PARALYSIS IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER-Vancouver's first case of infantile paralysis in the present epidemic was reported yesterday, a small Point Grey boy being stricken. One other case is receiving treatment here— a Pender Harbor patient who has been kept alive in an iron lung for some weeks. A girl, who developed the malady in a summer resort, died on Monday.

DALADIER ENDORSED

PARIS-Premier Daladier's plan to abandon the 40-hour week as an emergency measure in order to speed up naval and armament construction in view of the international situation was endorsed yesterday by the Popular Front party which called upon other parties to also support it. The dominating Socialist party is, however, opposed and a seamen's strike is threatened if any attempt is made to carry the plan to conclusion.

CONVENTION OPENS

KELOWNA-The provincial Liberal convention opened here this morning with delegates in attendance from all parts of the province. The Alaska Highway will be one of many important matters to be discussed by the convention. The resolutions committee is now in session.

ITALO-JAPANESE FRIENDSHIP

ROME-Another token of Italo-Japanese friendship came yesterday with the decoration of Premier Benito Mussolini with the Grand Cordon of the Supreme Order of the Chrysanthemum, highest honor in the gift of Japan for a foreigner.

TOKYO PLANE CRASH

TOKYO-Two large airplanes, one a transport, crashed in mid-air over Tokyo yesterday and twenty-eight persons perished. In the resulting disorder, 130 persons sustained injuries requiring hospital treatment.

DEMOCRATIC RIFT

WASHINGTON-Posibility of a rift in the Democratic Party involving President Roosevelt and Postmaster-General James A. Farley appeared Wednesday night to hinge on the decision of Senator James P. Pope, Democrat, whether to run or not as an independent candidate in the November elections in Idaho. The New Deal senator, who was defeated by Representative D. Worth Clark in the recent Democrat primary, apparently, holds the key to a situation which may result in confirming whether Mr. Roosevelt and Farley have broken or are on the verge of a break.

AGREEMENT WITH CHURCH

VATICAN CITY-The Observatore Romano announced Wednesday night that the Fascist Party had agreed to permit its members to join the Catholic Active Vatican Youth Organization as a result of the Vatican government agreement Saturday.

MERCED, Cal.-Mrs. Ola Irene Harwell, 26-year-old religious fanatic, obsessed with the idea that she had sinned, was in critical condition Wednesday from shock and loss of blood after she had gouged out her right eye with a pair of scissors and hacked off her left hand with an axe during family prayers Tuesday night.

DROWNED AT KILLARNEY



"The change in temper of the British government," evidence of which has been accumulating since the critical week-end of May 21, when apparently the threat of British intervention effectively stopped the invasion of Czechoslovakia by the German army, must re regarded as a most promising token of prolonging the present period st. "The long and devastating period of uncertainty when Great Britain did nothing to check the arrogant gestures of Tokio and of the dictators of the Rome-Berlin axis appears to be drawing to a close, if it has not already definitely ended. It seems apparent that the policy of firmness advocated by Mr. Eden when he left the government last February is new in process of adoption, and that' the policy of retreat and weakness, cloaked as conciliation and appeasement is to be abandoned.

This periodical concludes its survey with the comment that there has been unquestionably revealed a slight move by Mr. Chamberlain towards the viewpoint of those who have consistently critized the policy of acquiescence:

"If this really is the trend of the Prime Minister's mind, we may yet find that today's lull does not mean that we are in the calm centre of the hurricane, but that we are actually sailing into smooth seas."

According to the report they show a very decided decrease in population so another census is to be taken next year in which the census officials must show an increase.

Another thing the Stalinists do not like in the census; returns is that too many of the people list themselves as professing some kind of religion. They have to be instructed before the next census is taken. The "gang of wreckers" who took the first census were too honest to do the job again so they have been disposed of. It seems that even census figures must bow to the will of the dictators.

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


