LONDON, April 23: (CP)—Rt. Hon. A. V. Alexander, who was First Lord of the Admiralty in the last Labor government, declared in the House of Commons during the budget debate yesterday that, when Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain ceased to be Chancellor of the Exchequer, he would leave behind him six unbalanced budgets.

Forty-Seven Are Drowned in Fierce Sakhalien Storm

TOKYO, April 23:—Forty-seven fishermen are reported drowned as a result of a fierce storm off Sakhalien Island.

Franco-British Defence Plans

Change Being Discussed in View Of New Belgian Policy—Eden To Visit Brussels

LONDON, April 23:—A revision of Franco-British defence plans is believed to be under consideration in view of the new Belgian foreign policy. Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden, who told the House of Commons yesterday that the new policy would not relieve Belgium of her obligations under the League of Nations, will go to Brussels at the end of the week to confer with Premier Paul van Zeeland.

Windsor Getting Threat Letters

London Publication Expresses Fear In View of Missives Received By Former Monarch

LONDON, April 23:—Cavalcade yesterday expressed alarm at numerous threatening letters which have been received by the Duke of Windsor, the former King Edward VIII, since going into exile in Austria.

LONDON, April 23: (CP)—Answering a question in the House of Commons yesterday, Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin said that Great Britain was willing to participate in a new world economic conference providing a comprehensive investigation indicated it was likely to succeed and that adequate preparation was made for it.

AGREEMENT IN STRIKE

Tie-up of Oshawa Plant Expected To End Monday—Compromise Is Basis of Settlement

TORONTO, April 23:—After a four-hour session in the office of Premier Mitchell Hepburn with representatives of the Committee for Industrial Organization banned at the insistence of the Premier, a tentative agreement was reached which it is confidently expected will end the strike in the General Motors of Canada plant at Oshawa.

Victim of Hit And Run Driver

William Wallace, Found Lying On North Vancouver Road, Dies On Way to Hospital

NORTH VANCOUVER, April 23:—Police are looking for a hit and run driver who is believed to have been responsible for the death early yesterday morning of William Wallace. Found lying on the road at 2:15 a.m. by Fred C. Aubrey, Vancouver lawyer, Wallace died while being taken to the North Vancouver Hospital.

Time to Clean Up Gambling In Stock-Pearson

NEW WESTMINSTER, April 23:—"It is time the Vancouver mining stock situation was cleaned up," declared Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of mines, in speaking here. He scathingly denounced stock gambling activities and expressed resentment of criticism directed against the government in connection with the matter, particularly criticism which had been emanating from a Vancouver newspaperman which he declared to be most unfair and prejudiced.

Will Have To Be Kicked Out Says Aberhart

EDMONTON, April 23:—Premier William Aberhart declared yesterday that he intended to stay in office as head of the Alberta government until he was "kicked out." That was the only way he could be removed, he said. There would be no polite "hotel room resignation" for him, Mr. Aberhart said.

MUSSOLINI IN PARLEY

Confers With Chancellor Kurt Von Schuschnigg of Austria In Venice

VENICE, April 23:—Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy and Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg of Austria were in conference here yesterday. The restoration of the monarchy to Austria was one of the matters discussed. Premier Mussolini is reported to have advised Schuschnigg that he did not consider the time ripe for the placing of Archduke Otto on the Austrian throne, admitting, however, that it was a domestic question which only Austria had the right to decide.

'DIVINE' IS ARRESTED

Leader of Strange Religious Cult Dragged From Basement Of 'Heaven'

MILFORD, Connecticut, April 23: (CP)—"Father Divine," negro leader of the strange religious cult, for whom police have been seeking for some time, was finally taken into custody yesterday. He was dragged from a hiding place in the basement of his home here which he called "Heaven." "Divine" is booked on a charge of felonious assault.

Hailem's septa tincture "God" was in jail in New York today after having been brought back from the segment of his "Kingdom" in Milford, Conn. Outside police headquarters milled hundreds of negroes as "Divine" was being brought in at New York. Patrolmen watched from vantage points.

