Causes Of Explosion Wrecked German Liner Oakland Very Suspicious

OAKLAND, Nov. 4.—Circumstances of the explosion yesterday afternoon which wrecked the German combination freight and passenger liner Vancouver in the Oakland estuary look very suspicious. Although the cause has not yet been definitely established, the explosion appears to have been definitely established. The explosion appears to have been from without the ship. "It might have been caused by a bomb," declared the captain last night. Six separate investigations are now proceeding, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the United States shipping service, the Alameda police and the German consulate being among the bodies which are holding inquiries.

JAPAN TO CONTINUE INVASION

TOKYO, Nov. 4.—Japan today announced the possibility of its demanding the 1932 nine-power treaty respecting Chinese integrity and intention of intensifying its military raids in China. Foreign powers have been warned to remove their ships from points of danger and to give notice of where their vessels are. The Pearl River in Canton is heavily mined. With the invasion of China being continued on three fronts beyond Hankow, towards Fowling and along the Lunghai Railway and along the Lunghai Railway, shelling has again reached proportions. So far the offensive towards Sianfu has not yet resumed although it is expected.

Effects on Others

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4.—All nineteen nations have agreed that international relations in China must be respected. The United States Department of State has ignored for the time being the violation of the "open door" policy in China as implied in the Japanese announcement of intention to set up a new political and economic bloc consisting of Japan, Manchoukuo and

THREATEN REPRISALS

Jerusalem, Nov. 4.—British American residents of Palestine have been threatened with reprisals by Arabs because of their sympathies with the Jews, it is reported. Special precautions are taken to guard against any untoward incidents.

Interior Gets Heavy Wet Snow

Heavy wet snow is reported to have fallen overnight in the interior near Hansard, east of Prince Rupert on the Canadian National railway line, a fall of five inches and down the telegraph lines during the night.

Fourteen Die In Air Crash

ST. HELIER, Island of Jersey, Nov. 4: (CP)—Fourteen persons were killed today in one of Great Britain's worst air disasters when a fully loaded passenger air liner crashed into a field after taking off for Southampton. The victims included eleven passengers, the pilot and mechanic and one man who was working in the field.

BID FROM ROUMANIA

BUCHAREST, Nov. 4.—Roumania is now demanding a slice of Czechoslovakia. Three important towns along the frontier are being claimed.

WRECK NOW IDENTIFIED

JUNEAU, Nov. 4: (CP)—The fishing boat which has been found on the rocks off Admiralty Island has been identified by the coast-guard as the seiner Eliza, belonging to Frank S. James of Petersburg, which foundered on October 28. James and his crew reached shore safely and are now at Port Gambier.

Young Man Is Coming South

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—The coast-guard cutter Alexander Hamilton is on its way from King's Cove in the Aleutian Islands to Oakland with Henry L. Walther whose mother is dying in Chicago. The cutter may reach Oakland Saturday but it is doubtful if the young man will be able to get home in time.

Africa Recognizes Ethiopia Conquest

CAPETOWN, Nov. 4: (CP)—Parliament of the Union of South Africa decided yesterday to formally recognize the conquest of Ethiopia by Italy.

VICTORIA, November 4: (CP)—"Prince Rupert is a forgotten city," E. T. Kenney, M.L.A. for Skeena, told the Legislature yesterday when urging construction of the twenty-five mile gap in the northern transprovincial highway between Hazelton and Terrace. Closing of this gap, Mr. Kenney said, would enable motorists to ship their cars between Prince Rupert and Terrace where connection could be made with the northern highway system.

COMMONS REJECTS CENSURE

House of Lords Approves Anglo-Italian Pact in Spite of Mussolini's Attitude

Halifax Admission

Foreign Secretary Says He Duce Will Not Be Sidetracked—King Praises Chamberlain, Roosevelt

LONDON, Nov. 4: (CP)—The government majority late yesterday defeated by a division of 355 to 130 a Labor motion which would have censured the government for the "ineffectiveness of its program of civilian defence."
 Last night the House of Lords approved by a vote of 55 to 6 the putting into effect of the new Anglo-Italian agreement. The pact was approved in spite of an admission by Lord Halifax, Foreign Secretary, that the agreement would have no effect in sidetracking Premier Benito Mussolini from his determination that there should be an insurgent victory in the Spanish civil war. Lord Halifax stated that Mussolini had made it clear that he does not intend to see General Francisco Franco defeated.
 Session Adjourned
 The session of Parliament was prologue today with the reading of a speech from the Throne in the course of which His Majesty paid tribute to Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain, President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States and Premier Mussolini of Italy as well as to Viscount Runciman for their efforts towards bringing about peace during the recent crisis. These four were credited for their parts in arranging the agreement which had resulted in settlement of the crisis. The King's Speech expressed hope that a "new era may have been opened for Europe."
 The King's Speech was read in the House of Lords by proxy, members of both Houses having assembled there for the occasion. The legislation of the session was reviewed.
 After the brief ceremony, Parliament adjourned until Tuesday when the King will open the next session.

