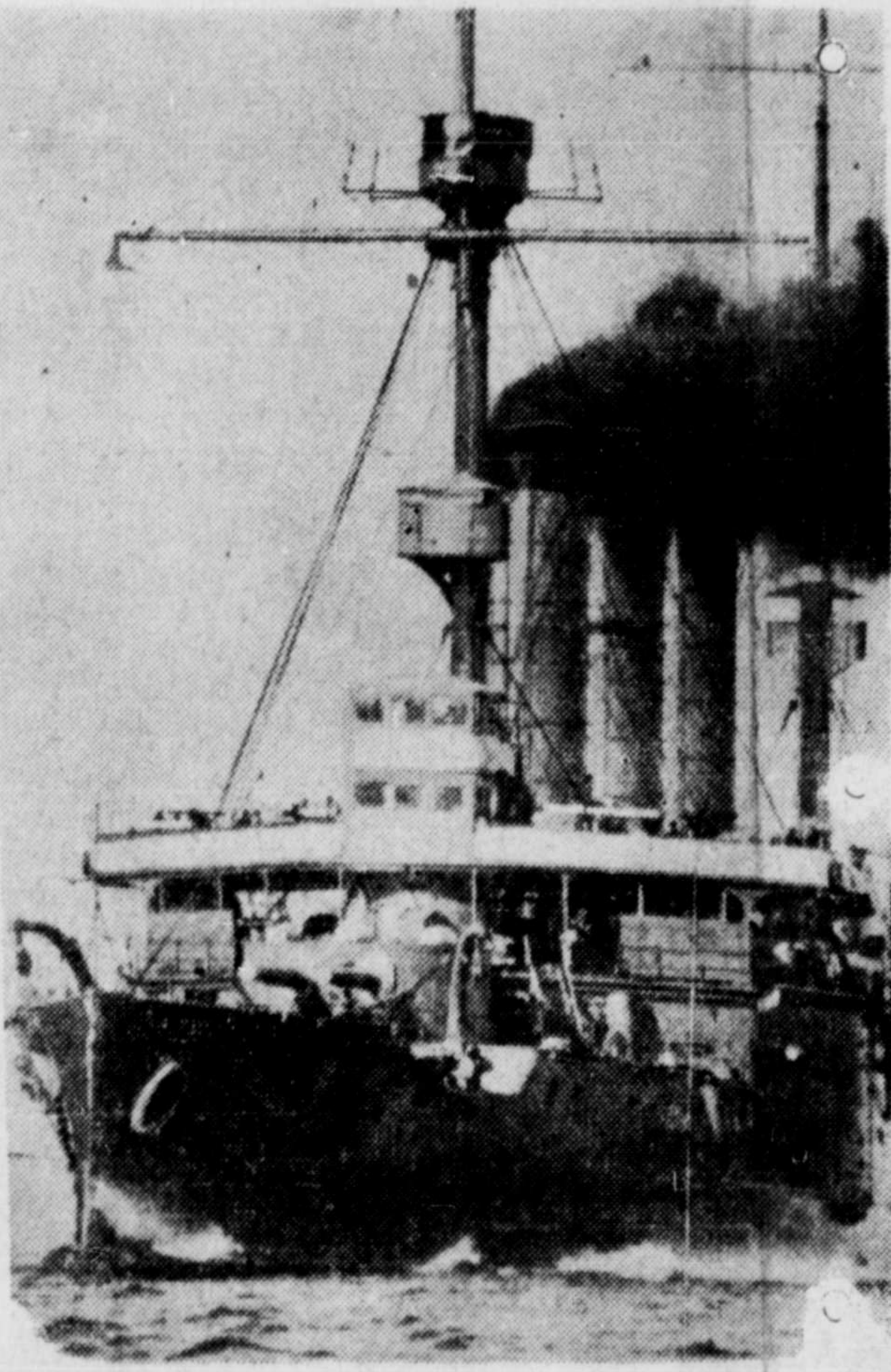

# British Cruiser Danae Is Damaged

CHINESE CAPTURE AND SCUTTLE SIX JAPANESE MERCHANT SHIPS



Dare-devil Chinese forgetful of the danger they ran made a second swift and surprise attack against Japanese shipping and warships in the Whangpoo River, when they seized and scuttled six Japanese merchant ships which had been anchored at the Japanese Nisen Kaisha wharf. Several days before Chinese naval cadets had torpedoed the Japanese flagship Idzumo (right), causing damage which forced the moving of the cruiser down the Whangpoo to join the battle fleet anchored off the Japanese coasts. The seizing of Japanese merchant ships was accomplished when picked companies of Chinese rushed the ships, sailed them into the emergency boom and scuttled them just above Pootung, making the upper reaches of the Whangpoo impenetrable. At the left, above, is Shanghai's famous bund on the Whangpoo River which has been under fire from Japanese warships and artillery.

