Many were taken to hospital for treatment for burns and bandaging and some of those who escaped from the blaze found shelter in nearby houses.

Synopsis of Land Act PRE-EMPTIONS

lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of sige, and by Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies which can be obtained free of charge by

addressing the Department of Lands, Vic toria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent Records will be granted covering only hand suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8.000 feet per acre west of that Range. Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five \$10 per acre, including clearing and culti vating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received. Pre-emptions carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and secondclass (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10. Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."


