RAILWA TRAFFIC INCREASE

Volume of C.N.R. Freight And Passenger Business Up During

MONTREAL, Jan. 12:- The volume of freight and passenger traf-1 fic carried over lines of the Canadian National Railways during the past year shows a considerable improvement over that of 1936. Alastair Fraser, Vice-Pdesident in charge of traffic, stated in a review issued here yesterday.

"The year 1937 was one of steady progress in the volume of freight traffic handled as well as changes and improvements effected in our service to the public" said Mr Fraser. "While there was a heavy, falling off in grain shipments refrom the very light! crop in parts of Western Canada this was more than offest by the improvement in general business. resulting in an increase in freight tonnage handled of approximately ten percent over that of 1936. Pickup and delivery freight service in Western Canada was extended to include practically all agency stations in the three prairie provinces and in Eastern Ca-1 nada to include all of the territory between Quebec-Levis in the East and Windsor. Sarnia and the Soo in the West. A collection-ondelivery arrangement applying between stations in Canada on practically all railways was also established, this provides a convenient and quick method for the collection and remittance of monies due shippers on any less-than-car-

FINE CO-OPERATIVE EFFORT

The people of the Peace River country in and around that section of Alberta of which Beaver Lodge and Grand Prairie are the centres have for years been trying to induce the governments of Alberta and British Columbia to connect their highway system with Hansard from Ric-Grande. As the highwa ywould benefit only a comparatively small part of the population of either province and as it was a rather expensive undertaking, nothing was

Then an organization was formed which is known as the Monkman Pass Highway Association, the members of which pledged themselves to contribute either labor or money toward the work of slashing the route, building temporary bridges and making it passable for trucks or cars. As soon as the seeding season was over last spring a gang of men went to work led by the discoverer of the pass who gave his engineering services free and by fall they had made it possible for cars to drive half way from Rie Grande to Hansard. If nothing happens to prevent the work proceeding, it is planned to finish the road through to Hansard and thus enable cars to get through in good weather from the Peace River to Vancouver.

That is the kind of community effort that really counts. The people of the district have given their services and their money to get that road through. Once people are driving that way it is expected the utility of the road will be demonstrated to such an extent that the governments concerned will have to recognize it and build a proper highway. We take off our hats to those Peace River people. They deserve to succeed.

MUST WORK TOGETHER

The intermingling of interests on this coast between Alaska and Canada makes it very desirable that the closest kind of co-operative effort be made in order to develop the country. In some of the Canadian valleys the richer part is in Canada but the mouth of the stream which drains it is in United States waters. That is true of the Unuk where the Alaskan Government is building a road to tap the mining properties on this side of the line. The Taku River mining area is served chiefly from Juneau. As the mining efforts increase and extend, other valleys will be brought into production with similar problems to face.

Prince Rupert benefits from being the port of shipment for Alaskan caught fish while Alaskan boats benefit from being accorded landing and other privileges by the Canadian authorities. As the years advance both Alaska and British Columbia will find they can benefit each other by even closer co-operation. All eastern shipments made from Alaska should go by this port. In the meantime it might be well for Prince Rupert to look to the Skeena and Naas Rivers with a view to securing the handling of canned salmon from those areas.


