Mr. T. D. Pattullo is responsible for the excellent suggestions contained in the following letter to the Editor:

Another two years will see the transcontinental about completed and it is therefore desirable that every possible preparation should be made for the reception of not only the large number of people who will come to Prince Rupert to live but also for the entertainment of the thousands who will only be visitors, but whose impressions may be of incalculable benefit to the city.

It occurs to me that this is a most opportune time for the Provincial Government to begin the construction of a road around Kaien Island and also to the top of the hill. The cost will not be very great and in any event the Province is reaping so much benefit through the opening up of Northern B. C. that at least some of the money derived from the sale by the Government of Prince Rupert real estate should be reinvested in public conveniences for the city.

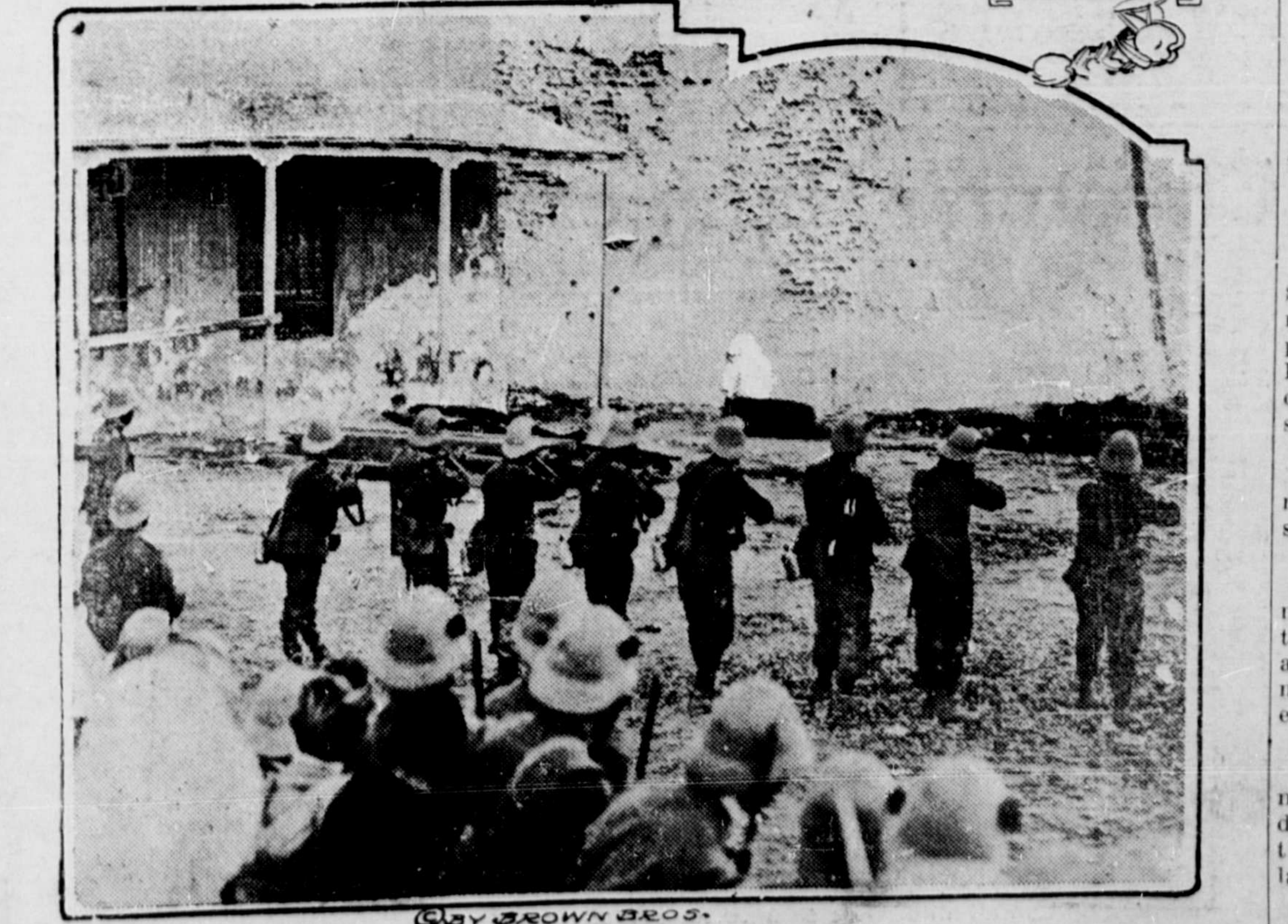
The view from the top of the hill will be one of the scenic attractions of the Pacific Coast.

