Tenders for Important Project in Spokane District Opened at Washington Today

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 11:-Tenders were opened at the office of Secretary of the Interior Harold ickes yesterday for the construction of the upper portion of the Grand Coulee dam near Spokane. It is one of the largest contracts ever awarded in the Pacific Northwest. The successful contractor is required to put up \$7,500,000 in surety bonds and it will take four years to complete the work. Material will include six million cubic yards of concrete. The dam, when complete, will have a total height of 533 feet.

TORONTO-A new power contract was signed yesterday by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission. It provides for the delivery of 350,000 horse power of energy and replaced one of the contracts which was cancelled in 1935 by the Hepburn government.

FLOODS IN NORTHWEST

SEATTLE - Heavy rains and high winds yesterday, following on general snowfall throughout the Pacific Northwest, brought the threat of serious floods to parts of Washington, Oregon and Northern California. The level of water in many streams had reached an alarming stage. Rail way and highway washouts are reported. Some towns are already innundated and hundreds are reported to have been driven from their homes.

PASSENGERS TAKEN OFF YOKOHAMA-It was announced early today that all passengers, numbering some five hundred, and most of the crew of 300 had been safely removed from the American transPacific liner President Hoover which stranded early today on reefs off the Island of Formosa. The passengers and crew have been removed to one of the Formosan islands. High seas made the rescue work somewhat difficult. The President Hoover is reported to be in immediate danger herself. Indeed her condition is feared desperate. Four vessels, including two United States destroyers, are standing by. The vessel is being pounded by waves and is leaking badly. An attempt will be made to refloat her. Capt. E. Stepback of the German freighter Preussen, first ed Press that the Hoover was bumping heavily on the reef and "leaking badly forward."

MR. PEARSON AND THE COMMISSION

Hon. George Pearson, minister of labor, mines and fisheries, when questioned in regard to the appointment of L. W. Patmore K.C., admitted that the change was made by the cabinet contrary to his wishes. He was pressed by the opposition to make this admission.

What some people do not realize is that all members of the government have to be responsible for each department of the government. That being so all important matters should have the approval of the whole cabinet. The only recourse for Mr. Pearson, if he considered the question sufficiently important, was to resign as a protest but, evidently, he did not think it of sufficient importance to do that. Neither was it.

Government, as carried out in a democratic country, is always government by majorities. Every man in every democratic government must at times sacrifice his own opinion for those of his confreres. Compromise is absolutely necessary except in the case of a dictator who is all powerful.

We rather like Mr. Pearson's way of showing how he stood on this matter instead of pretending to be pleased. In a Liberal government especially there must be diversity of opinion on many subjects and there is no harm in letting the public know this. It is a sign of strength rather than weakness that such a thing can be done.
