FIRE HALL AFFAIRS

Statement in Regard to Wages And Insurance Rates Given Out

Information given out at the City Hall in connection with a statement made by the Trades and Labor Council in a letter to this

paper yesterday is as follows: "In May, 1933, the month the Commissioner arrived, six men were on the Fire Department payroll besides the Chief. There has been no reduction. Five of the present men were then on the staff and in that month received as pay the sum of \$540. Last month the City paid the same five men \$520, three receiving less and two receiving more pay. The fire insurance rate in Prince Rupert is not higher than it was

when the Commissioner arrived. "The proposed change would not raise the rates. The proposed reorganization plan is exactly the same as is in effect in Nanaimo and the salaries and hours of labor the same. Nanaimo has a larger and wealthier population than Prince Rupert and is subject to more fires. being in a dryer climate but the fire rates are lower in Nanaimo than in Prince Rupert.

"The Prince Rupert Fire Department is now costing taxpayers from \$2000 to \$3000 more than Nanaimo pays. In 1937 the Prince Rupert Fire Department cost the city \$11,616.64, of which \$9,408.75 was in wages. The total cost of the Fire Department in Nanaimo for the same year was \$8,728."

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