## Warship Well Known At Prince Rupert Is Latest To Be Hit In Fighting Off Coast Of Orient

Damaged Today Along With Other Vessels — Another Terrifying Series of Fires in Shanghai as Conflict Proceeds

SHANGHAI, Sept. 1: (CP)—Two British warships and a British merchant vessel were hit by shrapnel today as Japanese naval authorities issued a warning to all foreign shipping to steer clear of naval concentrations in Whangpoo and Yangste Rivers. The cruiser Danae, flying the flag of Admiral Sir Charles Little of the China Station, the sloop Falmouth and the coastal steamship Shengking, were all damaged during Sino-Japanese air fights.

### ARE URGED TO DEPART

Spanish Insurgents do Not Care To Keep Frenchmen in Their Territory

ST. JEAN-DE-LUZ, France, Sept. 1: (CP)—Spanish insurgent sources say that all French residents have been warned to prepare to leave insurgent territory in Spain on a day's notice in retaliation for France's action in ousting a group of insurgents living on the French Basque coast.

A terrifying series of great new fires roared in Shanghai tonight. One blaze in the Soochow Creek area faced the international settlement.

Japanese destroyers pumped shells into Chapel and Kiangwan sectors while planes bombed Chinese positions.

From Washington came word that five thousand United States troops had been sent from San Diego to Shanghai to protect American interests in Shanghai and that President Roosevelt considered the situation so grave that he had cancelled a proposed trip to the west coast.

The cruiser Danae is well known in Prince Rupert, having visited this port a few years ago in the course of a coastal cruise.

### MARKET IS ALL UPSET

Many Adverse Factors Affect Trading in New York

NEW YORK, Sept. 1:—Adverse factors in the stock market included the Sino-Japan crisis, threats of an extra congress session, declines in railroad income, and a drop in some commodities. Favorable news was ignored. It included taking up of negotiations on rail wages by a federal mediation board, a gain in steel operations, record electricity output and an unexpected rise in car loadings.

Based on hauling weights at the local Fish Exchange, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of August this year totalled 1,543,300 pounds as compared with 1,468,800 pounds in the same month last year.

Canadian landings this August were 731,800 pounds as against 846,200 pounds last August while the American landings this August were 811,500 pounds in comparison with 622,600 pounds.

The payroll of 10,320 reporting firms showed 1,143,109 persons employed on August 1 as against 1,134,466 on July 1.

### NEW CAR IS GOING EAST

Overhead Type of Freezer Leaves Tonight on Experimental Trip

It is in the nature of an experimental shipment and will be accompanied by O. C. ONE LONG WAIL

Judging from the reports in various country newspapers, there is one long long wail going up because none of the localities received as much money as they expected for road work.

In a new country money is badly needed for roads in every corner of the province as well as money for surfacing and keeping up the trunk roads. It is for the engineers in consultation with the heads of departments to decide how much shall go to trunk highways and how much to local roads.

Locally there was a time when highway work was shut down. There was no money so we could not get any. Very little protest was made at the time to the Tolmie administration because we all knew there was no money.

Take another example. In Alberni the government has been doing some surfacing and this year more was expected than was received. Costs were higher than was expected and a delegation was sent to Victoria to try to induce the government to change its mind.

The whole question of the allocation of road funds is very difficult but, after the needs of each community have been studied and compared with the needs of other communities, none but the public works authorities are in a position to decide if still more money can be expended in any particular locality.

AUSTRIAN POLITICS

Politics in Austria is rather a strenuous occupation just now. Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg is a dictator. He allows monarchists to publicly advocate their policies but national socialists are disallowed.

Visitors to Austria return to tell us how they like the country and the people. They are not inconvenienced by the fact that telegraph, telephone and post office officials are bound to report conversations or correspondence which may be detrimental to the present regime.

