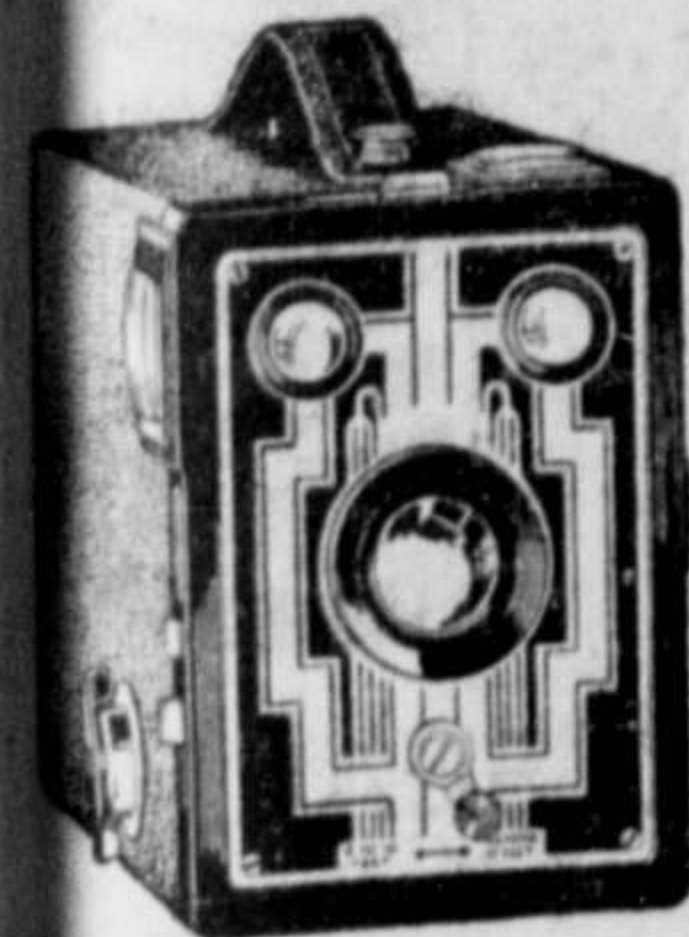
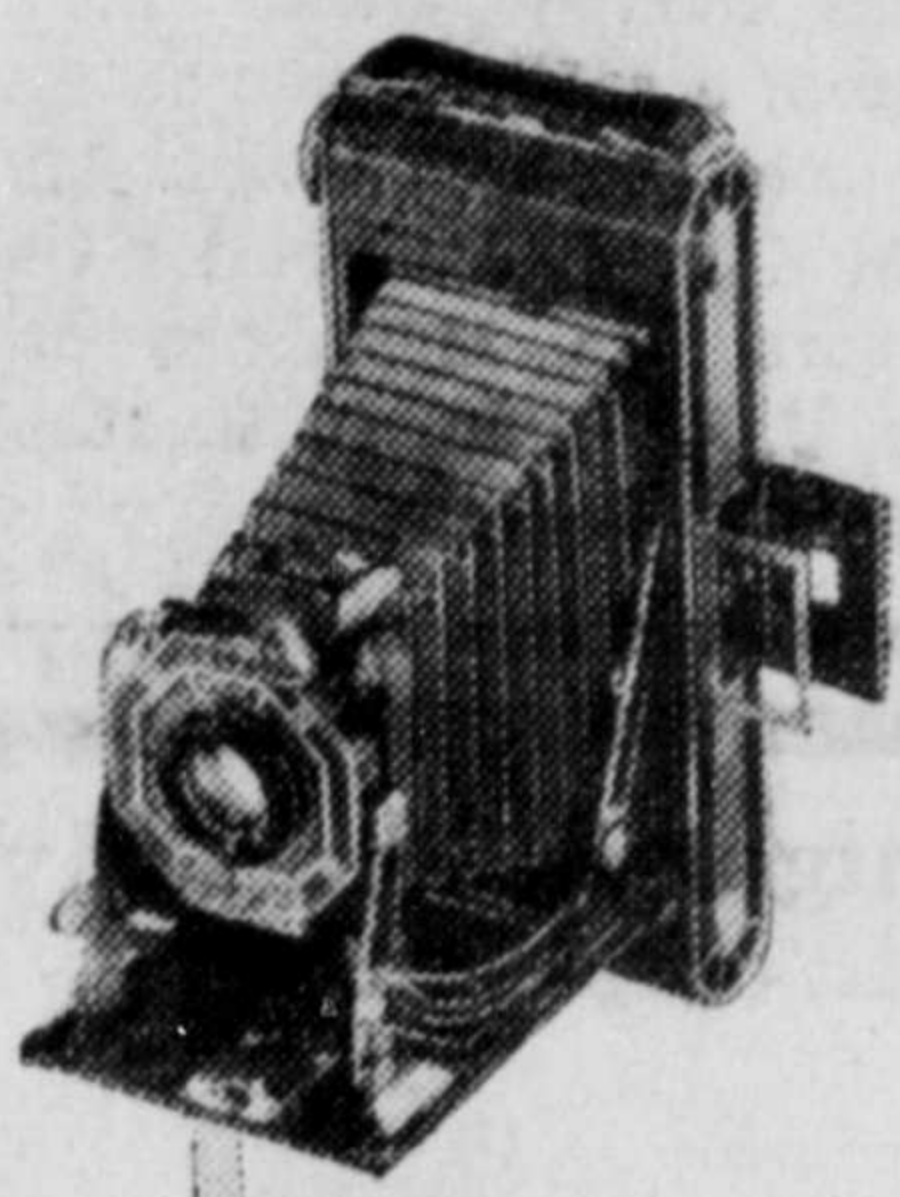

GREAT CARL WINS AGAIN

New York Giants' Pitching Star Wins Twenty-Third League Game on Monday

NEW YORK, May 26: (CP)—The great Carl Hubbell pitched his twenty-third straight victory Monday as the New York Giants won a close six to five decision over the National League leading Pittsburgh Pirates at Pittsburgh.

In the American League New York is also cutting quite a figure, the Yankees, playing at their stadium yesterday, defeating Detroit to improve their hold on first place with a lead of one game and a half over the Philadelphia Athletics who lost to the Cleveland Indians at Shibe Park.
