FULL OF COMMUNISM

Rev. J. G. Inkster, former pastor of the largest Presbyterian Church in Victoria, recently expressed the hope that no Presbyterian youth would attend the Youth Congress at Toronto in May. He said the Congress was full of communists and anti-Christians. Special youth sermons are to be preached in Presbyterian churches on May 15, that day being known as Empire Youth Sunday.

Catholics throughout the country have been forbidden to participate in the Third Canadian Youth Congress because of its communistic tendencies.

It is claimed that the Youth Conference is along with the "League for Peace and Democracy," "The League" Against War and Fascism" and the "Progressive Veterans' Organization," just a branch of communist activity under the wing of the Communist Party and, therefore, something to be avoided.

It seems clear that subversive teachings and propaganda is encouraged by Communists in all parts of the continent with a view to stirring up discontent, especially among youth.

AGREEMENT WITH IRELAND

The announcement that an agreement has been arrived at between Britain and Ireland is one of the most welcome signs of the times. For many years there had been hostility between the two countries. 


