CANADIAN YOUTH TO CARRY ON NATION'S TASKS

listment for Canada's defense forces if the country were attacked by armed forces.

"We in Canada," said one graduating student, "are thousands of miles away from Europe; their problems are not the problems that confront us. We live differently, have different view points and are not given to warlike ambitions and tendencies... Our primary interest naturally is in Canada and defense of our own shores is our first consideration though I believe that, in the event that England were attacked, you would see a great rallying to the Empire's cause, even by those who today express themselves as opposed to sending troops from Canada."

Inquiries found students and graduates of the University of the University of Manitoba "generally disinterested in the present-day war situation but on the whole decidedly partial to participation in any Imperial conflict, should it come." They would flock to the defense of Canada if invaded by a foreign power. Of "war-mindedness," however, there was little evidence.

Support Peace Moves

Dr. J. S. Johnson, president of the University of Saskatchewan, summed up student opinion in the attitude expressed by Anthony Eden, former British foreign secretary.

"It is fairly safe to say that the majority of students here are 'Anthony Eden-ites,'" he said. "They desire peace through conciliation rather than through rearmament. They are by no means belligerent and there is very little jingoism."

"There is no war-mindedness among the University of Saskatchewan students. Any activity for peace has the support of the student body. They have an intense interest in international affairs, as was indicated by the vast student attendances at lectures recently given by a well-known historian."

Archibald McEwen, president of the student union, University of Alberta, said the various faculties of that institution considered war an "unnecessary foolishness." He added the question of war service had not been discussed very much this year.

Consensus at the University of British Columbia was that very few Canadian graduates or undergraduates would enlist in the Imperial forces for a European war but that from 25 to 50 percent would volunteer for a Canadian expeditionary force for overseas if the United Kingdom was engaged in a campaign. Practically all would enlist in the Canadian forces if this country were attacked.

"The desire for 'peace at any cost' which was strong on the campus three or four years ago has diminished markedly," added the report from the Pacific coast university.
