London Throws Out Alberta Bills

Five Running For Leadership Press And Credit Acts Are Ruled Invalid; Tax On Banks Is Undecided

Voting Starts Today At Tory Convention; Some Strangers Enter

Imperial Co-operation in Defense is Advocated—Proposal For Referendum Before Sending Forces Away Rejected

OTTAWA, July 7: (CP)—The Conservative national convention today adopted a resolution declaring that Canada's defense can best be promoted by consultation and co-operation between all members of the British Commonwealth of Nations. The convention voted down an amendment to the resolution which would have declared Canadian forces should not be sent out of Canada without a referendum.

MANION CHOSEN

Elected Leader of Conservative Party on Second Ballot at Ottawa Convention Today

OTTAWA, July 7—Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion was elected Conservative leader on the second ballot at the Conservative national convention today.

Insurgents Do Not Need Help

ROME, July 7.—The Spanish insurgents are now in a position to win the civil war without further aid from Italy, it was announced last night by a government commission following its return from Spain.

WHEAT MART STILL WEAK

Prices Slump in View of Expectation Of Larger Crop This Year

WINNIPEG, July 7: (CP)—With the world wheat crop for this year estimated at four billion bushels, exclusive of wheat production there may be in Manitoba and China, this being an increase of 223,000,000 bushels over last year, and the exportable surplus of United States and Canada put at 450,000,000 bushels, the wheat market continues weak. Winnipeg futures continue to slump and were off 2 1/2c to 1 1/2c, July closing at 97 3/4c.

Findings of Supreme Court of Canada Are Upheld by Judicial Committee of Privy Council, Highest Tribunal of British Empire

LONDON, July 7: (CP)—After deciding to discontinue hearing of the appeals of the Alberta government on the press bill and the measure to regulate credit which the Supreme Court of Canada had declared to be ultra vires of the provincial legislature, the judicial committee of the Privy Council today reserved judgment on the third measure, that to tax chartered banks. Their Lordships turned down the appeals on the press and credit measures on the grounds that they were inoperative. Judgments of the Supreme Court of Canada declaring the bills ultra vires of the provincial legislature, therefore, stand with judgment reserved on the tax measure.

TRIBUTE OF COMMUNITY TO OFFICER

A Thousand Citizens Gather For Impressive Rites to Inspector W. J. Service, Slain Police Head

A thousand Prince Rupert citizens paid impressive tribute of esteem and respect Wednesday afternoon to the memory of Inspector William J. Service, slain head of the provincial police for Northern British Columbia, prior to his remains being forwarded by the evening train to Kamloops where the funeral will take place on Sunday.

J. Earl Lawson of Toronto was eliminated on the first vote.

In accordance with previously announced rules, the vote on the second and final ballot was not announced but it was learned that Dr. Manion's vote was 830. He required 783, half of the total of 1565 votes for election.

HUGE TOLL OF FLOODS

One Thousand Dead and Damage of Thirty Million Around Kobe, Japan

TOKYO, July 7.—The death toll as a result of heavy rains and floods centering around Kobe had today reached the 1000 mark with damage estimated at \$30,000,000. Rain began falling again yesterday.

Farley Puts It Up To Business

Suggests it Does Not Pay to Buck Government—Sees Way to Prosperity

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Virginia, July 7.—Speaking here last night, Postmaster James M. Farley declared that prosperity would return to the United States as soon as big business learned that no money was to be made by nursing a grudge against the government. The government, Farley said, had no desire to be in business if industry would take up the slack in employment.

OFFENSIVE TO DIVERT JAP DRIVE

Chinese Make New Attacks in Shansi and Hopei in Order to Ease Hankow Pressure

SHANGHAI, July 7.—Supposedly as a means of relieving the pressure upon Hankow, the provisional capital, the Chinese today launched new offensives against the Japanese in Shansi and Hopei provinces. The Japanese continued their destructive air raids in the Yangtze Valley.

GIVE UP ELEVATOR

Alberta Wheat Pool Dropping Lease on Local House at End of Month

Announcement was made today that the Alberta Wheat Pool will give up the local elevator on expiry of the lease at the end of this month. The plant will revert to the Dominion government. No disposition has yet been made of the regular staff of seven at the elevator.

