SELLING MONEY

In business generally when a house is overstocked it reduces prices, thus enabling customers to purchase goods with the amount of money available. The banks sell money but the charges are high and the restrictions severe. The result is that many people do not borrow who otherwise might do so. The general manager of the Bank of Montreal, Jackson Dodds, says his bank would like to loan more money than it is at present doing. We humbly suggest that the price of money at the present time is very low but bank discount rates have not been reduced in the same ratio as interest on bonds and other securities. The result is that people cannot afford to borrow from the banks and that accounts for the fact that bank loans are down.

Of course everyone knows how a banker should conduct his business just as most people know exactly how a newspaper should be edited. The only ignorant people are those benighted men and women who have spent the best parts of their lives trying to learn the business and who presumably have failed and so have been promoted to become heads of departments or in a few cases hold the highest positions.

The bank report published in this newspaper Monday contained a good deal of interesting information and those who have not read it would do well to look up the paper and peruse it. A bank manager has to keep his fingers on the pulse of the nation and, in doing so, fits himself to speak with authority on many subjects.

A TENSE SITUATION

The civil war in Spain seems to have sunk into insignificance in face of the struggle going on in China with the possibility of other powers being drawn into the conflict. Noboyd in Canada wants war but the British people will fight if they have to and there will be no half-hearted struggle if it is forced on them. Evidently it will be no lone fight for Britain, United States and France seem likely to make common cause in the event of anything untoward happening as a result of the aggressive action of any or all of the dictatorships.

THE DEFENSE PROGRAM

Much interest seems to have been taken locally in the defense program mentioned by Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of defense, at Toronto but there was some disappointment that Prince Rupert was not mentioned as one of the points to receive immediate attention. If something is not done very soon Prince Rupert will be the only important point on the coast undefended.