"I am very tired," "Divine" mumbled on the automobile trip from here to New York as detectives plied him with questions about the beating and stabbing of a process server who attempted to hand the cult leader a summons in a civil suit at the evangelist's main "heaven" Monday night.

Meanwhile troubles accumulated. "Faithful Mary," whom "Divine" described as his "so-called wife," had announced "He ain't God. He's just a damned man." "Divine" had told his followers that he would turn himself invisible before submitting himself to arrest.

Returning To Federal Force

Vancouver City Police to Lose Superintendent Herbert Darling This June

VANCOUVER, April 23:—Superintendent Herbert Darling, loaned by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to head the criminal investigation department of the Vancouver city police since 1935, will be returning to the federal department in June of this year, the Vancouver police commission was advised yesterday.

Wave of Illness And Death Among Members Of Sect Being Probed

Exact Nature of Illness Not Yet Determined Pending Laboratory Tests—Investigation Is Being Pushed

NELSON, April 23: (CP)—Medical men of this West Kootenay centre today awaited laboratory tests to explain the death in hospital here of one Doukhobor woman and the illness of three other of her compatriots who were stricken with an unidentified illness. British Columbia police are pushing their investigation into the deaths of two other members of the Russian religious sect. Poisoning is suspected.

REBEL FIRE HAS CEASED

Loyalists Get Range of Insurgents And Eleven-Day Bombardment Of Madrid Suddenly Ends

MADRID, April 23:—A thunderous government artillery assault after the loyalists had found the position of the rebel gun crews yesterday silenced the bombardment which has racked Madrid for eleven days. The insurgent fire suddenly ceased as shelter was sought by the men of the battery. In Cordoba area loyalist infantrymen were reported to have made important advances yesterday under a heavy artillery barrage.

Professional Men Are Arrested In Jugo-Slav Plot

BELGRADE, April 23:—Several lawyers, physicians and newspapermen have been arrested for an alleged communistic conspiracy against the Jugo-Slav government.

Pooley Regime Is Now Ended

E. V. Finland Nominated Conservative Candidate For Esquimalt

VICTORIA, April 23:—E. V. Finland was yesterday nominated as conservative candidate for Esquimalt in the forthcoming provincial election. R. H. Pooley K.C., former attorney general, declined to stand for renomination. Between Mr. Pooley and his father before him, the seat had been held traditionally by the Pooley family. C. E. Whitney-Griffith was last night nominated Liberal candidate for Esquimalt.

Dimond's Plan Is Not Favored

Men on Small Fishing Vessels Not Likely to Get Benefits Of Public Health Service

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 23:—Authorities here do not look with favor upon the proposal of Delegate Anthony Dimond of Alaska whereby men on small fishing craft would be brought under the benefits of the United States public health service. At present the service is available only to men on vessels of five tons or over. Dimond would allow boats of less than five tons to come in. The authorities here do not favor the idea, feeling that the benefits to be derived would hardly warrant the cost which would be involved.

GET READY FOR VOTE

Returning Officer Losing no Time In Getting Local Election Machinery Moving

W. D. Vance, who has been appointed returning officer for Prince Rupert in the forthcoming provincial election, is already getting organization started for the taking of the poll. Proclamations will go forward to the Queen Charlotte Islands on the Prince John tonight in order that they may be posted in sufficient time before nomination day. There are a number of new polling places in the riding this election at points where industries have arisen since last time a vote was taken. The polling places for this election will be as follows: Cumshewa, Digby Island, Goose Bay, Haysport, Humpback Bay, Hutton Island, Inverness, Jap Inlet, Lawn Hill, Lockport, Masset, Murchison Island, North Island, Oceanic, Oona River, Osland, Port Clements, Port Simpson, Prince Rupert, Queen Charlotte City, Sandsoit, Skidegate, Squadaree, Sunnyside, Surf Point, Tlell, Wark Channel and Zayas Island.

