# FLOOL TO

High Waters in Midwest Receding As Temperature Gets Colder -Heavy Rains Towards Atlantic Coast

CHICAGO, Jan. 25: - Flood waters were receding in Illinois Iowa, Oklahoma, Texas and other midwest states today as the levels with lowering temperatures and The worst danger is now believed over. Two deaths are reported, one a six year old boy who was drowned while trying to cross a swollen stream. The worst damage was around Rockford, Illinois, a considerable portion of which was

under water. Hundreds of families were sent fleeing for safety as streams in a large part of northern Illinois and southern Wisconsin surged over their banks, inundating thousands' of acres of farmlands and damaging winter wheat crops.

Today a severe cold wave appeared to be commencing as a snowstorm reaching blizzard proportions moved over the midwest. In the meantime, streams in the East were rapidly rising as a result of heavy rains and flood conditions were feared there.


