MANITOBA IN BAD FINANCIAL SHAPE

CANADIAN DEFENCE PLANS DISCLOSED

Bank of Canada Issues Alarming Report About Condition of Province

Raids on Ports Are More to be Feared Than Mass Invasion

Hon. Ian Mackenzie Discloses Details of Proposed Strengthening of Military, Naval and Air Forces—C. C. F. Keeps up its Opposition

OTTAWA, Feb. 16: (CP)—Efficient military, naval and air forces for the defence of Canadian territory and Canadian neutrality are the objectives of the federal government in increasing expenditures of the National Defence department. Members of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation group who attacked the government's policy yesterday will renew their attack today.

Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Minister of National Defence, yesterday told the House of Commons that the policy of the government concerned only the defence of Canada and not participation in military operations abroad. Sporadic raids on Canadian ports or grain elevators were more to be feared than mass invasion, the minister said, and the defence policy was aimed at combating such raids. The Air Force would be equipped with fast fighting machines which could be moved to threatened points in a few hours. Coastal artillery defences would be strengthened. Anti-aircraft guns would be acquired. The Navy would be provided with four new mine sweepers to assist in keeping Canadian ports clear of mines.

SOLDIER IS DEAD

Major General Sir Frederick Loomis Succumbs to Heart Ailment at Montreal

Noted Career

Served with Distinction in Canadian Expeditionary Force in France

MONTREAL, Feb. 16: (CP)—Major General Sir Frederick Oscar Warren Loomis, aged 67, who was commander of the Third Canadian Division at the close of the Great War, died in Montreal last night of a heart ailment.

In the great canvas which hangs in the Senate Chamber of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, Edgar Bundy, the noted English artist, has painted the figures of a number of Canadian officers in a scene depicting "The Landing of the 1st Canadian Division at St. Nazaire." In the foreground is General Loomis (then Lieutenant-Colonel), who is shown watching his own unit, the 13th Battalion, Royal Highlanders of Canada march past. This was the command held by Sir Frederick when Canada sent her first division to France in February, 1915, but it was as a major-general, leading a division, that he returned to the Dominion four years later.

FREIGHTER IS WRECK

Zapora, Well Known at This Port, Is Total Loss in Southeastern Alaska

JUNEAU, Alaska, Feb. 16:—The well known old coast freighter Zapora, which has operated for many years between Seattle and Alaska ports, is reported a total loss following a stranding on a rocky point 15 miles south of Angoon early Sunday while enroute from Juneau to Hoonah and Petersburg. The vessel was on a voyage to Alaska with cargo. She had been one of the first vessels to leave Seattle following the recent maritime workers' strike.

When the Zapora became two days overdue, an airplane was sent out to look for her. It ascertained that she had been wrecked and that crew of seven and nineteen persons had escaped in the lifeboats. Later a coastguard vessel was dispatched to bring them to port.

The stranding occurred during a blinding snowstorm and heavy gale.

The vessel had left here early Saturday.

The Zapora was a well known vessel in Prince Rupert through frequent visits here. She was 155 feet long with beam of 24 feet and depth of 11 feet. She was built in 1905 and Tacoma was her port of registry. She was a wooden vessel.

Cannot Carry on Much Longer, it is Declared—Premier King Promises Investigation of Whole Taxation System in Dominion

OTTAWA, Feb. 16: (CP)—A royal commission of inquiry to investigate the whole system of taxation in the Dominion of Canada will be appointed, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today, the announcement following the tabling of a report of the Bank of Canada on the financial affairs of the Province of Manitoba.

The Bank of Canada will disclose in a few days its views regarding proposed solutions of the financial situation in Manitoba which, the Bank says in its report, "is either not in a position to carry on or is able to do so with assurance for no more than a short period unless some unexpected favorable factor should appear."

UNCLE SAM AND FLOODS

New Tactics of Experts Emphasize Importance of Attacking Menace at Sources

DANGER NOW OVER

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 16:—Flood waters of the Mississippi River continue to subside and all danger of the breaking of any of the major seawalls is now declared to be over. Work of clearing the flood debris is proceeding and many cities are actively planning rehabilitation.

