane administration of that law is one of the best antidotes of the evils arising from subversive propaganda.

He stated further that the best way to combat evil propaganda is to spread propaganda based on principles of truth and righteousness and he recommended a league should be formed by people who believe in peace, order and good government.

He also said that outstanding representatives of the church, labor and industry should combine to preserve the religious heritage of Canada against atheism and communism and to preserve our modern social order against the attacks of subversive influences.

We are in complete sympathy with the sentiments expressed by the Minister of Justice, and would point out that the British-Israel-World Federation (Canada), with branches throughout the Dominion, is an institution which has been doing more than any other agency to promote the spread of such constructive propaganda as he suggests.

We go deeper into the matter than the Minister of Justice for, recognizing as he does the value of British institutions based on proper administration of British law and order, we state unequivocally that the only means by which the stability of our modern social order can be attained, and the evils so prevalent among us be eliminated, is by a return to the application and administration of the Divine Law.

The suggestion that the Minister of Justice makes regarding the combination of various organizations to form a league to oppose fascism and communism is liable to meet defeat before it starts for the simple reason that a great many members of the very institutions to which he appeals no longer believe in the Divine Law and its application and, as a matter of fact, are largely responsible for the spread of atheism as a result of the teaching of evolution and of modernistic doctrines with regard to the Bible, which is the Word of God written.

The British-Israel-World Federation is proclaiming, in season and out of season, the integrity of the Holy Scriptures in both the Old and the New Testaments and affirm there is no other way out of the difficulties which confront us except by a return to an absolute faith in these same Scriptures.

This federation has circulated a petition throughout the Dominion of Canada, which has been signed by many thousands of people, requesting the government to appoint a period of national repentance and prayer and, following this, to make a determined effort to put into operation the Divine system of economic principles. The application of this system would immediately eliminate those conditions in our social order which are the feeding ground for all the subversive influences among us.

Sudbury has now won two straight in the best three out of five game series. The Tigers took the first game Thursday night by a score of 4 to 1.

In the first period of Saturday's game North Battleford scored two goals to one for Sudbury. Each team scored once in the second period. Murphy Chamberlain scored the first three goals for Sudbury, Jim Dewey, the fourth, Bright the fifth and Mel Hill, the sixth.

The Calgary Arena was packed to the rafters with spectators. The third game takes place tonight.