Three Point Grey Members Will Run

Dr. G. M. Weir, S. S. McKeen And Robert Wilkinson Again Candidates

VANCOUVER, April 23: (CP)—Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, S. S. McKeen and Robert Wilkinson, who were members of the last Legislature, were Wednesday night renominated Liberal candidates for Vancouver-Point Grey in the forthcoming provincial election.

Opposition To Kenney Seems Uncertain Now

TERRACE, April 23:—Delegates to the nominating convention of the Liberal party went to Hazelton on Wednesday evening's train. So far there does not seem to be much prospect of any candidate to represent the other parties against E. T. Kenney. One or two names have been mentioned in connection with the C. C. C. but there is nothing certain about it.

THREE GOOD NOMINATIONS

Three proven men have been nominated for the ridings of Skeena, Atlin and Omineca in the Liberal interest. Mr. Kenney was an active member of the last legislature and he was particularly keen in looking after the interests of the northern section of the province. Mr. Asselstine moved from the constituency since the last election but he kept in close touch with it and its needs and, although now settled definitely in Vancouver, is in an excellent position to serve the needs of the north. Mr. Connelly has made a fine impression during his brief membership to date. It is understood that H. G. Perry is pretty sure to be renominated in Prince George and Premier Pattullo in Prince Rupert. The general opinion seems to be that it would be a good thing to let these five men finish the work which they have so well commenced.

AN ACTIVE TIME

Evidently there is an active period coming for Prince Rupert. Among the works which are to be carried out are the new federal building, development of the Ecstall mining property by the Gulf Sulphur Inc., erection and operation of a new reduction plant at Port Edward, construction of a new oil plant on the waterfront at Cow Bay, construction and operation of a mineral sampling plant, steady operation of two mines at or near Surf Point on Porcher Island and development of other mining properties in that neighborhood and at various other points in the district, considerable timber activity both on the mainland and on Queen Charlotte Islands and increased road building everywhere. This does not include the completion of the naval building on the waterfront or work projected in connection with coast defence and air stations and the possible re-opening of Anyox smelter. If there is anything like a normal fishing season, the summer should be a busy one. There are other possibilities of developments which it is hoped may come to fruition this year. The tourist season promises well and on the whole the future looks very promising.

C. C. F. NAMES CANDIDATES

Matthew Glenday and Frank Roberts Nominated For Vancouver Centre

VANCOUVER, April 23:—Matthew Glenday and Frank Roberts were yesterday nominated Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidates for Vancouver Centre in the forthcoming provincial election. The former was chosen on the second ballot and the latter on the fourth. Glenday comes from Parksville, Vancouver Island.

Liberals, Conservatives and Social Reconstruction candidates have not yet been chosen for this double riding in which Dr. R. H. Smith and Paul McD. Kerr have already been nominated as Social Crediters. Glenday and Roberts are the first C. C. F. candidates so far to be formally nominated in the province although the movement expects to be represented in practically all ridings.

A coastguard air station, costing \$500,000 and equipped for all types of rescue by air and water, will be constructed on Mills Field, San Francisco Bay, soon. Establishment of the station is aimed at preventing recurrence of the plane crash of two months ago which killed eleven persons in the bay. The coastguard station will be equipped with four amphibian ships and possibly a patrol boat. There will be barracks for 60 men and the entire Bay area will be patrolled. The urgent need of such a base has been felt for a long time and certainly the present staff at the existing coastguard station has had plenty of opportunity in the last year to practice!

And speaking of planes. Don't forget to take a trip over the Bay when you visit here. No trip is complete without one and until one has been "way out to the Farallones, and over the Bay, San Francisco and metropolitan Oakland, one cannot really say he has "seen" this part of California.