The Voice of Canada

"The national voice of Canada is a myth. There is no such thing." That is one of the striking paragraphs in the current number of National Home Monthly written by Edgar N. Brown. Mr. Brown has travelled in Europe and has studied conditions there at first hand and here is an interesting paragraph in regard to one of his observations:

"The case of Spain, which was a helpless victim of external forces, should be a lesson to Canada. Spain had blindness, ignorance, neutrality and complacency—and none of these things helped her. She was ground to pieces by international philosophies, none of which originated in Spain or flourished in Spain. Nor will blindness, ignorance, neutrality and complacency help this country when the testing time comes. If we depend upon them we shall be crushed between overwhelming forces. There are burning questions facing Canada today and we must solve them in the way we choose, coolly and voluntarily, before they are forcibly solved for us in a way we may not like." "Shallow talk about 'democracy,' vain faith in 'British institutions' and idle dreams about 'isolation' are not substitutes for clear thinking and resolute action. All these catchwords are treacherous straws."

The writer claims that Canada has no opinion on these matters and no voice. When she speaks she speaks with ten million voices and on many important subjects does not speak at all. He says he is convinced that when the next great war comes it will be a war between communism and fascism and in that war democracy as we now know it will be finally buried.

In a great European struggle Mr. Brown believes that her interests and her alliances will take her to the side of France and Russia as against Germany and Italy. But Britain, he believes, is divided almost equally between the forces of communism and fascism (not Mosley's). Under these conditions the formulation of a national policy will be extremely difficult. On the decision she makes and on the outcome of the war will rest the kind of government she will have and possibly the type that other parts of the Empire may have.

The writer of the article goes on to say that on the question of war Canada has no voice. She does not know whether she would back up the Empire of which she is a part or not. She has no voice in regard to the future type of government. In Europe, he points out, democracy is being gradually extinguished. There are definite signs that in France its days are numbered and even in England there are similar indications. He scoffs at the oft-repeated aphorism that the British people would not tolerate a dictator.

What the writer suggests is that Canadian people think about these things so that they may not be caught napping. Some day a decision may have to be made quickly. He suggests that Canada make up her mind what to do in regard to Oriental contacts and problems arising from them. International as well as national problems should be studied and especially Pacific problems in which Canada would be the country most likely to be affected.

onials retired, leaving the Canadian flank open. From then began one of the bitterest fought engagements of the whole war with the 13th Battalion fighting around the apex of the triangle and every unit of the Canadian Division rushed to its assistance. St. Julien fell two days later, but when the remnants of the Canadian battalions were withdrawn from the battle they found the world ringing with praise of their brave deeds. In that praise Lieutenant Loomis shared to no uncertain degree.

Following the Ypres battle Loomis was promoted to the rank of Colonel and alternated between England and France. On his advancement to the rank of Brigadier-General he was given command of the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade, and as its leader fought through the desperate actions of the Ypres Salient, the Somme, Vimy Ridge, Hill 70 and Passchendaele.

Received Many Honors

In 1918 he was promoted to the rank of Major-General and took over the 3rd Canadian Division. In the bloody but triumphant march of the Canadian Corps from Arras to Valenciennes, his command fought with honor and distinction, and it was units from a brigade of his formation that made their stealthy entry into Mons on the morning of Armistice Day. For his services he received the following honors: Distinguished Service Order, 1915; Legion d'honneur (croix d'officier, French), 1916; auxiliary forces decoration, 1917; Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 1917; Companion of the Bath, 1918; but to D. S. O., 1918; Order of Leopold (commandeur, Belgium) 1919; Knight Commander of the Bath, 1919. Sir Frederick was mentioned in despatches in 1915, 1917, 1918 and 1919 for the conspicuous character of his military achievements.

Frederick O. W. Loomis was born in Sherbrooke, Quebec, February 1, 1870, the son of Daniel Gordon Loomis and Amelia (Hall) Burrows. He was educated at the public schools there, and at Bishop's College, Lennoxville. He started his military career in 1886 as a private in the 53rd Regiment of Sherbrooke, and prior to the outbreak of war in 1914 he had risen to the rank of major in the 5th Royal Highlanders of Montreal. In 1894 he married Margaret Morrison Mundell of Kingston, Ont., by whom he had five sons and two daughters. In civilian life he was a contractor.