WORKLESS GATHERING

One Thousand Jobless Expected To Be in Victoria By End of Week

VICTORIA, July 7: (CP)—Before the end of this week, the number of single unemployed men gathered here to demonstrate for a work relief program will have reached one thousand, a spokesman for the unemployed says. Two hundred more men arrived this week to join the 500 already here. The transportation of the last 200 was paid as a result of a tag day held in Vancouver last Saturday in defiance of the police.

Presidential Candidate in Last Election Charges Government With Maladministration and Fiscal Recklessness

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, July 7.—Speaking here last night, Former Governor Alfred M. Landon, Republican presidential candidate in the last election, predicted an economic tailspin when the present campaign of government spending came to an end. He launched a verbal barrage against the Roosevelt administration, among other things charging it with disgraceful administration of relief and financial recklessness.

TROUBLE IN PALESTINE

Some Observers Fear Civil War As Result of Uprisings

JERUSALEM, July 7.—One hundred and thirty-one persons have been killed or wounded in a renewal of attacks and counter-attacks between Jews and Arabs which lead some observers to fear a civil war. Curfew regulations were imposed again and British troops and police throughout Palestine were on the alert for new terrorism after an outbreak of disorders in which both Jews and Arabs were killed and wounded.

VANCOUVER WHEAT

VANCOUVER, July 7: (CP)—Wheat was trading at 91 1/2c on the Vancouver market today.

Ten Die In Fire Drill

LISBON, Portugal, July 7: (CP)—Ten boys died when firemen failed to rescue them from a four-storey wooden structure which was set ablaze to permit of an exhibition fire drill. Ten others were seriously injured in the drill which took place at Coimbra, one hundred miles north of here.

Slaughter Of Innocent Is Being Decried

PARIS, July 7.—Placing a wreath on the Lafayette tomb here, United States Ambassador William C. Bullitt decried the killing of defenceless men and women in air raids as being conducted in wars today.

Prussian Prince Name Mentioned

FINDING A SOLUTION

The decisions arrived at by the convention of the Conservative Party at Ottawa now in session are of great importance to the people of Canada, no matter of what political faith. All other parties will be influenced by what the Conservatives decide to do. It may be that the Conservative Party is the one destined to solve the grave problems of unemployment and distribution which have been the chief cause of the rise of new parties.

Only a few years ago the Conservatives swept the country and were elected to power by a considerable majority. At any time the people may decide to repeat that action. Nothing is so uncertain as the electorate. Even if the Conservatives are not again entrusted with the confidence of the electors, the party remains a very important one and may have a very good or very bad effect in deciding the policies of others.

Complaint has often been made that the Liberals are too conservative in their policies. That complaint is to a certain extent justified. People expected great things from the Mackenzie King Government and, so far, little has been done except to adopt the conservative policy of sitting tight and adjusting the finances of the country. Good work has been done in getting very close to balancing the budget but, in the meantime, there are many men out of work, looking for encouragement from the federal administration. Balancing the budget does not interest men who cannot get remunerative employment although it is a step toward making the employment of all possible. Perhaps the Conservatives will be the people who will show the country the way out.

MUST GIVE AND TAKE

The Conservative Party is finding, just as did the Liberals, that the views of the Quebec people differ from those of the average English-speaking people and that, in co-operating with them, it is necessary to make allowance for differences of race and religion and to be willing to give and take in formulating a policy for all parts of the country.

Nearly one-third of the population of Canada is of French extraction and must receive consideration from all political parties if the country is ever to be welded into a unified nation.

WHY MANION FINE YACHT IS FAVORED IS IN PORT

Fort William Doctor Looked Upon As Conservative Compromise

While the fact that Hon. R. J. Manion is better fitted than any other prominent Conservative in the Federal field to make electoral progress in the Province of Quebec is an important point in his favor, it is by no means the only asset which makes him the odds on favorite to be chosen to succeed Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett by the big convention at Ottawa this week, says Quebec Chronicle Telegraph.

To begin with, Dr. Manion has a congenial, democratic disposition that makes lasting friendships for him in all walks of life. This is a quality that no Conservative leader has possessed since the days of Sir John A. Macdonald. Tupper, Borden, Meighen, Bennett they have all been reserved and austere. Conservatism is always liable to suspicion of being synonymous with the classes and it takes a Macdonald or a Manion to make it popular with the rank and file who decide elections.

