MONARCHY

Ruler of Leitchenstein, One Of World's Tiniest Nations, Passes

VIENNA, July 26:-Prince Francis I, ruler of the tiny principality of Liechtenstein, and one of the wealthiest men in the world, died yesterday. Born August 28, 1853, he succeeded on February 11, 1929, on the death of his brother, the 89year old Prince John II, who had ruled for seventy-one years. He married on July 22, 1929, Frau Elsa von Eroes, the former Baroness Guttman of Vienna.

Liechtenstein is on the Upper Rhine between Austria and Switzerland. It was a member ct 1/8 the German Confederacy until 1866. For years it was a dependency of 1 1/8 Austria but in 1918 its complete independence was declared. It is 81/4 incorporated in the Swiss customs 1/2 territory and its foreign interests are represented by Switzerland.




