## WAR CORRESPONDENTS DENY STORY OF ATROCITIES

### ATROCITIES WERE BY ARABS THE CORRESPONDENTS SAY

BRITISH AND PARIS PRESS CORRESPONDENTS EXONERATE THE ITALIAN TROOPS FROM THE CHARGES OF INHUMAN CONDUCT AT TRIPOLI.

A new aspect on the question of the alleged Italian atrocities in Tripoli is given by a group of English and other press correspondents who have issued a signed message over their names. The message is as follows:

The correspondents whose signatures follow witnessed the events in Tripoli from October 23 to October 30, and they affirm that the Italian soldiers have not been guilty of the atrocities they have been accused of by some newspapers; also that the executions ordered here have been

but the necessary repression of a prearranged revolt among the Arabs, who had previously submitted to the Italians. The undersigned affirm further that Moslems perpetrated on Christian prisoners and wounded atrocious tortures and mutilations.

### PRICES VARIED VERY GREATLY FOR WORK OF CUTTING PIPE TRENCH

One Man Wanted \$22 a Yard for Cutting Rock in Section 5—Another Wanted \$3—City Engineers' Bids Were in the Midway Region—Most of the Gangs Were Under Foreign Names.

Tenders were opened last night for the excavation of pipe line within the city limits for the Woodworth water supply. There were fifty bids in all, including that of the city engineer, for the work which is divided into six sections. Most of the tenders bid for at least five out of the six sections, but some went in for only one section. The whole set of tenders is referred to the city engineer for tabulation and

report by Thursday night's meeting.

Prices varied considerably, from as high as \$22.50 per yard for rock in section 5, to as low as \$3 in the same section, and \$2.48 in section 1. Earth excavation prices varied from as high as \$3 per yard to as low as 45 cents.

Following are the prices quoted in the engineer's bid, which occupies a mid-way position in relation to the others, there be-

ing a number of lower bids. Section One, earth, \$1.15; rock, \$6.50. Section Two, earth, \$1.00, rock, \$5. Section Three, earth, \$1.00; rock, \$4.75. Section four, earth 80c.; rock, \$4.75. Section Five, earth, 90c.; rock, \$5.00. Section Six, earth \$2.00; rock, \$4.75.

Of the forty-nine other tenders, some thirty-seven bid under foreign sounding names as representative of station gangs of from ten men upwards.

### EPIDEMIC OF ROBBERY AND OF SUICIDE IN VANCOUVER

BANK BURGLARS SHOT JAPANESE JANITOR AT NORTHERN CROWN BANK THIS MORNING—THREE MEN COMMITTED SUICIDE WITH POISON, KNIFE AND REVOLVER.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Vancouver, Dec. 19.—A daring attempt was made to rob the Northern Crown Bank at Collingwood, a suburb of Vancouver, early this (Tuesday) morning. After gaining an entrance and shooting the Japanese janitor in the wrist, the men decamped. It is not yet known whether they secured any money.

Vancouver, Dec. 19.—Three suicides occurred here on Monday. A man named Swanson, a Swede, poisoned himself. Stewart Clarke, a traveler, cut his throat

with a pen knife, and I. R. Clarke, a bailiff, shot himself in Stanley Park. The motive in no case is apparent.

#### FORMED LABOR COUNCIL

Mr. S. D. Macdonald is Elected President Pro Tem

The proposed Trades and Labor Council was duly formed by the various labor bodies at their meeting in the Carpenter's Hall last night. Mr. S. D. Macdonald, of the Typographical Union was elected president, and Mr. D. McLean, of the Carpenters' Union, secretary for the time being. Messrs. J. O'Brien, W. G. Dennis and J. Robbins were appointed a committee for organization work, and on the second Monday in January, the council will meet again to adopt bylaws, constitution and elect permanent officers for the year.

A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. J. C. Watters, of Victoria, President of the Dominion Trades Congress, for his labors in bringing the Labor Council into being.

### TO DEVELOP THE HALIBUT TRADE

New Type of Fishing Schooner is Now Under Construction at Vancouver Shipyards for a Skeena River Syndicate

Vancouver, Dec. 19.—A contract was awarded last week to the Vancouver shipyard for a vessel for the Skeena River that will not only be the first of its kind built here, but is expected to be but the precursor of a considerable fleet. The vessel in question is an auxiliary schooner, 70 feet over all by 16-foot beam and is intended for the rapidly developing halibut fishing industry of the Skeena River. The name of the new vessel has not been decided on yet, but she is being built for a Skeena syndicate.

Although schooner rigged, the sail area of the vessel will be comparatively small, as the sail will only be used in case of a breakdown of the engine, or for laying-to while her dories are out. The total sail area is about 1,500 square feet, which in a vessel of that size can be carried in almost any kind of a gale. The power plant will be a three-cylinder, four-cycle, 50-horsepower Wolverine, which is expected to give the vessel a speed of between eight and nine miles an hour.

