DAWSON JUDGE TAKES STEP TO STOP GAMBLING

"Our Regiment" scored another gallant victory in the Empress Theatre last night, officered by members of the Prince Rupert Dramatic Society. The ladies received bouquets from the audience, and all received unstinted applause and appreciation.

The plot of the piece is a well-known one. Three male specimens of the genus chump, Capt. Fetherston and Guy Warrenner of the Eighth Lancers, and Rev. John Talbot, curate of Mudborough, all college chums, fall in love with three winsome ladies at the house of Mr. Dobbinson, a retired merchant who detests soldiers. After a chapter of amusing misfortunes everything gets straightened out by Providence, assisted by Mrs. Dobbinson, a strong-minded lady with a surplus of common sense and a henpecked husband.

In the minor role of the servant Batters Mr. James Russell did some good humorous work. FIRST TRAIN TO ALBERNI OPENED NEW LINE TODAY

OPENING OF NEW VANCOUVER ISLAND LINE WILL MEAN A GREAT DEAL TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE TIMBER, FISH AND MINERAL RESOURCES.

Victoria, Dec. 21.—Amid general rejoicings the first train into Port Alberni steamed into that town today in five hours from Victoria. When the complete plans are carried out Alberni will be but four hours from Vancouver. The steamer connection to Nanaimo will take two hours, and from Nanaimo to Port Alberni another two hours. The line from Victoria passes through Nanaimo.

The linking up of the line across Vancouver Island to Alberni marks a great step in the development of Vancouver Island. Situated at the head of Barkley Sound Alberni has a magnificent harbor and fisheries and also taps a district exceedingly rich in timber, agricultural and mineral resources. The scenic beauty of the Alberni district, and its wonderful climate, have made it for some time a resort of those tourists who could afford to motor to Alberni over the mountain road in the Beaufort Range. As one of the richest and rarest spots in Comox-Atlin, and the whole Pacific Coast, the completion of the line to Alberni means a great deal to the development of the British Columbia coast.

DAWSON PUTS END TO GAMBLING

Judge McCauley and the Mounted Police Make a Clean-Up of the Entire Gambling Element in the Yukon Town

EVEN SPECTATORS WERE HEAVILY FINED

Principals in Addition to a Fine of \$100 and Costs Each, Were Also Given Three Months' Jail Sentence—Capt. Horrigan of R.N.W.M.P. Tells Gamblers That the Game is Up, That Lid is on Tight and Will Remain On

Dawson, Dec. 20.—The roundup of gamblers in Dawson is now being pushed to a conclusion. The edict has gone forth that the games must cease here forever. Six men charged with keeping common gambling houses and eleven charged with playing or looking on at gambling games in the houses run by the first six were before Judge McCauley, who fined the proprietors \$100 and costs and also sentenced each to three months' imprisonment at hard labor. However, the sentence of imprisonment was suspended during good behavior.

The Judge made it plain that if any come before him again on like charges they will be required to serve the three months laid down in connection with this offense. Of the eleven spectators four were fined \$20 and costs and the others \$100 and costs, or given the option of two months in jail. They are paying.

The Judge made it plain that hereafter no fines will be extended. He declared that gambling must stop in Dawson for all time, and that he will do all in his power to see that those who attempt it are punished. After the cases had been disposed of today Captain Horrigan, commanding officer of the Mounted Police, stated that the lid had been put on tight and will remain on. The gambling and loafing element, says the Captain, is detrimental to the community and those who will not work, but try to live off those who do earn their money by hard work may as well make up their minds that the game is up.

ANOTHER WRIT AGAINST CITY

E. C. Latrace Files Document in Relation to Action to Recover \$500 Damages from the City for Delays.

Another writ has been issued against the city. The claim this time is for \$500 damages, the action being raised by E. C. Latrace, who was contractor for plank roadways. Registrar Burrell filed the writ yesterday afternoon, and it has been served on the city in time for tonight's Council meeting.