SPORT CHAT

Manitoba boys won the Hignell Memorial Trophy for the sixth time in 1936 in the national athletic contest under auspices of the Religious Education Council of Canada. Monarchs, Indian School, Brandon, Man., carried off the shield, awarded to the Tuxis and Senior Division, making the highest score in Canada, with a group average of 580.4. The national contest is for members of all organized Sunday school, Tuxis, Trail Rangers and Y.M.C.A. boys' groups and enables Trail Rangers and Tuxis boys to qualify for their running, jumping and throwing badges. Results were announced by the athletic committee of the National Boys Work Board.

In 18 years of competition the Hignell shield has been won five times by the Maritime provinces; Alberta and British Columbia have each been successful three times and Ontario once. Brandon Y. P. S., Melville Presbyterian Church, Westmount, Montreal moved from fifth place to second this year with a group average of 532.2. Sarcees, Calgary, placed third with 528, Amica, Montreal, fourth with 507.1 and Imperials of Ioco, B.C. fifth with 471.

In the Trail Ranger and intermediate division, Live Wires, Crosby United Church, Vancouver, won the Trail Rangers Dominion Trophy, retaining the championship from the previous year. They raised their group average from 530.5 to 561, Eagles of Indian School, Man., again coming second with 553. In 1935 the Eagles had a group average of 527.1. Live Wires of Vineland Station, Ont., rose from fifth to third place with 504. Two Calgary groups, Maple Leafs and Live Wires, were fourth and fifth with 477 and 463 respectively.

During 14 years of competition the Trail Ranger Shield has been won six times by Manitoba, British Columbia boys have had four victories to their credit, Ontario two and Quebec and the Maritime provinces one each.

DEPARTMENT OF MINES

Synopses of Mining Laws

MINERAL ACT

Free Miners' Certificates
Any person over the age of eighteen, and any Joint Stock Company is entitled to enter upon all waste lands of the Crown and upon any other lands whereon the minerals other than coal are reserved to the Crown and its licensees, with specific reservations for the purpose of prospecting for minerals, for a period of one year. The fee to an individual for a Free Miner's Certificate is \$5.00 for one year. To a Joint Stock Company having a capital of \$100,000.00 or less the fee for a year is \$50.00. If capitalized beyond this the fee is \$100.00. The Miners' Certificate runs from date of issue and expires on the 31st of May next after its date or some subsequent 31st of May. Certificates may be obtained for any part of a year terminating on 31st of May for a proportionately less fee. (Free Miners' Certificates are also applicable to the Placer Mining Act.)

Mineral Claims

Size: 51.65 acres.
Recording fee: \$2.50 per claim.
Representation: Assessment work to the extent of \$100.00 must be done each year and recorded on or before the anniversary date of record of the claim. Cash in the sum of \$100.00 may be paid in lieu of such assessment work. Fee for recording assessment work: \$2.50. If the required assessment work has been performed within the year but not recorded within that time a free miner may within thirty days hereafter record such assessment work upon payment of an additional fee of \$10.00. The actual cost of the survey of a mineral claim to an amount not exceeding \$100.00 may also be recorded as assessment work. As soon as assessment work to the extent of \$500.00 for cash paid of a like amount is recorded the owner of such claim is entitled to a Crown Grant on payment of a fee of \$25.00 and giving the necessary notices required by the Act.

PLACER MINING ACT

Four types of placer claims:
Creek diggings; bar diggings; dry diggings; and placer stonings. For details see Part II, Placer Mining Act.
Representation: A placer claim must be worked by the owner or someone on his behalf continuously as far as practicable during working hours. Lay-overs and leaves of absence may be declared by the owner of the claim under certain conditions. To hold a placer claim for more than one year it must be re-recorded before the expiration of the record or record.
Placer Mining Leases
Size and method of staking, etc.
Eighty acres in extent, staked along a "location line" not more than one-half mile in length. In this line one bend or change of direction is permitted. Where a straight line is followed two posts only are necessary, i.e., an "initial post" and a "final post." Where there is a change of direction a legal post must be placed to mark the point of the said change. The leasehold is allowed a width not in excess of one-quarter mile. The locator is required within thirty days after the date of the location to post a notice in the office of the Mining Recorder setting out the name of the applicant; the number of his free miners' certificates; the date of location; the number of feet lying to the right and left of the location line; and the approximate area or size of the ground.
Dredging leases on rivers for five miles below low-water mark are also granted. Fee: Annual rental on placer mining lease: \$30.00; annual development work required to be expended: \$250.00; annual rental on dredging lease: \$25.00 per mile; annual development work required to be expended: \$1,000.00 per mile; the value of any new plant or machinery employed is counted as money expended in development. Fee for recording certificate of work: \$2.50. Lease fee: \$5.00.

