# Civil War Is Now Nearing Climax

## PASSING OF COL. HOUSE

"Mystery Man," Who Was President Wilson's Personal Advisor, Dies in New York

NEW YORK, March 28: (CP)—Col. Edward Mandell House, internationally known as a close advisor to President Woodrow Wilson during and after the Great War dies here after a long illness at the age of seventy-nine years.

To the end, Edward Mandell House treasured the memory of his friendship with Woodrow Wilson. The sudden lapsing of the extraordinary comradeship of the wartime president and "the little gray man from Texas," which had carried them through national and world crises together, was to Col. House himself a "tragic mystery."

A letter written by the colonel to his friend, Professor Charles Seymour of Yale University who had compiled his papers, revealed the steadfastness of his devotion to the man he had served as chief counsellor and "super-ambassador."

"There were many doors in the temples that men of old reared to their gods, to the sun and to the moon," he wrote. "Behind the innermost door dwelt the mysteries."

"And now you have had access to my most intimate papers ask me to unlock the innermost door, a door to which I have no key. My separation from Woodrow Wilson and is, to me a tragic mystery, a mystery that now can never be dispelled, for its explanation lies buried with him."

"Theories I have and theories they must remain. Never during the years we worked together was there an unkind or impatient word written or spoken and this to me is an abiding consolation. While our friendship was not of long duration it was a close as human friendship can grow to be. To this, his letters and mine bear silent testimony."

"Until a shadow fell between us I never had a more considerate friend and my devotion to his memory remains and will remain unchanged."

**Man of Mystery**  
To the general public Colonel House was a man of mystery, holding international secrets and wielding tremendous power as the counsellor of President Wilson in the world war days and through the peace negotiations.

A native of frontier Texas who as a boy saw shooting affrays in the streets of Houston, he became the intimate of the world's great personages in the momentous period from 1914 to 1919. A familiar but unobtrusive figure in the captivity of the warring nations, he had on his calling list such names as Kaiser Wilhelm, Clemenceau and George and King Albert of Belgium.

The quiet, self-effacing man who went about his important missions abroad so unostentatiously had been President Wilson's confidential adviser and friend since his

## Applications For Home Loans Made

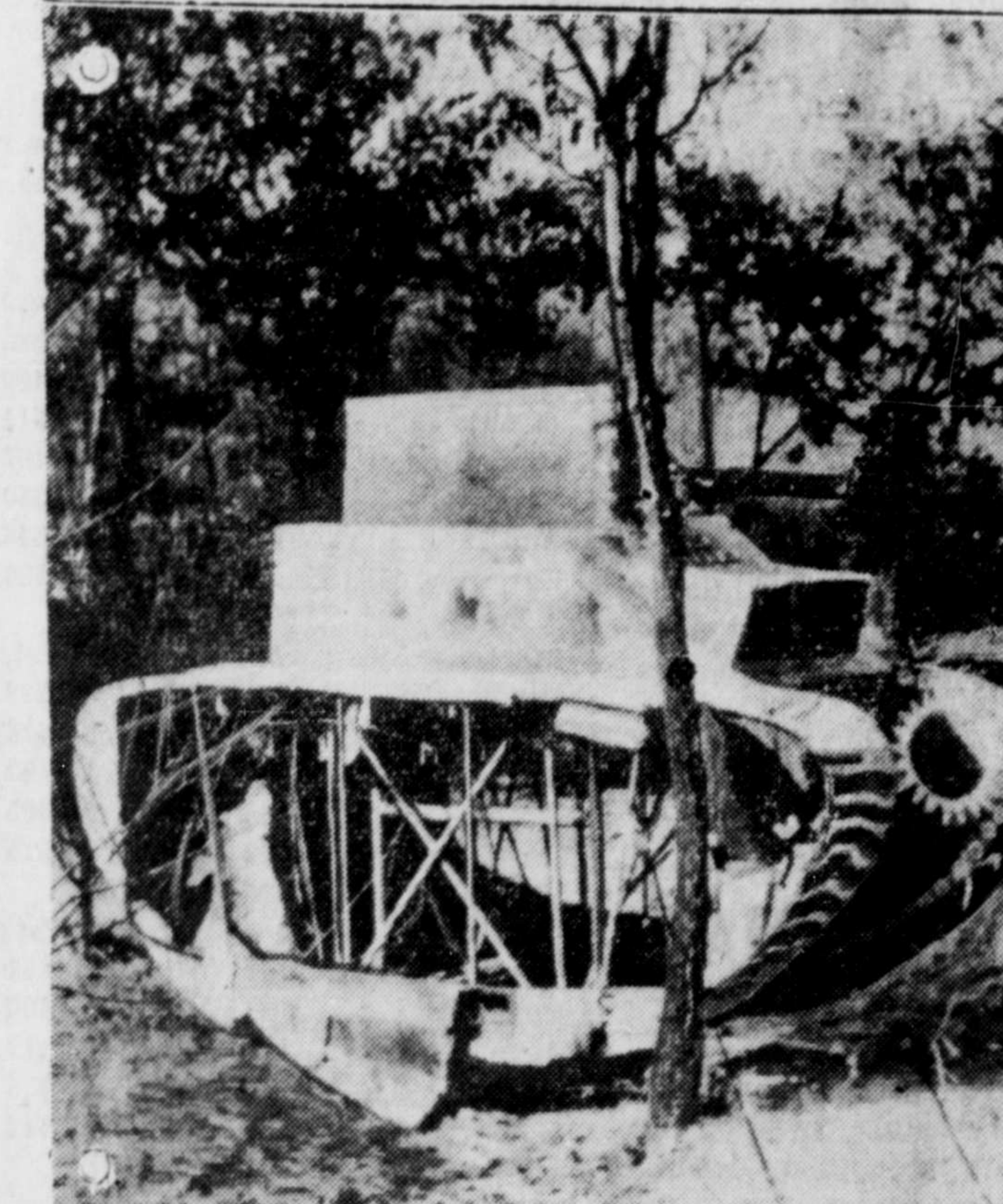
More Interest Will, However, Have To Be Shown If Assistance is to Be Obtained