In addition to the roads already referred to, a road should be built around Schwatlans Lake and a park laid out at the upper end of the lake.

It is not too soon to start these things. They will take a couple of years to complete and the more advantages the city can show with the completion of the railroad the greater will be the impetus to development.

THE GAEKWAR OFFERS APOLOGY

Native Indian Ruler Brooding Over His Troubles Offends the King and Queen at the Durbar

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Delhi, Dec. 22.—The Gaekwar of Baroda has formally apologized to the British crowd for bowing only once and then immediately turning his back on King George and Queen Mary during the Durbar ceremony. He is in a very nervous state.

It is thought here that he did not intend to insult the British sovereigns, but felt embarrassed in their presence as a result of the scandal hanging over his head in London.

The Gaekwar was in England as one of the representative rulers of India during the coronation week. Since his return to India he has been publicly named as co-respondent in an action involving the name of a woman of the nobility. This is thought to have had something to do with his confusion during the Durbar ceremonies, causing his inadvertent actions.

CHRISTMAS DAY, 1911.

It is a seemingly ironic comment on humanity that twenty centuries after the message of "Peace on Earth and Good Will toward men" that Christmas Day, 1911, should find a battlefield the centre of the world's stage in both hemispheres.

Not that the sword is more barbaric and cruel than the coward's kiss, nor that the earth is a scene of peace, even when there are no battlefields to drain it of its human blood. The cruelties of every rich and prosperous state—cruelties which seem to be a part of its richness and prosperity—are greater than the cruelties of war. Even the death toll on the railways of a neighboring country, chargeable for the most part to a greed for profits that counts it cheaper to pay for human blood than to protect life, was greater last year than the death toll in Britain's last great war.

Beneath the beauty and repose of Nature, the scientist discovers "Nature red in tooth and claw." All life is a struggle, and the mere incident of an armed clash in China or Tripoli counts but little in the great aggregate of conflict that forever has been the lot of the dwellers on earth's surface.

A bloodstained field in China and another in Tripoli do not necessarily imply that the world is not advancing to a stage where the angels' song can better be realised. There can be no hallowed peace where justice is not, and one battlefield at least, despite the mists of passion and human hate that surround it, is more an object for the peace angels to rejoice at than weep over.

Life is a struggle—for the most part a struggle for economic existence. Out of that struggle comes progress. Clearly born from it is our own city and community of Prince Rupert. For a real ground of Christmas rejoicing anyone of us might well give thanks that we are here in the land of great opportunities, where every man is as good as his neighbor, and life offers a chance to all.

Twenty centuries after the angels' message does not find the millennium here, but it does find the world immensely quickened in its sense of justice and love for its neighbor. Man who has not yet ridden his body of the rudiments of claws and tail has not yet ridden his heart of the fierce hate and passion of the beast. But at least he divides that latter habitation with an angel at times, and enables the poet of today to bid the Christmas chimes

"Ring out a slowly dying cause"
And ancient forms of party strife;
Ring in the nobler modes of life
With sweeter manners, purer laws.

Ring in the valiant man and free,
The larger heart, the kinder hand;
Ring out the darkness of the land,
Ring in the Christ that is to be."