FORM OF SERVICE

Church Heads Recognize World-Wide Audience for Coronation

LONDON, April 23: (CP)—Having in mind that "by marvel of science" millions of British Empire subjects and others throughout the world will hear the Coronation service in Westminster Abbey, May 2, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have suggested forms of service for use in churches the preceding Sunday and on Coronation Day to prepare congregations to listen to the broadcast.

The archbishops commend to the clergy of all parts of the Empire inclusion in the addresses and sermons of some reference to this "manner, hitherto unknown in history, the King will come to his crowning, accompanied by his people." They point out the people of many lands will be able to hear the words which will lay the great charge upon the King "as if they themselves were present in the Abbey Church of St. Peter at Westminster."

For services Sunday, May 9, the archbishops suggest an Old Testament lesson from the Books of Kings, to include the verse "The Lord our God be with us as He was with our fathers." A second lesson is commended from the words of St. Paul to the Philippians beginning "In nothing be anxious; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God."

Prayers would be offered "for our sovereign lord, King George, set over us by Thy grace and providence to be our King . . ." It is suggested the first and third verses of the National Anthem be sung, the second being omitted.

Suggested Hymns

For services throughout the Empire Coronation Day the archbishops suggest as the opening hymn: "All People that on Earth do dwell," followed by an address to include the admonition: "Brethren, we are met together to add our prayer to the thoughts of countless multitudes whose minds are turning at this time to one of the most sacred places in the history of our race—the Abbey of St. Peter at Westminster. Thither our King and Queen are coming to receive from God the anointing which seals their life's services and bestows God's grace for its fulfilment . . ."

Prayers for the King and Queen would follow. Then the minister might say: "Almighty God, who rulest in the Kingdom of men, and hast given to our sovereign lord, King George, a great dominion in all parts of the earth; draw together, we pray Thee, in true fellowship the men of divers races, languages and customs, who dwell therein, that, bearing one another's burdens and working together in brotherly concord, they may fulfil the purpose of Thy Providence, and set forward Thy everlasting Kingdom." The service would conclude with the Lord's Prayer and part of the National Anthem.

