Many of the large public works in that country are now being carried out by the police department and now there has been added to the list the entire Soviet fleet of merchant ships trading both locally and with foreign countries.

We can easily imagine what an outcry there would be in Canada if the most important public works were placed under direct control of the Mounted Police. Yet in Russia we have what was thought to be the most democratic government in the world using the most autocratic method in the world of carrying out its public works and the operation of its merchant marine.

CO-OPERATIVE EFFORT

"As good a suggestion as we have heard for a long time in regard to doing something to help the interior country to prosperity was made just a few days ago in Smithers," says the Omineca Herald. "A farmer and a merchant were talking and the question of co-operation naturally came up. The merchant made the suggestion to the farmer that the farmers do a little co-operating; with the business houses in Prince Rupert who buy so much Bulkley Valley produce. It is not often that purchases can be made direct, but the Rupert business houses sell to the local merchants throughout the interior and the farmers can buy those goods from the local stores. It is desirable that the farmers, and the other people too who have any interest in the country insist on the goods produced or handled by the Prince Rupert firms. For instance, only one firm ever buys any beef or cattle or sheep from the interior farmers. If the farmers insisted on that firm's processed meats and other products the firm in Prince Rupert would be greatly encouraged to do more and do better for the farmers in the interior. It seems a really sensible course for the farmer to pursue. Especially is this so when quality equals and very often the price is lower. In short, follow the policy of patronizing those who patronize you and you will not go far astray."