An impression exists in certain circles that the present Council clique, responsible for the fighting of the contractors' cases, are going to appeal against the judgment of Mr. Justice Clements. No definite ground for the rumor is obtainable yet from City Hall sources.

New Buildings Planned for Erection by R. T. Cruickshanks.

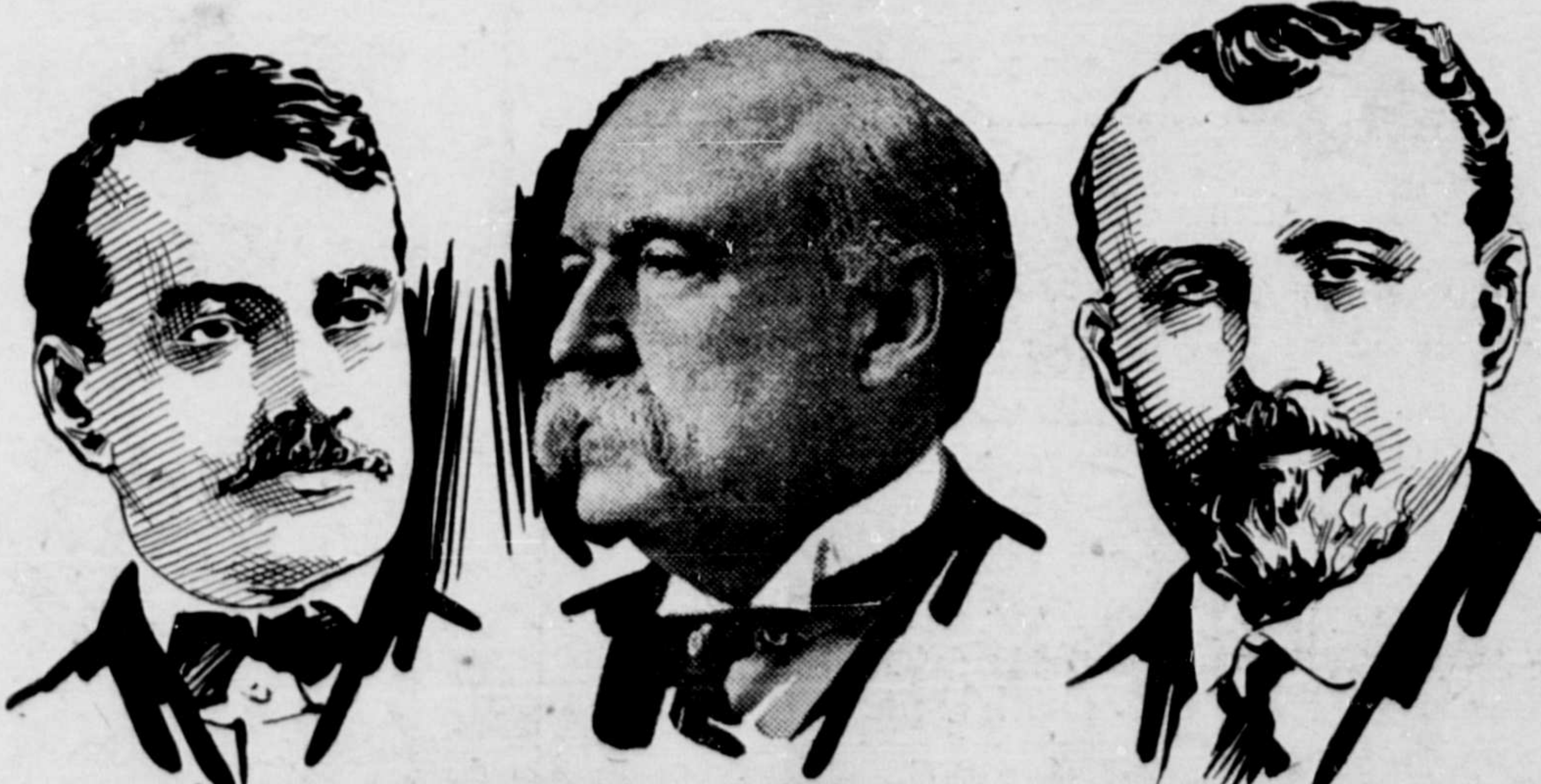

FINE CRAFT FOR HALIBUT TRADE

The Yacht Victor and Ethan on 15,000-Mile Trip From Boston to Seattle Under Own Power.