President's Wife Visits Seattle

 SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the President, arrived in Seattle by airplane yesterday to visit with her daughter, Mrs. John Boettger jr.

**GOOD GOLD
ORE VALUE**

Glacier Gulch Property Returns
Nearly \$100 Per Ton

SMITHERS, Nov. 4.—Returns
from the recent shipment of gold
ore to the sampling plant at Prince
Rupert by Messrs Campbell, Love-
less and Banta from their Glacier
Gulch property at Smithers have
been very gratifying to the owners.
The shipment consisted of slightly
over 12 tons and it averaged 2.8
ounces gold per ton with a total
gross value of \$1093.54. This is the
second shipment of gold ore made
from this property by the owners
the first of which carried even
higher gold values than this last
one.

Work is still going on at the prop-
erty and there will be another ship-
ment later on, part of which is al-
ready sorted and sacked. The prop-
erty is about six miles from Smith-
ers with an excellent motor road
right into the camp. The workings
are only a short way up the hill-
side from the camp and a short
tram brings the ore down to the
loading platform where motor
trucks can back up and take it right
from the tram.

EDITORIAL

RUMBLES OF DISCONTENT

There is likely to be a large attendance at the meet-
ing of the Chamber of Commerce Monday evening if the
talk of members is any guide to what is likely to take
place. It is possible also that members of the Junior
Chamber, who are always welcomed, will be present.

The occasion of the sudden interest seems to lie in the
question of the operation of the Prince Rupert elevator.
It is felt everywhere and among members of all political
parties that, when the grain belongs to the government,
the elevator is government property and so is the rail-
way, all should be used in a season of plenitude and that,
if they are not used, it is absolutely and solely the fault of
the Mackenzie King government.

Evidently, it is the intention at the meeting to lay the
blame where it belongs and it is quite possible that a pub-
lic mass meeting may be called to protest at the inaction of
the Ottawa administration.

This is not a political move although it may develop
into a political move. It is simply a protest of the business
interests of the city against the closing of the elevator
here at a time when it might be used with advantage to
the farmers, to the country and to the citizens of Prince
Rupert.

