Dail Re-elected La sa As Pesident of The Free State In Ireland Today at Opening

DUBLIN, July 21: - The Dail yesterday re-elected Eamon de Valera president of the Irish Free State, the vote standing 82 to 52. This will be his third term of office since his party defeated the Cosgrave adherents in the general election some years ago.

While the new Dail has only a bare majority fully supporting the policies of the President, a number of members are giving DeValera their general support on most questions to come before the Irish Parliament.