Provisional Free Miners' Certificates, (Placer) Act

Department of Mines Act
Among other things, these Acts provide for the staking and representation of mineral claims without payment of fees and assistance to prospectors by free stakings, etc.
A detailed synopsis of the above Acts also the "Mining Development Act," "Mineral Survey and Development Act," "Iron and Steel Bounties Act" and "Phosphate Mining Act" are available at the Department of Mines, Victoria. Complete copies of the Acts may be obtained from the King's Printer, Victoria.



GOD'S SEAL IS BROKEN

So Deduces Seventh Day Adventist Evangelist

At the Seventh Day Adventist Mission Sunday night the lecture topic was: "The Seal of God and the Mark of the Beast." Mr. Blah declared that the legal seal contained three things:—a name, the title, and the territory over which the one named has jurisdiction. There was only one legal code in the world with God's seal, found in Exodus 20: 3-17. Of all the commandments only one, the fourth, contained God's name, Jehovah; His title, Creator; and His territory of jurisdiction, the universe. This was therefore His seal and it had been broken.

The evangelist pointed out that "sign" and "seal" were synonymous terms in the Bible, quoting in proof Romans 4: 11 and Ezekiel 9: 4. He then showed how God regarded the Sabbath, the seventh day, as a sign or seal between Him and His people forever.

But what is the mark of the Beast? The Beast brought to view in Revelations 13 was the one responsible for this mark. By comparing the prophetic language of Revelations 13 with the dragon of Revelations 12: 3 and the fourth beast of Daniel 7, it was clearly seen that it represented the Roman Catholic Church. A difference was made between the Roman Catholic people, many of whom were honest in heart, and their system of worship. But of the Roman Catholic Church, what would its mark be? It was first shown that the Church was responsible for changing the Sabbath from Saturday to Sunday in the following admission: "The Catholic Church for over one thousand years before the existence of a Protestant, by virtue of her divine mission, changed the day from Saturday to Sunday."—Catholic Mirror. Not only do they admit this deed, they boast of it as the mark of authority as the following quotation shows: "Of course the Catholic Church claimed that the change (from Saturday to Sunday) was her act. . . and the act is a mark of her ecclesiastical authority and power in religious matters."—Cardinal Gibbons.

spring floods can be cut appreciably if farmers try soil-conservation; if they strip crop (planting a row of corn, and then a row of grass for instance), if they terrace, and if they plant their crops in rows that follow the lines of the hills. The forest service steps in on the steeper slopes. Its men are planting trees where crops won't grow. The trees take root and cling, underbrush and grass grows up, and the water's headlong rush is stopped.

But all this work moves as slowly as a beetle going uphill, says Bennett, because it costs much money, demands much education of farmers and takes much preliminary survey work to determine where the money can best be spent.

That preliminary work has been started by the department of agriculture, which is collecting all government data on the subject. But the work under last spring's flood-control bill still awaits the necessary grease—the money. The bill just "authorized" the expenditure.

Some of the money is requested in the President's 1937-38 budget. He asks \$26,000,000 for flood control. Half a million of that is asked for the department of agriculture for survey work, and another \$500,000 is asked for a survey of army engineers. The remaining \$25,000,000 is to be used for actual work and material.

From a private business concern, which made a survey of last year's

flood destruction, the soil-conservation office learned the total destruction in 13 states was estimated at more than \$500,000,000.

This year, between Cincinnati and Cairo, floods have eclipsed all previous records. Last year saw 350,000 homeless. This year there were 750,000 homeless when the floods were a week old. Last year the Red Cross spent \$7,052,964 up to September. This year it had 49 concentration camps and 25 hospitals in the flood area during the early days of the disaster, and what the eventual cost will be is not known.
