## NAME NEW GOVERNOR

Choice of Successor to Col. Primrose of Alberta is Expected To Be Made Soon

EDMONTON, March 19: (CP)—A new Lieutenant Governor is expected to be appointed immediately to succeed Hon. Philip Carteret Primrose, who died on Wednesday. Veteran police officer, magistrate and colorful public figure for over half a century, Col. Primrose was a pioneer of the west and lived through the turbulent days of early prairie development.

When the Yukon Gold Rush was under way, Col. Primrose, then with the Royal Canadian Northwest Mounted Police, went to Dawson City where he met W. L. Walsh who, almost forty years later, he was to succeed as vice-regal representative in Alberta.

## SMITHERS HAS SNOW

Twelve Inches Falls in One Night In Interior Town

SMITHERS, March 19:—The residents of the Bulkley Valley awoke yesterday morning to look out on a mid-winter scene again when snow that had been falling steadily throughout the night had reached a depth of twelve inches, making walking and motoring very difficult.

The city snow plow was out early clearing the sidewalks but the snow was so heavy and packed so hard that it was hard to get more than part of it off the walks.

The hot sun coming out during the morning, however, is making short work of it and in a day or so there will probably be none left as the streets and roads had been bare of snow for about two weeks previous to this fall.

It will serve to provide additional moisture for the farm lands and will assist in removing the old snow.

With a continuation of the fine weather that has prevailed throughout the district during the past few weeks it will not be long before the farmers will be on the land preparing for this year's crop.

## Babine-Smithers Trail Being Used

SMITHERS, March 19:—Many Babine Indians have been in Smithers during the past few days, coming in over the trail from Babine Lake to Smithers. They are all anxious to see this road improved and do not hesitate to express its advantages over all other roads from the lake.

It is hoped that the government will do considerable work on this road during the coming season and efforts are being directed by local organizations toward that end.

## Senate Rejects Transport Bill

OTTAWA, March 19: (CP)—The Senate last night defeated on third reading the transport bill by a division of 30 to 18, leaving the government's action on the measure uncertain. The bill would have given government control of water, air, rail and interprovincial highway transportation.

## Money For New Hospital

Provincial Government Unable To Keep Royal Jubilee Hospital In Victoria

VICTORIA, March 19:—The provincial government has refused assistance to the Royal Jubilee Hospital board in connection with the construction of a new \$300,000 wing to the institution. Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, says the government has no money available for this purpose.

## POPE OUT FOR REDS

Only Catholic Church Can Effectively Combat Communism, Declares Pontiff

ROME, March 19: (CP)—In his encyclical against communism yesterday, Pope Pius declared that only the Roman Catholic Church could effectively oppose the disintegrating effect of communism. He called upon Christian employers to combat communism by recognizing the "inalienable rights of the working man."

## CITIES ASK RELIEF AID

Municipal Representatives Request Federal Government to Stabilize Assistance

OTTAWA, March 19: (CP)—A Dominion conference of mayors and municipal representatives yesterday decided to ask the federal government to increase grants-in-aid for relief. A resolution which was adopted asked that aid should be so increased as to preserve the financial structure of urban municipalities pending a redistribution of the cost of relief and of public revenues. Permanent stabilization of public assistance and preparation of a work and wages scheme to replace unemployment relief is asked.

## PLEA FOR TOLERANCE

Dean Buchanan Speaks to Rotary Club and Tells of Development of Universities in Canada

Greater religious, political, economic and international tolerance was the plea of Dean Daniel Buchanan of the Department of Mathematics at the University of British Columbia, in an address yesterday before the Prince Rupert Rotary Club on the subject of "The Universities and the Public." It was a delightfully well thought out and vivacious address, illustrated by a fund of stories of a more or less humorous character in which the speaker told of the founding of the older institutions of learning in Eastern Canada where religious differences had to be overcome. C. V. Evtit presided and introduced the speaker and thanked him at the close. Visitors present included C. C. Mills, Roy Summers, G. P. Lyons, Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, Pete Sunderland, Dr. W. A. Riddell, Otto Young and O. C. Walker.

A welcome home was accorded to Harry Rochester, who made his first appearance at a club luncheon in a number of months, the chairman remarking on how well he looked.

Dean Buchanan remarked on opening that the primary purpose of a university was not conferring degrees but conserving and increasing knowledge. It was not designed to help people to make money.