## CUT IN SILVER

## MEXICAN RIOTING

SHANGHAI, March 28: (CP)—Although reports from the Sino-Japanese war at the week-end indicated that the Chinese were not only holding the Japanese invaders but driving them back at some points, the Japanese indicate the early commencement of a new offensive with a drive on the important centre of Soochow, capture of which the Nipponese believe would give them a strong hold on Northern China.

## MARCH ON TO COAST OF SPAIN

Insurgent Advance Continues—Talk of Counter-Revolution in Barcelona

HENDAYE, France, March 28: (CP)—General Francisco Franco's smashing drive towards the Mediterranean coast continues today and a climax seems near in the Spanish civil war after twenty months of conflict. The insurgents are now reported to have advanced to within twenty-five miles of the coast and government troops are in full retreat.

In Spanish government quarters at Barcelona it is said that the advancing rebel forces consist of more than half foreign soldiers, there being 50,000 Italian and 10,000 Germans.

There were insurgent air raids Saturday on the cities of Terragona and Reus which resulted in six persons being killed and twenty-five injured. Further bombing raids are anticipated and Barcelona continues darkened by night with great searchlights ready to play their rays on attacking aircraft and assist the training of guns upon them.

Catalonia has been invaded by the rebels and, after occupying Fraga, the insurgents marched today toward the ancient industrial city of Lerida, pointing to a battle which General Franco hopes will definitely win him the civil war.

Meantime, at Barcelona and elsewhere restlessness continues with fear of anarchist and syndicalist riots against the government.

Among many loyalist Spaniards, however, the belief still exists that, in spite of the recent serious reverses, government forces may yet make a decisive stand against the oncoming Fascists.

## France Falls in Line

PARIS, March 28: (CP)—The French government, it is reported in authoritative quarters, has decided to fall in with the British policy of not intervening in the Spanish civil war.

JAPAN FEELING PRESSURE

That Japan is feeling the pressure at home is shown in the fact that the government is gradually taking control of vital industries in the country.

WILL NEED FRIENDS

Before the war is over Japan will need friends so she is already making her peace with the United States by agreeing to withdraw all her citizens from the deep sea fishing that affects this coast.

Had the war in China been finished successfully, the probability is that the Japanese would have held out for what they considered their right to the deep sea fishing but, in view of the need, they are showing the first sign of trying to placate a neighboring nation.