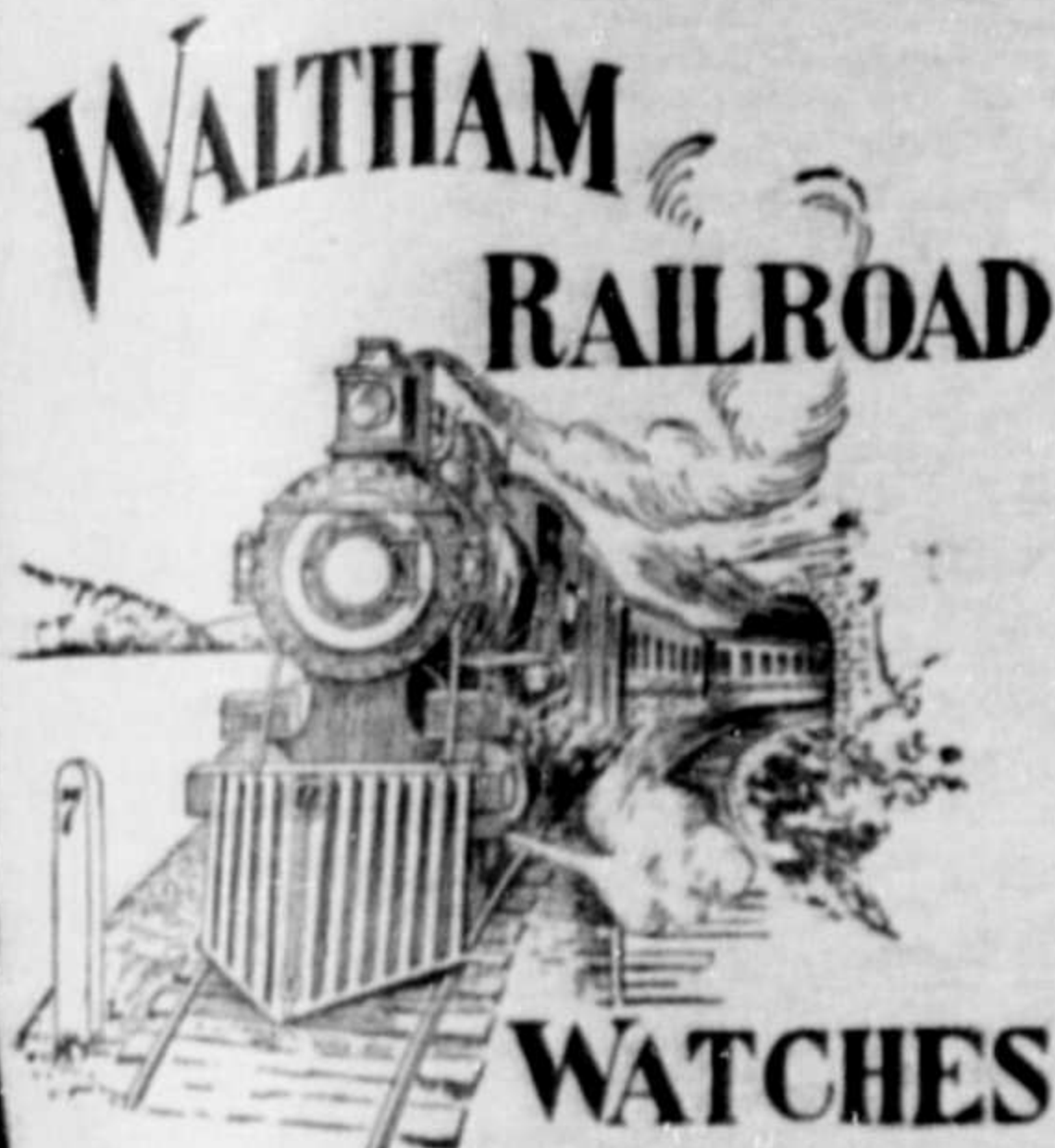

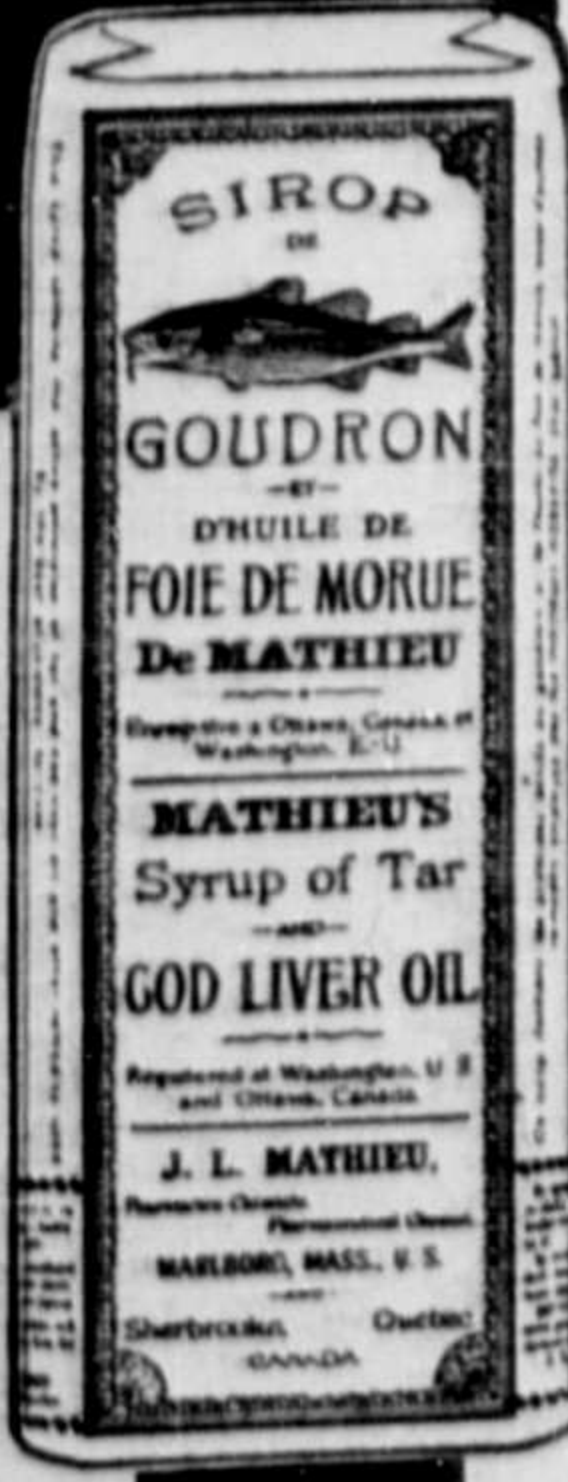

QUESTIONS THE KIDDIES ASK.