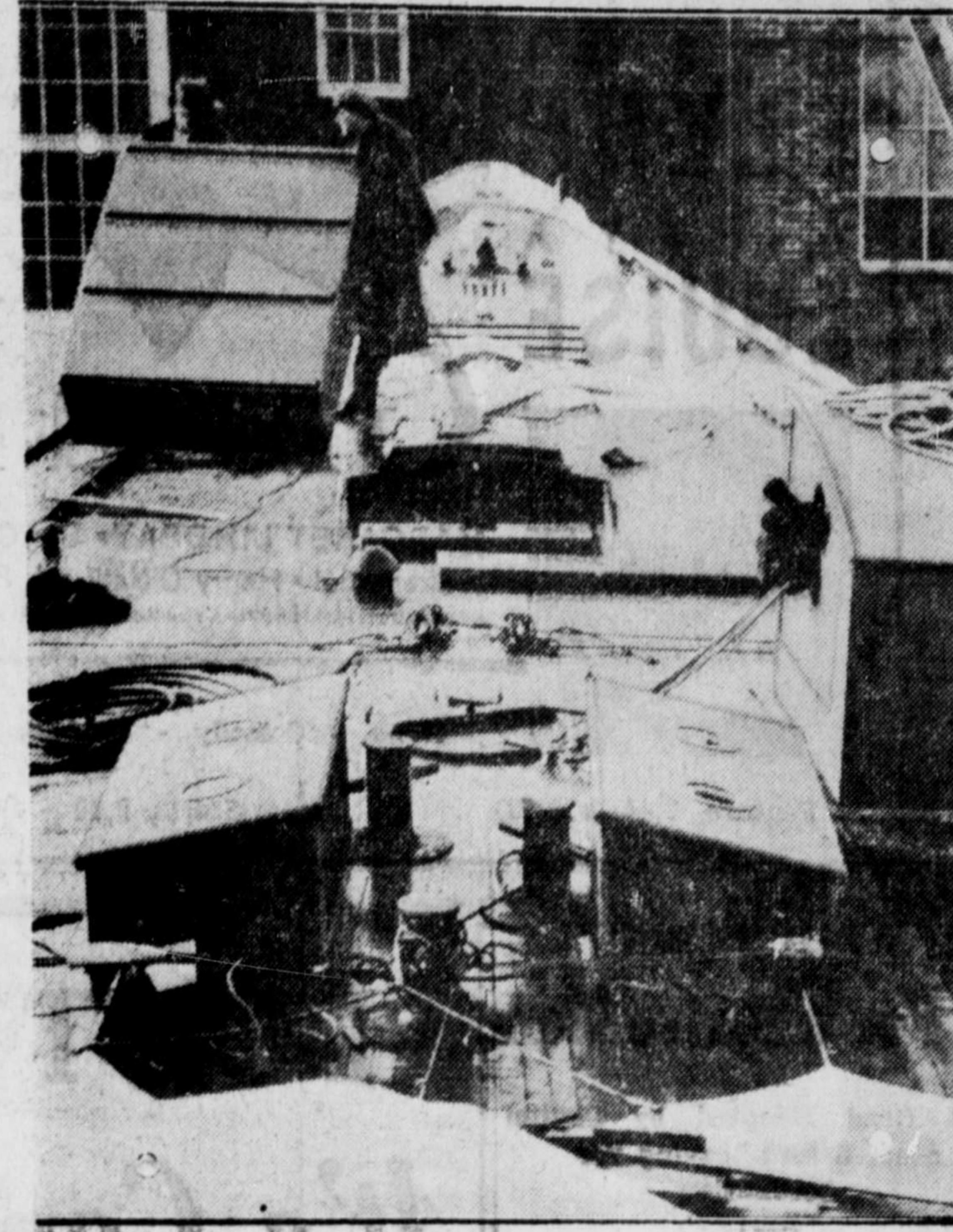

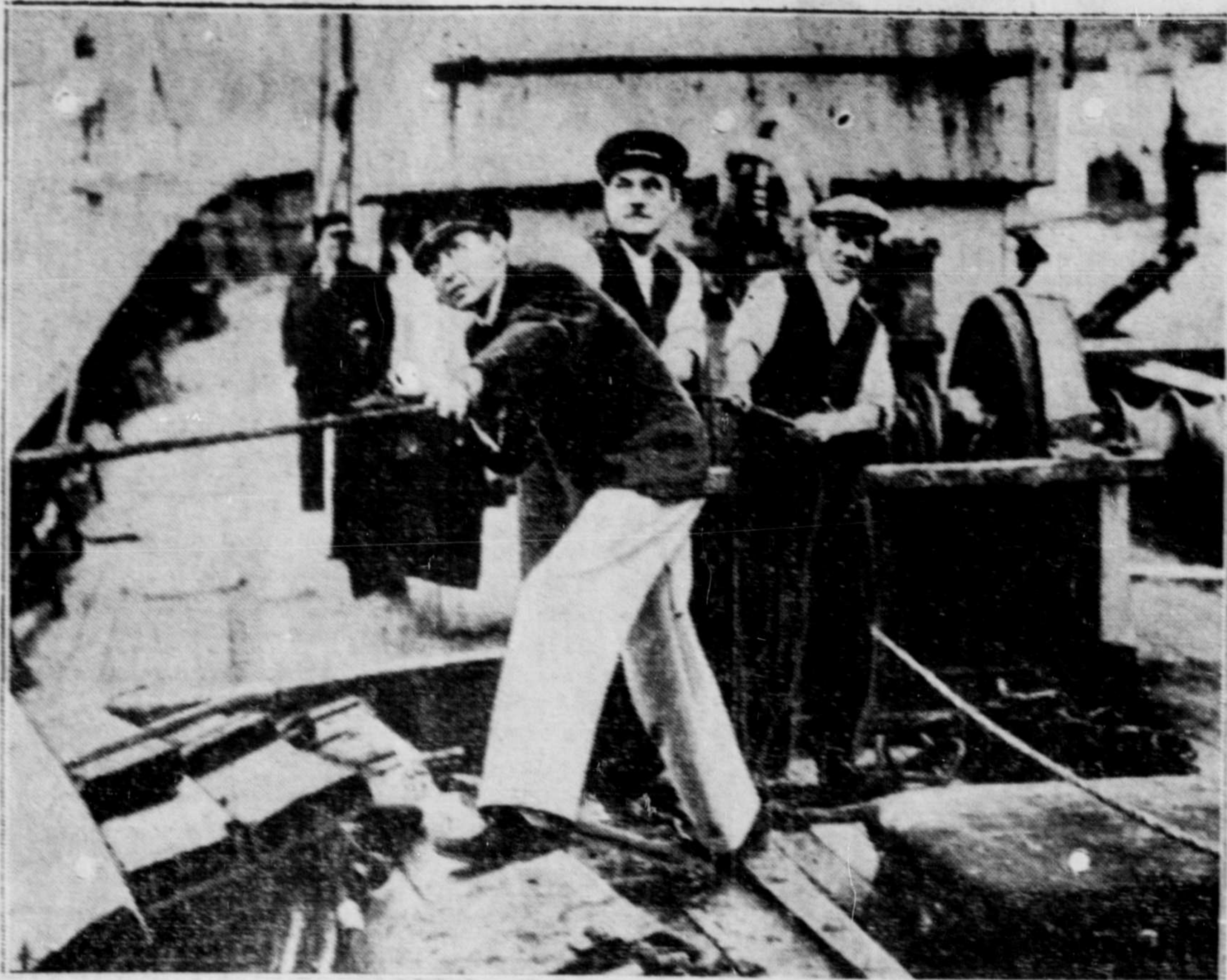

London Controls Fur Skins Marts

Hitler's Policies Against Jews Turned Millions in Sales To Britain

LONDON, April 23: (CP)—Millions change hands at the blink of an eyelash at the London fur sale where half the skins come from Canada, the rest from Russia, Australia, United States, Persia and South America.

Each of the 600 buyers, who attend the Beaver House session, has his own little idiosyncracies—a flick of a pencil, the closing of an eye, a snap of the fingers. But the auctioneers, perched on their rostrums, and their attendant watchmen, know each method and sometimes up to 30,000 skins may be sold in a single hour without a word from any of the 600 buyers in the little room.

Every big sale lasts several weeks and each auctioneer sells two lots a minute for seven hours a day. For years London handled \$70,000,000 of the world's \$250,000,000 annual turnover. During recent years, however, it has attained complete domination.

Drew Punchy Pen For Fifty Years

Cartoonist Retires After Long Career of Satire on Canada's Great

TORONTO, April 23: (CP)—Sam Hunter, 79-year old dean of Canadian cartoonists, has laid down the pen that for more than half a century caricatured leaders of Canada's political life. He has retired as cartoonist of the Toronto Daily Star, but remains on the staff as "cartoonist emeritus."

Hunter, whose stoop-shouldered, gangleshanked and chin-whiskered "Old Man Ontario" was one of Canada's finest cartoon characters, worked for Toronto newspapers since the nineties. His work appeared in The World, The Globe and The News.

His deft line-work gave a soft, mellow touch to drawings of Macdonald and Laurier, Ross and Whitney in the old days and his skill remained in latter-day caricatures of King, Bennett, Henry and Hepburn. He turned to political cartooning when he was past 30, after spending some years in western Canada.

His art-work was of a high order and his cartoons invariably had "punch." Though they were usually good-natured, he once roused the ire of the late Armand Lavergne with a cartoon of the Quebec politician called "bold-brutal-stupid."