Tracing the growth of the Universities of the East the speaker mentioned that King's College, an Anglican institution, was the first to be established in Canada. It was open only to those who subscribed to the thirty-nine articles of faith. This led to the establishment of Dalhousie in Nova Scotia. A building was erected with funds secured during the War of 1912 when the Canadians held a small American sort and collected port dues and took the money back with them to Canada. For twenty years the building was not used and, when under Governor Dalhousie, it came to life, in spite of the fact that it was founded as a protest against the exclusiveness of the Anglican University it refused to take on its staff a prominent Baptist and this led to the founding of Acadia University, a Baptist institution.

## University of B. C.

Turning then to the University of British Columbia, the Dean said that he had escaped from the religious difficulties of the older universities but they had lost something in that intense loyalty to their Alma Mater for which the others are noted.

In the British Columbia university there was absolute freedom to discuss any scientific, mathematical, physical or religious subject but, when it came to economics, they found that the moment they began to exercise their vaunted freedom, they were accused of teaching socialism. What they did was to teach the historical background and tenets of communism, socialism and all the other economic theories, all in the spirit of inquiry and the student was given absolute freedom to form his own opinion. Unfortunately, the custom of deciding matters by shouting was still prevalent and in international affairs outshouting was considered the test of truth.

Speaking of history Dean Buchanan referred to the fact that Canadians told only of their own victories and Americans did the same. The result was the young people going through the schools obtained a false idea of the truth. He urged the adoption of a more tolerant attitude, and the cultivation of kindlier international relationships.

## Royal Mail Wins Chase At Aintree

AINTREE, England, March 19: (CP)—H. Lloyd Thomas' eight-year old Royal Mail, ridden by Evan Williams, won the centenary running of the Grand National Steeplechase today. Cooleen, owned by J. Rank, was second three lengths behind and Pucka Belle, E. Bailey's entrant, was third, a head behind Cooleen. The winner was held at 100 to 6 in betting with Cooleen at 33 to 1 and Pucka Belle at 100 to 6. Only six of the starters finished the course. Sir David Llewellyn's Ego, also well backed, was fourth followed by Crown Prince and Penraik. Golden Miller, the betting favorite, failed to finish.

## REMOVING OF DEAD

Texas School Explosion Worst Catastrophe of its Kind In United States History

NEW LONDON, Texas, March 19: (CP)—Jerry Sitton, city editor of the Kilgore Daily News, has counted the bodies of 348 children who were trapped in the auditorium of a large consolidated school here yesterday afternoon and said that rescue workers had told him there were between five hundred and six hundred children dead and three hundred injured in what is believed to have been the worst disaster of its kind in the history of the United States.

Oil field workers continue to dig with bladed hands into the wrecked steel and brick of the building for their own children. Tons of debris remain to be removed on the ground and basement floors which are feared to be the tomb of scores of bodies buried when the explosion of unknown origin ripped the imposing structure to broken bits. It is feared the death count may exceed 500.

Governor James Allred has instructed the public safety department at Austin, Texas, to rust all assistance possible to the scene of the catastrophe.

Dafoe, pastor of First Baptist Church, the remains were placed aboard the steamer Prince George and, accompanied by the widower, taken to Vancouver where interment will be made.

Deceased was a native of England and 74 years of age. He came to the central interior in 1922. The funeral took place at Burns Lake today.

## Singers For Coronation

Dominion of Canada is Invited To Send Twenty Voices To London

TORONTO, March 19:—Twenty Canadian singers may go to London as members of the coronation choir. Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister, has asked Sir Ernest Macmillan, principal of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, to ascertain if suitable singers are available. They would be required to pay their own fare to London.

Full Masonic rites were yesterday afternoon accorded the late Duncan Rodman, veteran seafaring man and district light house keeper, whose death occurred earlier in the week after a lengthy illness. The remains were taken to the Masonic Temple, where the ritualistic service was conducted by S. A. Bird, worshipful master, and the other officers of Tsimpsean Lodge to which deceased belonged. There was a large turn-out of members. After the service, interment was made in the returned soldiers plot at Fairview Cemetery. In view of deceased having been an ex-service man, "The Last Post" was sounded by Bugler William Rance. There were also Masonic committal rites.

### Starting Out Well

Evidently Prince Rupert is starting out well this year in connection with gardening operations. Inquiries from the city's seedsmen elicit the information that much greater interest is being taken in the purchase of seeds this year than last. Evidently gardeners are planning ahead and it may be expected that the general tendency toward beautification will make a distinct forward movement.