Seattle, Dec. 21.—Shipping and fishing men here are watching with interest the feat of the little auxiliary schooner yacht Victor and Ethan, now on her way from Boston, Mass., under her own power, to enter the Seattle halibut fishing trade.

The vessel is well known for her beautiful lines and comfortable cruising type under either sail or power. She is making the trip under the command of her owner, Captain Herbert W. Nickerson of Malden, Mass. She is 100 feet over all and has been equipped with a 110-horsepower engine. Under average conditions she can develop and maintain a speed of eight knots an hour. The vessel is carrying a supply of 2,000 gallons of gasoline, which is believed to be sufficient to bring her to Seattle.

SINGLE TAX IN ALBERTA

Premier Sifton to Introduce a Bill to Make it Optional—Model Institution for Cities to Be Drawn Up.

(Special to Daily News.) Edmonton, Dec. 21.—Premier Sifton has introduced a bill into the Legislature providing that the single tax throughout the province become operative in seven years hence.

A model constitution for municipalities is also to be drawn up.

RUPERT'S SHARE SHOULD BE BIG

Government Spent \$11,000,000 Last Year Developing Harbors. Vancouver and Victoria Shared Largely.

Over \$11,000,000 was the sum spent by the Dominion Government during the past year in developing harbors on the Canadian coast. Ten years ago only \$4,000,000 was spent, and twenty years ago only \$2,000,000, approximately. Harbor buildings, such as the quarantine and marine stations at Prince Rupert, come into the estimates, also all work such as deepening rivers and estuaries, etc. Vancouver and Victoria came in for a goodly share of the developing going, and the port of Toronto also received attention. A growing share in this expenditure will be due to rising Prince Rupert in future years.

SECTION TWO BRIDGE

Two Novel Plans are Proposed of Dividing the Cost.

The committee of section two ratepayers, composed of S. P. McCormick, Dr. Kergin, R. A. White, W. A. Ferguson, M. Albert and J. A. Hilditch, who are to go into the cost of plating and rough grading the section will also consider the question of a high level bridge to that section.

Wm. Manson, M.P.P., has suggested distributing the cost of this bridge in three, amongst the Government, the G.T.P. and the city. An idea which comes in for considerable consideration is that of W. J. Alder, who suggested that the distribution be into four, the three parties named, and the owners of section two lots.

THE G. T. P. AND THE HAZELTON TOWNSITES.

The strong attitude taken by Chairman Mabee in regard to the Hazelton townsites will do a great deal to clear the country of doubtful townsite propositions, and create confidence in the electors. All who know Judge Mabee personally felt quite sure that the action of the railway company in forcing a sale of the South Hazelton property as the official Hazelton townsite before the change had been sanctioned by the Railway Commission would be visited with dire wrath. The Chairman of the Railway Board is the strongest man in Canada. His magnificent physique, and voice like the rumblings of thunder, only dimly betoken the great spirit of the man.

An eminent member of the Ontario bar voiced regrets to the writer when "Jim" Mabee left the bar for the bench. Many judges expressed their regret later when their "learned brother Mabee" left the bench after a brief but masterly period to become Chairman Mabee of the Railway Commission. But those who knew the precautions which Mr. Justice Mabee took to ensure absolute freedom of hand in his new position felt sure that he saw in the chairmanship of the Railway Commission an opportunity to serve the people of Canada in a way for which he was, in a singular sense, pre-eminently fitted.

The general public rather misunderstood Mr. Justice Morrison's action in dismissing the injunction for which Mr. Robert Kelly had applied on behalf of the owners of New Hazelton. It was not because he thought Mr. Kelly had no just claim for an injunction. On the contrary, he told him that he had done the right thing in applying for an injunction, as showing that he had done all he could to stop the sale. "But," he argued, "if I grant an injunction I must take the view that the Railway Board will be influenced by any sales that the defendants may make previous to their sitting. I cannot make any such assumption."

