Saskatchewan Dean of Agriculture Sees Brighter Prairie Future

By ROBERT K. TAYLOR SASKATOON, June 10: (CP) -Dr. L. E. Kirk, dean of agriculture of University of Saskatchewan, says western Canada's agriculture is in Eye a more transitory stage and about to emerge into a second and more sensible phase of development. "We have a much better appreciation of our soil and climate factors, the type of farming mostly likely to be successful, the best methods of tilling the soil and conserving moisture," said Dr. Kirk.

"We are learning more and more each day how to build a permanent and stabilized agriculture in the West. We will grow as big crops as we did in our bumper year of 1928. • The soil fertility is not depleted. There are great potentialities in the soil of this country.

"The change in agriculture practices is going on at a greater rate than ever before, and as well there is a definite trend towards mechanization.

"It is a good thing too. Despite the opinion in eastern Canada that western farm problems would be answered by greater concentration 5c. on smaller farms, the answer to many western problems is the use of larger farm units and mechani-