#### To Carry Six Dories.

The sails on the fore and main masts will be of the Bermuda, or leg-of-mutton, type, it being desirable to avoid the use of a gaff, as both the fore and main booms will be employed for hoisting as well as sail purposes. The boom on the foremast will be used for hoisting cargo from the fore hatch, a winch being located forward for that purpose, while the boom on the mainmast, when topped up, will afford derrick facilities for hoisting the dories aboard. Of the latter six will be carried, nested on the after deck. The cargo hold forward will be divided into five compartments, so arranged that the vessel can be trimmed to an even keel under almost any conditions, despite the slipper nature of the cargo.

#### Comfortably Fitted.

The pilot house is located about amidships, slightly well in below the deck. The engine is installed underneath—a type of construction that has given splendid results in power yachts. This allows one-man control of

the vessel at all times while under power. Comfortable quarters for a crew of twelve men are located forward, which are a great improvement on those in the old sealing and fishing schooners. Aft are a couple of staterooms for the captain, mate and engineer. A commodious galley and mess room are also provided without affecting the vessel's cargo space. The construction throughout is very heavy, in order to withstand any kind of weather.

#### Ready in Three Months.

Messrs. Brewer & McBryde, the naval architects of this city, designed the vessel, and the contract calls for the completion of it within three months. Completed and equipped, the vessel will cost over \$10,000. Her behavior and cost of operation will be closely noted with a view to ordering a number of other vessels of this type, as it is believed the halibut fisheries of the north offer a rich harvest for economically operated power schooners of this type.

### WAS PRETTY AVIS LINNELL MURDERED BY HER REVEREND EX-SWEETHEART?

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Boston, Dec. 19.—The trial of Rev. Clarence V. Richeson, the pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, for the alleged murder of his jilted sweetheart, Avis Linnell, promises to arouse as much attention as the celebrated Thaw trial. The millionaire parents of Miss Edmonds, the young woman whom Richeson discarded in his girlish sweetheart in order to

marry, are placing ample funds at the young man's disposal in order to clear his name if possible.

Detectives are scouring the city beating up evidence in their effort to connect the purchase of the deadly cyanide which Richeson is known to have made a few hours before the young woman's death with the mysterious poison from which she suffered instant

death in the bathroom of her boarding house.

Feeling runs very high over the affair, and the effigy of Rev. Mr. Richeson has already been hanged from a tree in the grounds of his late church by some who have assumed his guilt before hearing the trial. The trial is fixed to open on January 15th.

A HINT FOR PRINCE RUPERT.

Nothing is more encouraging in the work of developing a progressive program for the development of Prince Rupert than to learn how other cities are achieving success.

Mr. J. W. Astley, the superintendent, shows that the tenders which he submitted to the city were very close to the actual cost of the work on which his tenders were accepted.

On asphalt No. 1 pavements, the total amount of the superintendent's tenders for which was \$426,021.44, there was a reduction of 7 per cent. below the figure for the same work in 1910.

The total amount of the superintendent's accepted tenders for sewers was \$64,828.52, and the actual cost was 2 per cent. below this amount. On block pavements the actual cost was 8 per cent. below the tenders, which amounted to \$4,712.42.

A suggestion of particular interest to Prince Rupert is contained in the statement of Mr. Astley that a sum of \$15,000 was saved to the city of Winnipeg last year by the city owning and operating its own gravel pit.

Gravel is a material of which the city of Prince Rupert will require great quantities. Foresight would suggest the wisdom of the city staking a few good gravel beds in the district before they are all gone.

Why not stake a couple of gravel pits for the city?

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—The first route plans for the Canadian Northern line into the Peace River country and across Northern British Columbia have been filed with the Railway Commission here.

The company is also building a line from Edmonton to Fort McMurray. By the end of this year the company hopes to have the rails laid as far as Athabasca Landing, the head of navigation.

"I was able to earn only a few dollars a week; that with the \$2.50 my oldest boy earned barely kept us," said Mrs. Godfrey to the Judge. "Then I told my husband that something would have to be done. I decided to get a job on a truck farm, thinking that if I did well I could bring the family out and that would be better for the children than to stay in the alley. I didn't have a cent of money, so I started out to walk. For ten miles I went along, resting when my feet got sore and tired, and then starting out again."

gifted lady was trained and educated by her father as if she had been a boy, and she thus obtained a power of observing conditions which would have been impossible for any ordinary Chinese lady.

The legal position of the Chinese woman is deplorable, and is one of the reasons why the movement for her greater freedom is making such rapid growth. She is subject to the three obediences—to her father in her childhood, to her husband after marriage and to her son in her widowhood. When a Chinaman has only daughters he says he has no children. A girl's parents dispose of her in marriage as they please—it has been hitherto the only career open to her—and she then becomes the property of her husband.

Though the women of the better classes rarely meet men outside their own immediate circle, they still exercise a great influence, and in one of the Chinese encyclopaedias 376 books out of 1,628 are devoted to famous women, and eleven chapters deal with their knowledge of literary works.