As a medical man, the former minister has natural political strength, enhanced by his wide acquaintances and universal popularity as a returned man. Having been prominent in public life for nearly twenty years, he is known and possesses valuable political connections in all parts of the Dominion from coast to coast; in addition to which he has a ripe parliamentary and administrative experience having sat on the front benches in charge of three different portfolios. In 1921 he was minister of Soldiers' civil re-establishment, in 1926 Postmaster General and in 1930 minister of railways and canals. Being uncommitted to any group or faction he is in a position to reunite and consolidate all constructive elements in the Conservative Party.

Rest of Field

Mr. Bennett being definitely out of the field, the only man whose name has been mentioned as a prospect who can begin to compare with Dr. Manion in all-round qualifications is Hon. H. H. Stevens and he has yet to reinstate himself as a Conservative. The other prospects who have been in public life are all comparative newcomers, known chiefly in their native Ontario and with practically blank records of accomplishment. Of them all the man who is being "pushed" the most actively is Hon. J. Earl Lawson—unfortunately for himself the chief party organizer who must accept responsibility as such for the Conservative debacle in 1935. Also spoken of are seven men who have never been in public life and who are known only in still more limited circles.

In a word, if a careful scrutiny is made of all the leadership prospects it will be found that Dr. Manion is easily the most popular because he has more experience, more widely known and has more varied contacts than the rest put together. If the good of the party were the sole consideration there would be no opposition to him and we believe that the delegates to the coming convention are sufficiently desirous of rehabilitating Conservatism as a national force to say by their votes in no uncertain terms that Manion is the man for the job.

MUCH ORE IS READY

Manager of Polaris-Taku, Here Yesterday, Tells of Big Operations

D. C. Sharpstone, manager of the Polaris-Taku mine at Tulsequah, and Mrs. Sharpstone were passengers aboard the Princess Louise yesterday afternoon going through from Juneau to Vancouver.

Between 1500 and 2000 tons of concentrates from the Polaris-Taku Mining Company's operation on the Canadian side of Tulsequah are ready to be taken down-river. The mill has been running steadily all winter, reports Mr. Sharpstone. The mill has been handling about 160 tons daily of ore that averages about \$10 per ton. About 125 men have been employed in mine and mill during the winter.

Transportation of the concentrates from the mill to the barge landing at the mouth of Taku River will begin shortly. The newly purchased "Taku Chief" will tow the concentrates to the river mouth where they will be put on vessels of the Alaska Transportation Co. for shipment to Tacoma smelter.

WHIFFLET'S From The Waterfront

Frank Waterhouse Line Acquires Chilliwack by Charter—Salmon Catch Falls Off Somewhat

Announcement is made by Frank Waterhouse & Co. of Canada Ltd. that it has secured a long term charter of the large coastal freighter Chilliwack which will be operated in the British Columbia-Puget Sound coasting trade on completion of her annual overhaul in a few days time. The Chilliwack, owned by the Union Steamships Ltd., is a vessel 200 feet long with 30-foot beam and can handle about 1,000 tons of deadweight cargo. She is equipped with wireless, has a jumbo boom enabling her to handle lifts of 15 to 20 tons and is capable of steaming well over ten knots. Captain A. W. Ogden, well known in this port as master of the Waterhouse freighter Northholm, will be in command of the Chilliwack which will be manned by an entire Waterhouse crew. Northern Shipping Company Limited are local agents for the Waterhouse Company.

Due to dull weather at the first of the week the gill net salmon catch on the Skeena and Naas Rivers has fallen off somewhat with an average of about fifteen fish per boat. Sockeye fishing is now proceeding normally throughout the district including Rivers and Smith's Inlet where the boat average is reported to be about twelve fish. Owing to the license quota having been exceeded, an additional twelve hours to the weekly close season at Smith's Inlet has been declared.

Three vessels sold halibut catches totalling 54,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Prosperity, 18,000 pounds, 8½c and 7c; President, 18,000, Whiz, 8½c and 7c; Arne, 18,000, Washington, 8½c and 7c. The President also sold 500 pounds of sablefish at 5c per pound.

Following a visit of three days to port, the United States Navy destroyer Hopkins sailed from Prince Rupert at 5:30 Tuesday morning on its way back to San Diego base. The next stop of the Hopkins will be at Seattle.

Among 205 passengers who were here yesterday aboard the steamer Prince George, which was in port northbound from Vancouver to Skagway, was a Christian Endeavour tour party of 100 persons from Los Angeles led by Howard Brown.

There were 218 passengers aboard the steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, which was in port from 3:30 to 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Nine disembarked here while four boarded the vessel at this port for the south.
