Utilities Bill Is Now Before House

Serious Brush Fires Sweep Southern California; Loss Estimated At Two Million

LOS ANGELES, November 24: (CP)- Two disastrous mountain fires in Santa Monica and San Bernardino ranges have been checked today by an army of fire fighters as property damage exceeded \$2,000,000 and twelve thousand acres of watershed were blackened. The conflagration destroyed three hundred and fifty homes

destroyed. Santa Monica was not seriously threatened although 200 in Santa Monica canyon were burned. San Bernardino was in a serious position for some time and part of the city was evacuated. The fire, fanned into inferno proportions by a high wind, raged in the Malibu Mountains.

Mansions owned by Richard Dix and the 150-home community Fernwood were missed although encircled by fire.

The death of Mrs. Louis Silvers. from an overdose of sleeping powders, is blamed on worry over approaching flames.

GERMAN INJUSTICE

The tragedy of the Jewish people of Germany is so terrible that it seems foolish to criticise the latest outrage. The Jews of Germany are being fined four hundred million dollars for the death of the German ambassador to France who was murdered by a young Jew. To penalize all the Jews in Germany for this act is simply another act of injustice and savagery in the attempt to rid the country of all the Jewish residents and to rob them of their wealth.

HEALTH CAMPAIGN

There is going on in Canada what is known as a health campaign designed to warn the people how to counteract certain diseases and how to treat them in case of infection. This campaign, doubtless, has some value but its benefits are largely offset by making the people of the country disease conscious. They think disease instead of health and those of a neurotic temperament are injured instead of aided.

Presumably education is necessary in matters of health and disease but it should be carried out with care. We cannot afford to allow ourselves to be always thinking of disease or the possibilities of disease. More cheerfulness and health of mind reacts on the body and produces the healthy person.


COST OF SCHOOL BOOKS

Elmore Philpott, who lectured recently in Prince Ru-

pert, writing to a southern newspaper says:

"In most respects the schools of British Columbia seem to me to be much more progressive than those in central and eastern Canada. But in another respect the system here is decidedly behind most of the provinces of Canada. That is in regard to the method by which the individual pupils have to obtain their books. I know of no other part of Canada or the United States where families are forced to spend so much money out of their own pockets to supply their children with the textbooks demanded by the present curriculum. Indeed, the very basis of the public school system in North America might well be considered the free supply of books to all public school; scholars. Why British Columbia should lag so far behind in this particular matter, when the province is relatively so well advanced in social consciousness is a mystery to me.





> In the middle of the New York theatre district is a undistinctive office building. In that building is the clearing house for German and A Italian refugees. There, 80 workers of the National Co-ordinating Committee for aid to refugees and emigrants coming from Germany daily listen to real-life stories more dramatic than those enacted on the famous stages of the neighborhood.

Late into the night the staff labors to help bewildered arrivals find relatives, jobs, places to settle. And it advises American relatives how to help their kin abroad. Founded in the summer of 1934 by James G. McDonald League of Nations refugee commissioner, the organizain, composed of 20 co-operating nits, cares for Jewish and Proestant refugees. (The Catholic committee for refugees from Germany, maintaining a separate of-Tice, watches over Catholics from abroad).

At the offices every elevator brings a group of German-speaking men and women up to the large waiting room. Newly-arrived refugees sit alongside citizens recking to help relatives abroad Phones ring constantly. The man at the information desks answers ca cuestions all day long, speaking with heavy German accent. His patient, encouraging smile never




