Hitler Now Has Eyes On Danzig

CONFIDENCE FOR BLUM French Chamber Backs Up Premier In His Armaments Expansion Program

PARIS, March 18: (CP)—Premier Leon Blum's new People's Front Government won a vote of confidence from the Chamber of Deputies last night following an announcement of the Premier of an immediate increase in French armaments in view of European war clouds. The cabinet has authorized the defence minister to make commitments for extraordinary armaments expenditures of \$134,000,000. Parliament was also asked to open additional exceptional armament credits.

Editorial THE TIME TO BUILD

This seems to be a very favorable time to build a new home in Prince Rupert. If loans can be secured it means that home owners can get five per cent money, something to which they have been strangers in the past. Because of the low rate of interest, the monthly payments made to a loan company are very small compared with what they would be if computed on the old eight per cent basis. Also there is the advantage of being able to borrow up to eighty per cent of the value of the house and lot instead of fifty to sixty per cent. The low rate is made possible through the co-operation of the Dominion government which has made the arrangement with the loan companies and which guarantees twenty per cent of the loan. At the beginning it takes a good deal of the payment to cover the interest but every half year the principal is reduced and the rate of payment of principal steadily increases as the total amount of interest is reduced. This does not affect the payments under the plan but it is on that basis the computation is made. Some people object to borrowing to build because they fear they may be out of employment or may be transferred from the city. Even taking that risk there is nothing to lose and a possibility of making a little money from selling the house later as the payments are so low. The great thing is to build in a locality where there is a demand for houses. Next year the possibility is that the home will be worth more than it is this year.

TALKS OF FREEZING Refrigeration is Most Efficacious Means of Preservation, O. C. Young Tells Junior Chamber

Guest speaker last night at the regular monthly dinner meeting of the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce in the Commodore Caft, Otto C. Young of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station delivered an interesting and informative discourse on the subject of "Preservation of Foods by Freezing." While his subject was to large extent of technical nature, it was presented in an easily understandable and popular style and the address was much appreciated by the younger business men. J. C. Gilker, president of the Junior Chamber, was in the chair and another guest of the evening was F. A. MacCallum, president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, who was cordially welcomed. After the speaker of the evening had been heard, a good deal of routine business such as correspondence and committee reports was dealt with. A new member of the Junior Chamber was duly welcomed in the person of Robert Tobey.

It would be the purpose of his talk, said Mr. Young in opening, to discuss some of the scientific results and advances being made in the understanding of the preservation of foods by freezing. Most methods of preservation resulted in marked changes in the product. Under certain conditions freezing could be made to result in the least change of all although, like in all methods of preserving, certain irreversible changes were bound to take place. Freezing today was considered to be one of the most efficacious means of preservation. Nature herself had provided evidence in support of this with the discovery in Northern Siberia of the frozen bodies of extinct elephant-like mammoths, flesh, bones, hair, internal organs and even contents of which were in perfect state of preservation despite the fact that the creatures had been dead something like 20,000 years. Mr. Young discussed the effects of freezing upon foods so preserved, describing changes which came about in texture and flavor, and told of discoveries and improvements made in the science of refrigeration. "As far as is known today," said Mr. Young, "foods cannot be frozen without some slight damage being done. However, by greatly increasing the speed of freezing, the damage can be reduced to a negligible amount so that, for all practical purposes, the frozen product is equal to the fresh unfrozen material." This was particularly so with meats or fish, which were dead products. Whereas rapid freezing had been fairly successful with these, they had not been so successful with fruits or vegetables or any live materials which were presenting the most difficult problems at present. "However, we are learning more about them every day and some scientists believe that some day we shall not only be able to successfully preserve most fruits and vegetables but we shall be able to suspend animation in animals, including the human being by means of refrigeration of which possibility I myself am somewhat skeptical."

Mr. Young then proceeded to explain the difference between the two methods of preservation—the application of heat such as in canning and the extraction of heat as in freezing. In freezing the qualities most like those of the fresh

SCHUSCHNIGG IS CAPTIVE VIENNA—Former Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg is still a prisoner in his palace here. One report says he will be allowed to go free, leave the country and take his money with him. Another report says there is a move in Nazi quarters to have him put on trial for treason.

STRENGTH OF NAVY LONDON—Although critical of some aspects of British naval policy, Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, gave a note of cheer to debate in Parliament yesterday when he declared that Great Britain's navy was relatively far stronger today than it was in 1914 when he himself was First Lord of the Admiralty. It was ample, he felt, to easily take care of British interests against all threats in the Mediterranean. Mr. Churchill was cheered when he referred to the excellent naval relations between United States and Great Britain. This was one of the greatest assurances of peace, he declared.