THE QUEBEC REBELLION

The movement in Quebec against domination by British interests in that province is said to be the direct outcome of the effort made by certain financial interests to exact more than a just share of dividends.

It seems rather a pity that the nation should be divided along these racial lines. For many years Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a French-Canadian, was Prime Minister of Canada and he received whole-hearted support from the English speaking Liberals and independents who elected his government time after time.



TORONTO GOES UP

Makes It Two Straight Games Over Boston Bruins—Black Hawks And Amerks Win

TORONTO, March 28.—To onto Maple Leafs defeated the much-touted Boston Bruins by a score of 2 to 1 at Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto Saturday night to take a two game lead in the play-off series between the leaders of the two National Hockey League sections.

In the Stanley Cup series, Chicago, in overtime conquered Montreal Canadiens by a score of three to two to take the third place team series. The Black Hawks thus won the right to meet the winners of the second place series between New York Rangers and New York Americans for the right to play against the Toronto-Boston winners in the final series for the cup.

The Americans early today cleared hurdle by downing the Rangers 3 to 2 in the fourth overtime period after a hectic struggle. Lorne Carr snapped in Art Chapman's pass for the winning counter, sending the Americans into the semi-final against Chicago.

Premier Hoop And Shuttle Teams Coming

Local sporting interest will centre this week-end on the visit of Premier basketball and badminton teams. The party, numbering some fifteen or so persons, will arrive Thursday evening aboard the steamer Prince Rupert from the north and will return to Premier on the Catala next Sunday evening. The basketball games between Premier and Prince Rupert, continuing the Northern British Columbia championship series which was started early in the month with the playing of two games at Premier, will be played Thursday and Friday evenings while the inter-town badminton tournament will be held Saturday evening.

PLACER MINING LEASES

Size and method of staking, etc. Eighty acres by extent, staked along a "location line" not more than one-half mile in length. In this line one bend or change of direction is permitted...

PROVISIONAL FREE MINERS' CERTIFICATES

Department of Mines Act. Among other things these Acts provide for the staking and representing of placer claims without payment of fees and assistance to prospectors by free assays, etc.

She was within two miles of the French shore and wanted to continue, but her trainers took her from the water. Last year poor weather conditions prevented the Nova Scotian from making another attempt.

Gives Order 10 Months Ahead at British Industries Fair

LONDON, March 28: (CP)—Queen Mary ordered her Christmas cards for 1938—10 months early—at the British Industries Fair. She chose a design of a rose garden with a sun dial.

When the royal party was being shown the new five-suit playing cards for bridge the Duke of Kent said: "I find contract bridge difficult enough. Another suit will just make it more complicated." The King and Queen, however, bought two packs, the King explaining that they would like to try the game.

One of the things that interested the royal visitors was a white fabric made entirely from spun glass. "I can scarcely believe it is entirely of glass," said the Queen, while the King, after feeling the material, asked if he could have a suit made of it. It was explained that it had not yet reached that stage of development, whereupon the King remarked with a smile, "Lancashire must look to its laurels."

The King and Queen made many purchases at a stand where a number of soft animals were exhibited. The King turned to the Queen and said: "Thank heaven, the children are not here. We would never have got them away from this stand."

## SEASON IS UNDER WAY THIS WEEK

Cape Beale, First Boat, Clears For Banks—Area No. 2 Fleet To Start Leaving Wednesday

Clattering hammers echo along the waterfront today as crews put the finishing touches on Prince Rupert's halibut fleet which fishes the widespread banks along the British Columbia coast. First of the local boats to get away for the banks this year is the Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnott, which left for Area No. 3 last night. The Area No. 2 boats will start leaving Wednesday and Thursday, ready to begin fishing when the 1938 season opens officially April 1. They will join others from Seattle, Vancouver and Alaskan ports such as Juneau, Ketchikan, Petersburg, Wrangell and Sitka.

For between four and five months, the boats will bound over waves of the open Pacific, pounding toward the coastline. And those months won't be very comfortable for the crews, ranging from three to nine men according to the size of the boat.

"There's a lot more room for fish than for men," one captain said. And that was no exaggeration, either. The representative halibut vessel has huge holds for storing the fresh-caught fish and a tiny cabin for the captain with foci for the crew. Below the cabin is the sturdy engine.