This is a good time to make a start in cases where no garden has yet been cultivated. It is not too late to dig up a piece of virgin land and prepare it for flowers.

May we be allowed to suggest that it is the duty and privilege of every citizen to do his or her part in this work of making Prince Rupert the most beautiful city on the continent. We can do it if we are determined. Every new garden added to the list is a step toward this goal. As we drive along some of the streets we notice here and there gaps in the beautification program. There are places where no effort has been made to keep up with the general trend. We are sorry for the people who cannot enter into the new spirit of the times. They are out of step in the onward march, if we may be allowed to mix our metaphors. They are losing something which is very important in life.

In the hive the members that do not conform to the best interests of the bee community are ruthlessly destroyed. In this matter of gardening there is no compulsion but the community expects every member to join of his own free will and desire. No matter how little is done the effort is appreciated. Prying eyes are looking at the ill-conditioned lots and people are wondering what is wrong with the owners. While progress is being made, there are still laggards. In a number of cases one or two people are spoiling the whole street or avenue. If Prince Rupert is to be the real city beautiful which will attract tourists from all parts, the desire to improve the city must be general. On behalf of the city we ask all to join in the movement to make Prince Rupert outstanding as the "City Beautiful."

### Dried Out Farmers Move

In the United States it is estimated that seventy thousand farmers are moving this year from the dried out, sun-scorched areas to places where there is a greater amount of moisture and consequently larger crops.

In Canada there has been a movement in a much smaller way but most of the farmers in the dry belt are reluctant to leave behind their farm buildings, their friends and neighbors and start out in a new district.

The districts that offer most attractions to the dried out farmers in Canada are the Peace River wheat areas and the fertile valleys of British Columbia. A few people have come through the mountains to British Columbia farms but it has been easier for the majority to go to the Peace and hundreds more would go if the country had better rail transportation. This is one of the big arguments in favor of a western outlet for the Peace River wheat.

### Timely Recipes

#### CHOCOLATE COOKIES

For the busy homemaker there is great satisfaction in the knowledge of a well-stocked cake tin and cookie box. For all those occasions when guests drop in for tea, when small persons come home hungry from school, and many other informal occasions, there must be a supply of small cakes and cookies. Of course, to have these on hand requires some previous planning, but they should be inexpensive, easy to mix and baked by the dozens. They vanish overnight almost but that is nothing to worry about when you can turn out a large batch of them in half an hour.

Chocolate-flavored dainties are particularly popular. Crisp and crunchy chocolate cookies are excellent to keep on hand. Here is a recipe for them.

#### Chocolate Cookies

Two cups sifted cake flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 cup butter or other shortening, 1 1/4 cups sugar, 2 eggs, well beaten; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, salt and cinnamon, and sift three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add eggs and chocolate; beat well. Add flour, a small amount at a time, mixing well after each addition. Chill thoroughly. Roll 1/8 inch thick on slightly floured board. Cut with floured cookie cutter; sprinkle with sugar. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) nine minutes. Makes 2 1/2 dozen 3-inch cookies.

but its inhabitants have been able to discern what is going on all around us. There are certain other things in this world that are just as real as natural forces. Such are faith and love, I put my faith in the existence of a great being behind it all.

Dean Buchanan, who had discussed the solar system the previous evening, went on last night to deal with the larger universe beyond with more particular reference to the stars and the other worlds and the astronomical theories in regard to them. There were many greater stars than the sun. In passing, Dean Buchanan told how it had been ascertained that the sun was now on the wane. In the course of its evolutionary development from a nebula, it had passed its peak temperature of 20,000 degrees on the surface and was now 6,000. However, it would be hundreds of thousands of years before its eventual extinction.

With the use of diagrams and astronomical photographs taken through telescopes and projected on his screen, Dean Buchanan illustrated the starry constellations, explaining how some of them had been named and relating certain traditions concerning them. No doubt, there were other worlds in the making. Revolutions of astral bodies were discussed relative sizes and distances being given. Charts prepared by Dr. J. S. Plaskett of Victoria were shown to give an idea of the immensity of the universe as known by astronomical study. The distance of 93,000,000 miles from the earth to sun shrunk to insignificance when compared with the vastness of the universe. Dean Buchanan seemed to take a somewhat cynical attitude in regard to certain theories of Albert Einstein.

The meeting was presided over by G. P. Lyons, chairman of the university extension committee of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.
