HOLD UP JAPANESE With Arbitration At Deadlock, Conference Private Is Now On

Impasse Reached Over Demand of Fishermen For Independent Auditor Of Books Of Cannery Companies

VANCOUVER, August 12.—(CP)—A round table conference of representatives of fishermen and salmon canners with members of the arbitration board is being held today at the suggestion of Mr. Justice Denis Murphy, chairman of the arbitration board, in an attempt to de-Vitermine whether a compromise can be reached in the dis-

pute concerning 1938 salmon prices for Northern British Columbia. The meeting is private and discussions are off the record.

The suggestion of the conference was made after an impasse had been reached in regard to the fishermen's request in regard to an independent audit of cannery books. 