Mr. Kelly's action was really in the interests of the railway company as well as in the interests of the investing public. Had the injunction been granted it would have saved the company from the heavy expense of advertising and conducting the sale, and also from the charge of bad faith to the public. It would also have saved the company from the expropriation of the Chairman of the Railway Commission.

The outcome of the incident should give satisfaction to all who desire the progress of the Pacific Coast. Confidence is necessary if capital or immigration is to come. If the railway company has no respect for its promises, it is a measure of satisfaction to know that the Railway Board is prepared to see that the company does not lightly step out of its obligations to the public.

MIKE GIBBONS' RISE

The Story of a Welterweight Who Is on the Road to Fame.

Six weeks ago local sporting men had never heard of Mike Gibbons, the wonderful St. Paul welterweight, who is probably the greatest boxer in the world, although only 20 years old.

Gibbons, with a St. Paul sporting man who furnished a railroad ticket, started for New York a month ago. The young boxer had won several bouts in the Northwest, including two from Jimmy Clabby, and believing that he might earn some good money here, he made the journey without a flourish of trumpets.

Going straight to the Polo Athletic Club Gibbons saw Manager Newman. "I've come here to box some of your best boys," said Gibbons. "All I want is a chance."

Newman, though he never had seen or heard of the St. Paul wonder, promptly dug up several rough and ready boxers who train at the club and introduced them to Gibbons. In a few minutes the gloves were put on and Gibbons in his shirt sleeves proceeded to slam his opponents all about the gymnasium. Two young men were knocked down and another received a "blue eye" in less time than it takes to tell it. Newman's eyes fairly popped out of his head as he saw Gibbons move about the floor space. He had seen all of the great boxers during 30 years past, yet Gibbons seemed better than any of them.

"I'll give you a match with a fellow named Sherman, a former battle ship sailor," said Newman. "He'll meet you in a week."

Gibbons was delighted, and when he met Sherman sporting men wondered what he was like. In four rounds Gibbons displayed remarkable skill and finally knocked Sherman out. Newman told him he could have a match with Willie Lewis at the Fairmont A. C. Gibbons outclassed Lewis in a ten-round bout so easily that ring followers were astonished. For that victory he received only \$500, which, he said, was big money.

Then came his clean-cut triumph over Walter Coffey at the Fairmont A. C. last week, for which he pocketed a trifle more than \$900. But the money was nothing compared to the reputation he established as a superb boxer and probably the best welterweight in the profession. The remarkable feature of Gibbons' ability is the fact that he combines boxing skill with hard hitting.

Abe Attell, the featherweight champion, also a great boxer, after watching Gibbons trim Coffey last week, said:

"Gibbons has a head. He is one of the foxiest men I've ever seen. One of the secrets of his success is the way he makes the other fellow miss. He doesn't jump away so far that his opponent misses him by a yard, for that would be discouraging. He avoids blows by so small a margin that his antagonist constantly believes he can land if he keeps on trying. His feinting is a treat, his footwork is marvelous, and when he starts a punch he doesn't miss. He has a wonderful pair of eyes and is a quick thinker. Just say for me that Gibbons is a wonder."

CANDY FOR CHRISTMAS.

A Good Recipe for Making Chocolate Fudge.

Two cups granulated sugar, 1 cup milk or water, 2 ounces chocolate (grated) or 3 tablespoons cocoa, one-eighth teaspoon cream of tartar or one-fourth cup of corn syrup, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

1. Method: Put sugar, cream of tartar, chocolate, butter and water in a saucepan; stir until dissolved.

2. Cook until it makes a soft ball when dropped from a spoon into cold water.

3. Add vanilla, after mixture has slightly cooled.

4. When the candy is done beat until thick enough to spread on a buttered pan or platter.

5. Cut in squares when cool.

Note—When testing candy for the "soft ball" stage remove saucepan of hot syrup from the fire each time the test is made. This is to prevent further cooking while testing if the candy is done.