Once the halibut banks are reached, the fishermen will spend most of their time in oilskins, scant protection against biting wind and swirling spray that makes the halibut fisherman's life anything but a white collar job.

Members of each crew sign on as partners at the beginning of the season. The boat takes 20 percent of total returns and the rest is divided among the fishermen, including the skipper, after expenses are deducted.

**Million Dollar Industry**  
Last year the British Columbia halibut fleet caught fish valued at about \$1,000,000. Most of that money was spent for motor fuel, fishing gear and food for fishermen's families.

This year returns should be slightly higher. The International Fisheries Commission, which regulates the catch from halibut banks along the North Pacific coast between Oregon and the Bering Sea, increased permissible catch from Areas 2 and 3 where the British Columbia boats fish.

The 1938 limit for Area 2—stretching from southeastern Alaska, along the British Columbia coast to the northern part of Washington state—was lifted from 21,700,000 pounds to 22,700,000; and for Area 3—off the coast of Alaska to the north and west—from 24,300,000 to 25,300,000.

**Maintaining Prices**  
To maintain halibut prices, the fishing vessel owners and fishermen have instituted a voluntary curtailment program. Under this plan are controlled the 200 boats working out of Seattle, 36 in Juneau, 36 in Ketchikan and 33 in Petersburg as well as the British Columbia craft—75 or so from Prince Rupert and forty odd from Vancouver.

The voluntary curtailment program has been worked out despite the questioned validity of Natural Products Marketing Acts.

In Area 2, halibut boats will be permitted to land 2,500 pounds of fish per man when landing is made at Seattle, and 2,300 pounds if landed in British Columbia. For Area 3 the limit is 3,500 per man per trip, regardless of landing port.

All vessels will lay up 13 days between the first and second trips, 12 days between the second and third trips, and 10 days between each remaining trip.

An added source of revenue to the halibut fleet is sale of fish livers and viscera, used for medicinal purposes because they are rich in vitamins. This branch of the industry netted British Columbia fishermen about \$100,000 last year.

## WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, was late in arriving from the south last night, not getting in until 10 p.m. The vessel sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anyox and other northern points whence she is due back here Tuesday morning southbound.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, is due in port at 3:30 this afternoon from Skagway and other Alaska points and will sail an hour later for Vancouver. To handle a heavy northward passenger movement, the Princess Louise has made this one voyage in place of the Princess Norah which will be back on the run for the next scheduled sailing.

LONDON, March 28: (CP)—Police inspector for England and Wales, Lt.-Col. W. D. Allan says the Labrador retriever is the best general utility dog for police work. He said the bloodhound is delicate and lacking in stamina.

BATH, Eng., March 28: (CP)—Two baronets, an admiral and major-general were among candidates for position of air-raid precautions officer here. Major H. Pickard, formerly of the Royal Engineers, was appointed.

Commander C. T. Beard R. C. N., commander in charge at Esquimalt, will arrive in the city Friday morning from the south aboard the steamer Prince Rupert and will be here until Friday evening when he will proceed by train to Edmonton. On Thursday night he will conduct inspection of the local Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve division. On Wednesday at noon he will address the luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, another feature of that luncheon to be the initiation of three new members in the persons of J. W. Kirkpatrick, Dr. H. M. Morrison and M. C. Brook.

first election; a position novel in American political affairs. It was said by friends that the president, relied upon his judgment and foresight more than he did upon those of anyone else.

"He is a man," said the president, "of remarkable ability. He can hold things off at arm's length and consider them and discuss them without being mixed up."

Wilson did not know House until the beginning of the canvass for his presidential nomination. Wilson was then governor of New Jersey and House was a power in Texas state politics. He was not yet in the public spotlight but his work in Texas had made him known to national leaders of the Democratic party.

His father had left him an inheritance of \$20,000 a year which enabled him to pursue unhampered his interest in politics. State politics began to pall on him after the elections of four governors in succession and at least one United States senator. From his college days he had been keenly interested in national and international affairs. He was an avid reader of books on politics and economics.

House was born at Houston, Texas, July 25, 1858, the youngest of seven children. His forebears were of Dutch extraction but had lived in England for many generations.
