Mr. Dunning denied that ther. was any effort by the Dominion to interfere with Ontario by attempting, as Mr. Hepburn charged, to obtain control of Ontario's suces sion duty collections and by failing to co-operate with income tax information. Mr. Dunning said all he had done to explore with the pro inces the possibility of achieving greater efficiency and economy in tax collections.

Mr. Ilsley said that all income tax returns had been made avail able to Ontario officers.

We are not suggesting that there shall be no customs tariffs but we do suggest that, in the reorganization of the Dominion which is now going on, this fact be taken into account and reasonable adjustments be made for British Columbia and the prairie provinces.

CRELIT CORPORATION

It is suggested that the federal government form a huge credit corporation to take over all farm mortgages. That looks like a wild scheme. In Prince Rupert a good many fishermen have mortgages on their boats. It was the only way they could finance them when they started to fish on their own. They are not asking the government to assume those mortgages, although many of them have been just as hard hit as the prairie farmers. If it is entended that they shall extend the terms of payment then it may be pointed out that usually it is more difficult for governments to make collections than for individuals, because the average citizen feels that governments can wait. Evidently on the prairies, largely as a result of the Social Credit campaign, people are hoping to escape paying their debts. That is one of the evils of the present trend.

SPLENDID EDITION

The Winnipeg Tribune has just published a huge one hundred and forty-two page edition of which one section deals with the development of the C.P.R., another with electrical power, a third is devoted to prairie farming and a good deal of attention is paid to the Pacific Coast as well & as to the general news of the day. It is pointed out by the publishers that six tons of metal was used in setting the type, the printers worked on it for two thousand hours, fifty tons of newsprint was used, nearly a ton of ink was consumed. It is a splendid gesture and worthy of the city in which it is published.






