Fire Disaster at Rouyn is Followed By Six Pedsons Being Drowned From Automobile

ROUYN, Quebec, Nov. 14: (CP) -Major tragedy for the second time within forty-eight hours visited this Northern Quebec mining district when an automobile plunged off a ferry landing into icy river waters yesterday, carrying six persons to their deaths, making fourteen to be counted dead accidentally after the blackest week-end in Rouyn history.

Of the six victims, five were members of one family of Russians-father, mother and three daughters. They were returning to their home at Val d'Or after a visit to Rouyn.

The ferry was on the opposite side of the river when the automobile took the death plunge over the end of the ferry wharf.

The car tragedy followed the hotel fire holocaust of early Friday when seven persons are believed to have been burned to death. The remains of A. J. H. Stevenson, Toronto travelling salesman, were found at the week-end. Four others- W. H. Brownell, North Bay; Etienne Pelland, Rouyn; I. Legare, Vald'or, and Aime Letourneau, Lasarre—are known dead as a result of the fire while Romauld Coutu and Jack Clenachan are believed dead and given up as such.

The fourteenth fatality was the crushing to death of George Kradinovich in a mine accident.

### A SUPERMAN PASSES

While very few people like dictators or absolute rulers, the president and virtual dictator of the Turkish Empire who died last week was a benevolent ruler who not! only restored Turkey to international importance after the war but also brought about reforms which, in the ordinary course of events, would have taken centuries to: produce. He must have had a wonderful personality to be able to move the capital from Constantinople to Angora, to abolish the veil and the harem for women, to give religious liberty to the people and generally to introduce modern civilization and give the country a strong impetus! toward democracy.

The reign of the strong man in any country is important. Committees can never take the place of the superman. In the case of Kemal, his own outstanding personality was chiefly responsible for his successes. He was a born leader of men. But like many other supermen, he had feet of clay.

### NOT IN ISOLATION

The return of colonies to Germany "cannot be considered in isolation" stated Prime Minister Chamberlain in the British Parliament last week. Possibly he had in mind that two former German colonies were held by Japan and that country had intimated that it would not give; them up under any conditions. If Britain gives back any of the colonies so must Japan. That seems reasonable.

### WANT STRONG GOVERNMENT

France wants a strong government. The vacillation of members of the French Chamber of Deputies with the consequent frequent changes of government has made! it very difficult to carry out any steady policy and is not suited to a time such as the present when continuity is much to be desired.