Slim and scholarly, Hunter worked unpretentiously at his home. There he digested the news of the Dominion and the world, rapidly creating cartoons that found their way to editorial desks with clocklike regularity. They were drawn at reproduction size. Early in his career Hunter often visited legislative chambers to sketch his subjects at first hand, but later he drew from photographs.

Hunter left his drawing board when the fishing season came and hurried to the woods. His appreciation of nature was reflected in many a cartoon.

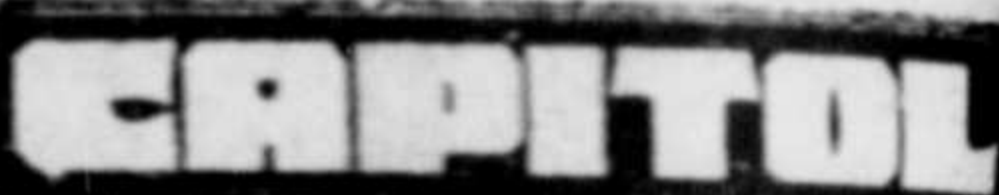

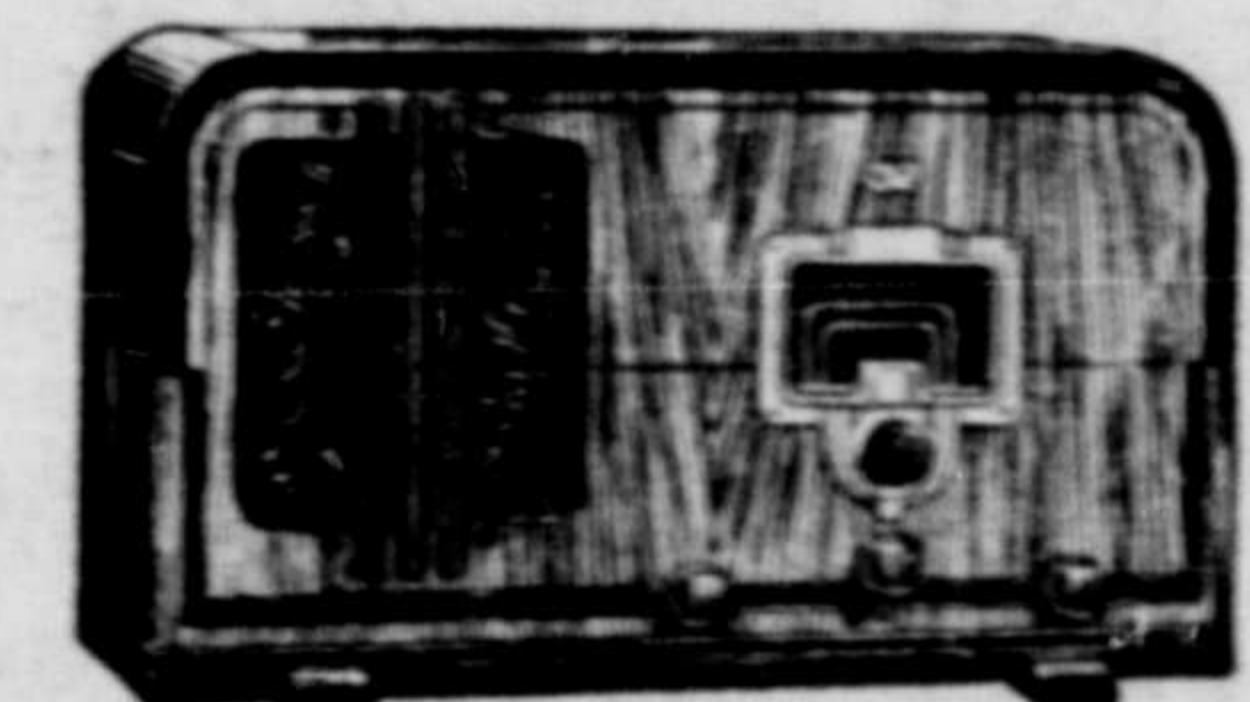