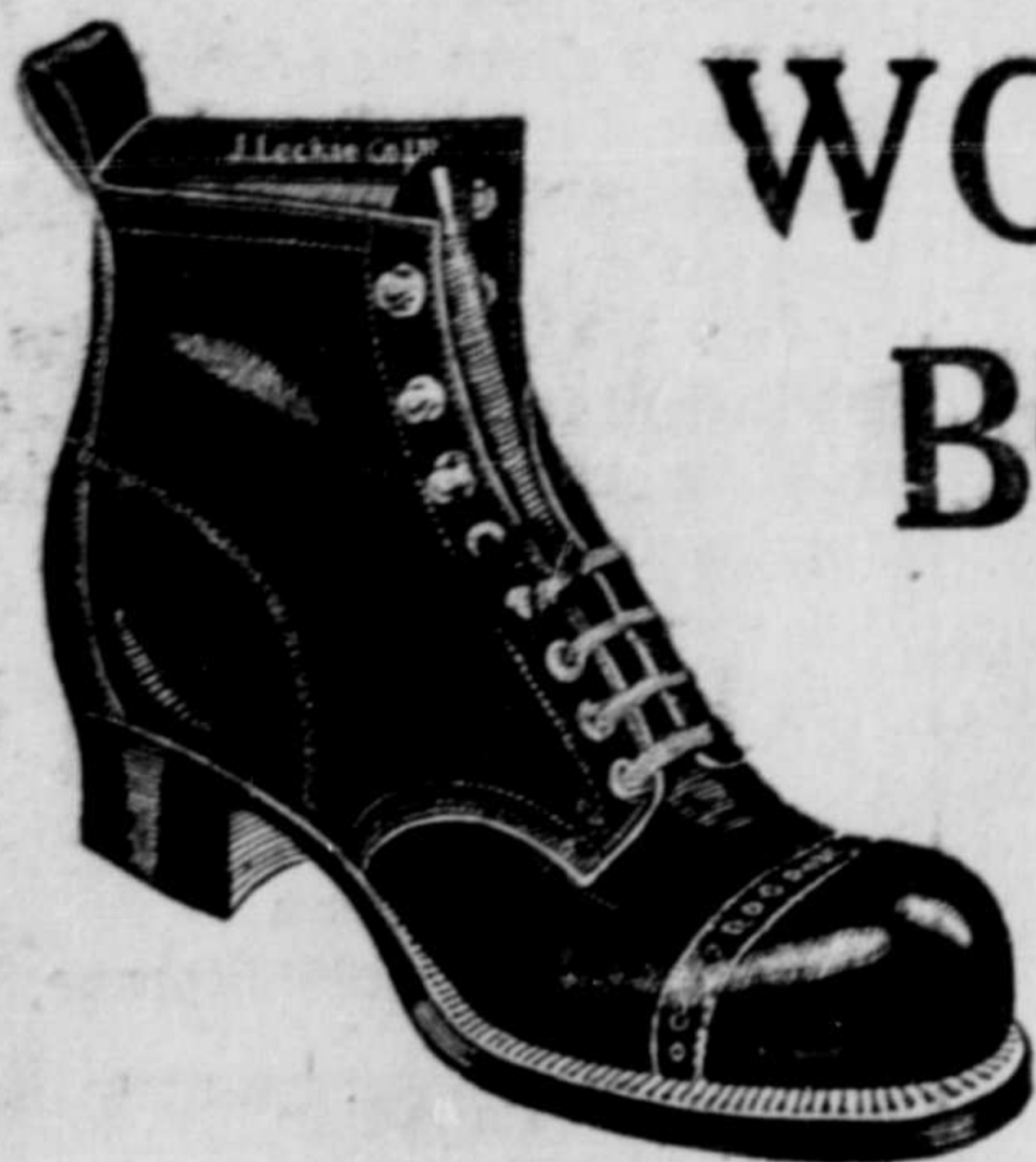

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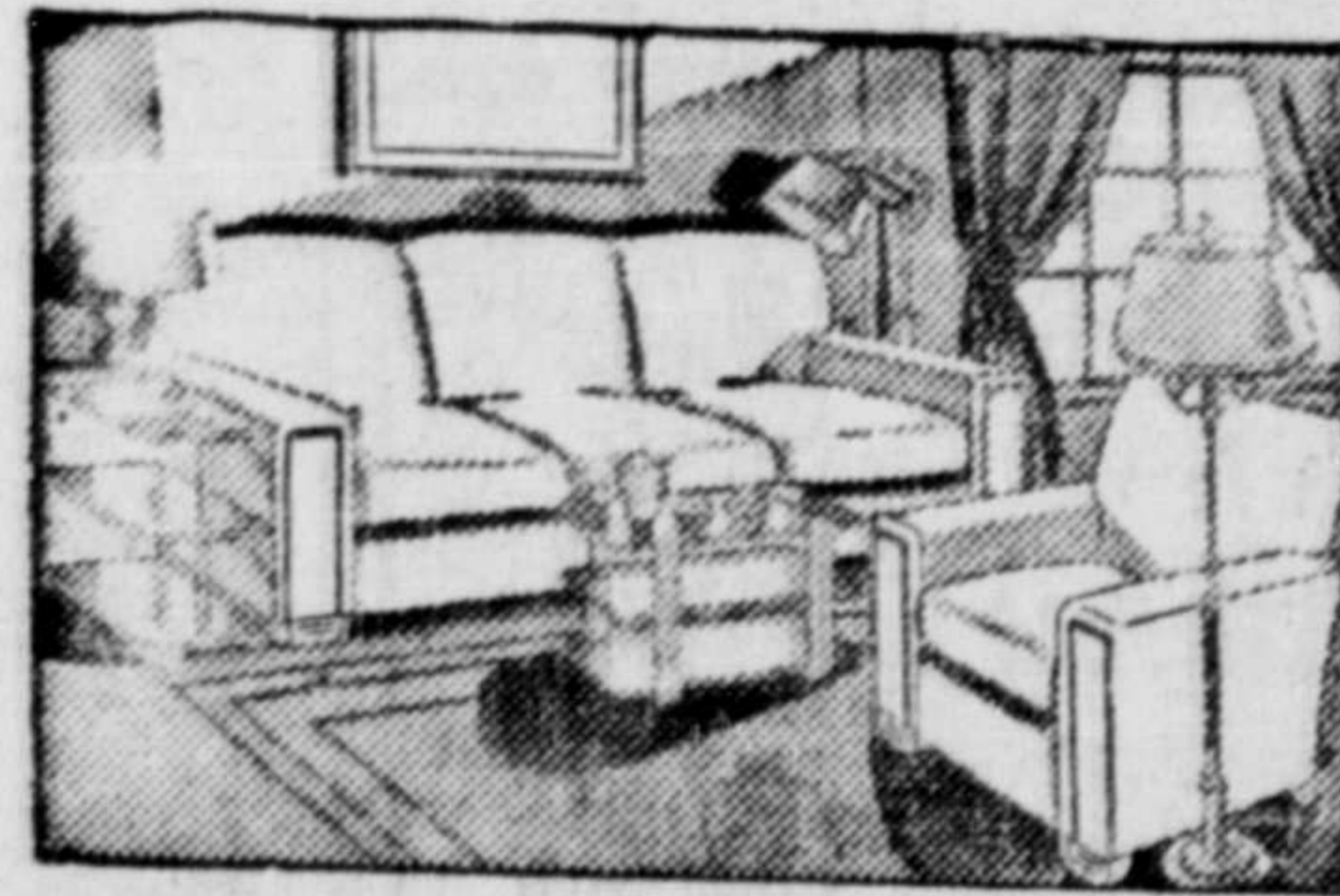