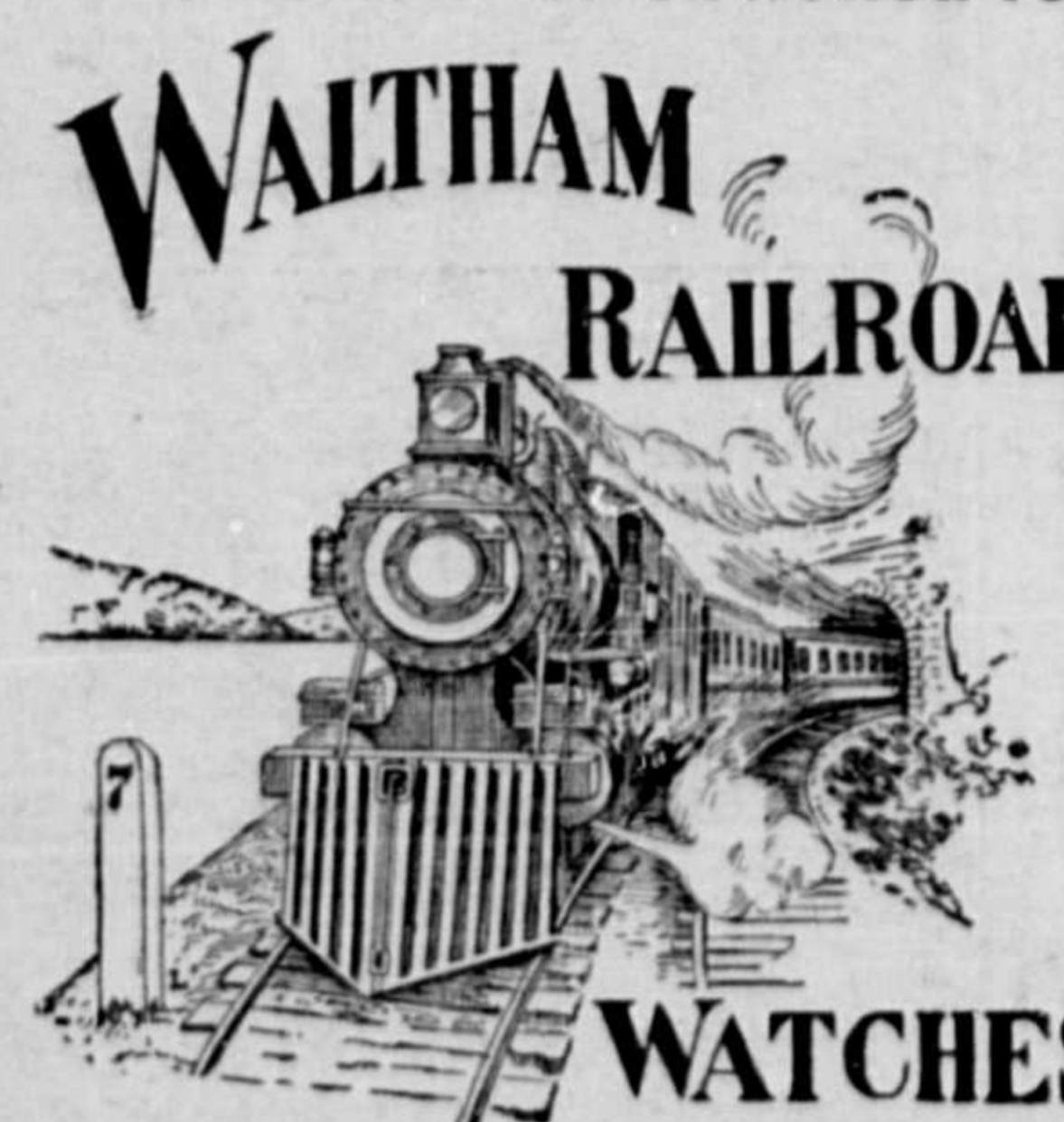