Why We Have Plum Pudding.
Plum pudding and mince pies have only been made in their present form during the last two or three hundred years. It was in ancient times the practice for people to give one another at Christmas time little cakes roughly shaped in the human form, and these represented the infant Jesus and His mother. This became more elaborate as time went on and developed into a great Christmas pie made up of all kinds of things — chicken, eggs, spices, raisins, currants, sugar, candied peel and so on. The pies were made in the supposed shape of the manger in which Jesus was laid. The various ingredients, coming, as many did, from the east, were said to represent the gifts of the wise men to Jesus. Later the pies were made in the more convenient round shape, and developed into our plum puddings and mince pies.

Why Children Have Christmas Trees.

The Christmas tree was very little known in England before the coming of Prince Albert, the husband of Queen Victoria, who introduced the custom from Germany. It is supposed to have been derived from a custom of the ancient Egyptians, who used to deck their houses at this period of the year with branches of date palm, their symbol of life triumphing over death. In Germany, far more than here, the trees are gaily illuminated with lighted candles, a practice that grew out of the custom of keeping a large candle alight at Christmas time in the churches to show that Jesus, the Light of the World, had come.

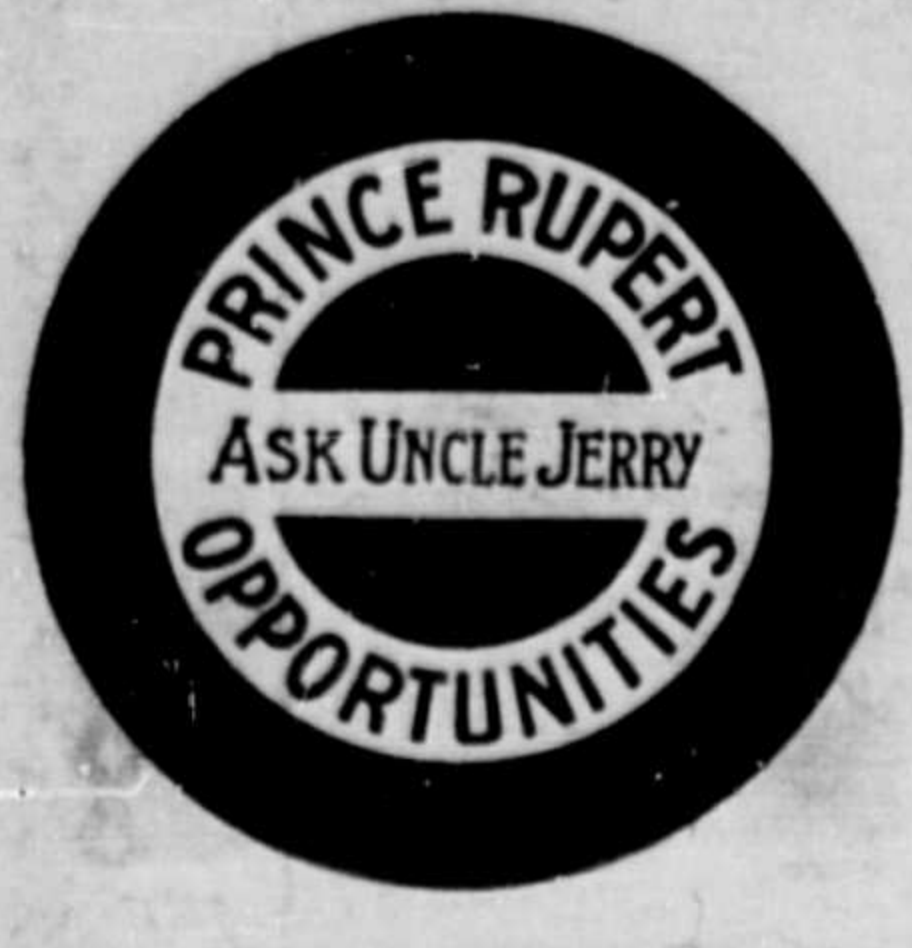