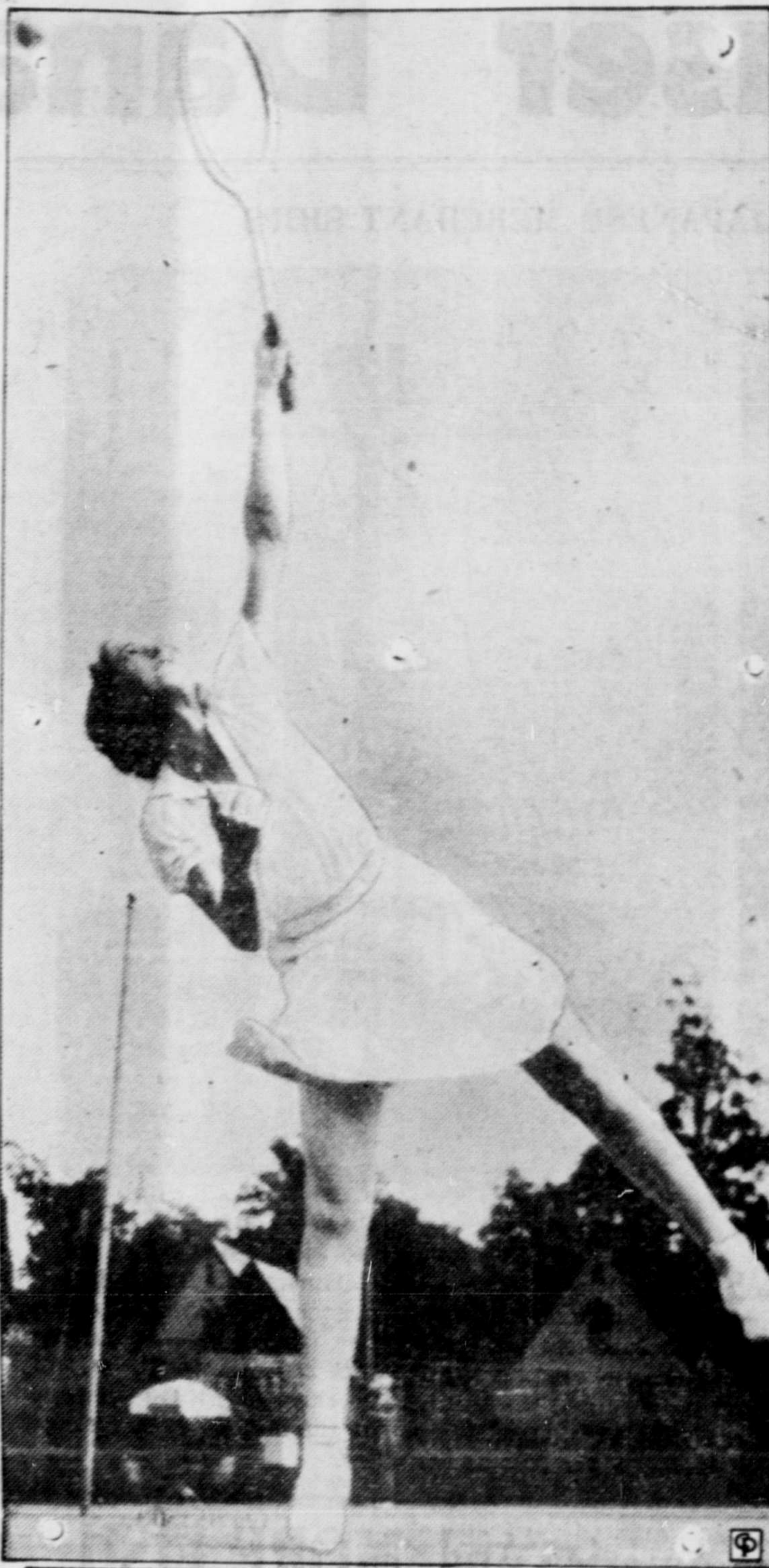

NEW FIGHT IS MOOTED BOWLING RESUMED

Promoter Mike Jacobs Thinks Louis and Farr Might Draw Million Dollar Gate

NEW YORK, Sept. 1: (CP)—Following the great showing on Monday night of Tommy Farr, the Welsh challenger, in all but toppling Joe Louis from his world's heavyweight championship throne, promoter Mike Jacobs talked yesterday of a return bout next June (which he predicted would net over \$1,000,000).

Joe Louis, wearing dark glasses to hide his swollen eyes, said he had hurt his right hand in the third round and had used his left exclusively thereafter.

Farr hurt his hand also. The British fighter had been on the offensive throughout the battle and, even at the last, bleeding under the eyes and from the forehead, charged into Louis. The last was one of the five rounds the Welshman was credited with winning.

Pritchard's time yesterday was four hours, nineteen minutes and twenty-eight seconds as compared with four hours, thirty-eight minutes and sixteen seconds for the ten miles in 1935.

The win was worth \$2500. Bill Nolan of Chelsea, Massachusetts, came second to win \$750 while Gianni Gambi of Italy was third.
