CARDIFF, Wales, July 13: (CP)-What the world needs is brighter cemeteries, according to Dr. J. Greenwood Wilson, Cardiff medical officer of health.

"I often think cemeteries are duli and depressing." Dr. Wilson told the annual convention of the British Institution of Embalmers. "There is a lot to commend the system of the ancient world where they developed streets of tombs which still remain."

The system, he said, was to embalm dead relatives and replace them in exposed tombs along the middle of the street where they did their daily business. With cypress trees planted between the tombs everything looked very artistic.

World Flier May Be There This Afternoon

FAIRBANKS, July 13: (CP)-If all goes well, Howard Hughes, American speed pilot, and his four companions are expected to arrive here at 2 p.m. today on their speed dash around the world. Gas and oil are ready for them to refuel without delay. The amount of fuel the condition of the field here will permit them to take off with will determine whether or not it will be necessary for them to pause at Edmonton for refuelling. The are hoping to reach New York tomorrow. If they do so, they will have lowered the record of the late Wiley Post.

Howard Hughes brought his twin motored plane down last night at Omsk, Siberia. He arrived there at 9 p.m. Moscow time, completing a flight of 1,427 miles from Moscow. Hughes elapsed time from New York to Omsk was computed at 42 hours and 40 minutes. He soon left there for Yakutsk where he arrived at 2:01 a.m. Pacific Standard time today, leaving three hours later.



Zarelli did not believe seriously at that time that Gurvich had killed Service. Then Spiro Gurvich came in and Mike said to him: "You leave me alone and get out of here." Mike still had the gun in hand and was highly excited. Mike then left and, about ten minutes later, re-entered. He had his gun in hand and fired a shot after jumping to the bench. There was an exchange of shots "I thought that the lives of the police officers were in danger," Zarelli said. He believed Gurvich was dead when he struck the floor.

Jury's Duty

in reaching a verdict. He read the definition of justifiable homicide, explaining how far officers might go in making arrests or pursuing fugitives. They were justified in using such force as was necessary to overcome force in resistance of process or arrest. If an officer happened to kill anyone in using reasonable force he might be exonerated. 


