Today, however, plans to drive that road to Fairbanks, Alaska, loom large in the conversation of the man in the street.

Premier T. D. Pattullo's recent conferences in Washington, reports of a possible \$15,000,000 loan to British Columbia to finance the province's share of the project and a United States Senate-approved bill authorizing an Alaska highway commission to confer on buildings and financing arrangements with a similar Canadian group—these have administered a hypodermic to a scheme dormant since 1933.

It was in 1930 that the United States government appointed three-man commission to study the proposed route to Alaska. Its re-port, issued three years later, found "the highway is a feasible INSURGENTS project and can be built at a reasonable cost."

Its estimated cost for approximately 1.100 miles of new construction needed between Hazelton. B.C., and Fairbanks was \$14,000,-000, a figure since increased.






