### SOCIALISTIC LEGISLATION

The Conservative government of Great Britain is securing the passage of legislation for the nationalization of coal mines, a decidedly socialistic move. It will take the ownership of the mines out of the hands of the four thousand who now own them and make them the property of the nation, just as the C.N.R. is the property of Canada.




