SIGNS SPENDING

President Roosevelt Gives Approval to Recovery Measures

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 22: President Franklin D. Roosevelt last night signed the lending and spending bill designed to assist in national economic recovery.

The President announced that he would give a radio address to the nation on Friday night in which he would explain the lending and spending bill more fully, also discussing the general economic situation.

The economic situation, the chief executive commented as he sat in his shirt sleeves in a press conference, was not as bad as it might seem. An improvement appeared to be in sight.