LONDON GOLD PRICE LONDON, March 18: (CP)—The London price of bar gold was up 8c yesterday, closing at \$34.92 per fine ounce.

MONTHLY MEETING Many Matters Discussed by Younger Business Men Last Evening

Correspondence before the Junior Chamber of Commerce meeting last night included a communication from Don Morrell of Montreal, secretary of the Canadian Junior Chambers of Commerce, drawing attention to and asking for information in regard to study of the youth movement in communities, this being laid on the table. Also from the Canadian Junior Chamber body came a request for suggestions in regard to maintenance, etc., of the TransCanada Highway. In view of Prince Rupert being so far removed from the TransCanada Highway, it was felt that there were no suggestions to be offered here. The Canadian Chamber also sent a synopsis of activities being carried on by various member chambers in Canada. A communication from Jack Melville of the Vancouver Junior Chamber of Commerce told of studies being made of the subject of city management. A letter from Dr. J. T. Mandy expressed appreciation of the Junior Chamber's action in postponing its regular monthly meeting in favor of the annual museum dinner. The local Junior Chamber of Commerce felt Prince Rupert was not interested in a suggestion from Vancouver in regard to daylight saving. Advice was received of the appointment of President Gilker to the executive of the British Columbia Junior Chambers of Commerce body.

City Beautification In regard to city cleaning up and beautification, a committee consisting of William Bremner, Peter De Jong, Sam Saloum, Robert Tobey and A. S. Nickerson was appointed. May 1-7 has been suggested as clean up and beautification week. The President referred to the importance of out-of-side publicity activities and appointed a committee consisting of C. G. Ham, T. J. Williams, Wilfrid Hicks and J. C. Gilker to co-operate with the city commissioner who had suggested a line of action. Various suggestions were heard in regard to increasing interest in the Junior Chamber and boosting attendance. The second Tuesday in April was set for the next meeting which will take the form of a "Grouch Night." A "Bosses' Night" was also suggested and the idea of having chosen students from the High School in attendance was advanced.

LONDON, March 18: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain last night promised that he would make a clean-cut statement next week on the subject of British government policy in Czechoslovakia and Spain. Meanwhile rumors persist and increase of a serious cabinet crisis. It is now reported that no less than eight cabinet ministers have threatened to resign. In official quarters there is a tendency to discount the seriousness of the crisis.

German Chancellor Has No Objections Provided He Gets What He Wants—Might Even Help in Invasion—Ultimatum Expires Tonight

BERLIN, March 18: (CP)—A source close to the chancellery said today that German opposition to the threat of Polish military action in Lithuania had been withdrawn in return for Polish acquiescence in possible German annexation of the free city of Danzig. The source said that the Polish foreign minister had given assurances that he would raise no objections to the German fleet at Swinemunde, 200 miles west of Danzig, moving into Danzig harbor to proclaim the free city a part of the greater realm. As a result, German objections to Polish action against Lithuania are said to have been laid aside.

WINNIPEG, March 18: (CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures were up 2c to 2 1/2c Wednesday with May closing at \$1.19 1/2. Yesterday prices were unchanged to 3/4c lower.

Other possible German action in the Polish-Lithuanian crisis was indicated by a Nazi spokesman who said, if Polish troops entered Lithuania, German troops would march into Memel, which was once German and now Lithuanian. Earlier in the day it had been reported that Germany suggested to Poland that it would be inadvisable for Poland to take forcible measures against Lithuania in view of the already aggravated European situation. Last night Poland sent a strong six-point protest to Lithuania demanding settlement of differences and, among other things, resumption of normal diplomatic relations. Midnight tonight (Pacific Standard Time) is the time limit of the ultimatum. The Lithuanian cabinet was going into session today. Fifteen thousand demonstrators in Warsaw, capital of Poland, marched before the residence of the inspector-general of the Polish army and demanded immediate annexation of Lithuania. In Paris it was reported that France and Russia agreed to bring simultaneous pressure to bear on Poland and Lithuania for a peaceful settlement of friction between the two countries.

Senate Passes Divorce Bill

It is Easier to Build Than to Pay Rent Under Plan of Financing Suggested by Federal Government. It is Great to be a Home Owner Instead of a Renter

Should Spend At Least \$100,000 On New Houses In Prince Rupert This Year If Loans Available

If loans can be secured under the Dominion Housing Act it is estimated that at least \$100,000 will be spent this year in erection of new dwellings in Prince Rupert. These will be mostly small cottages or two-storey houses erected by the owners for their own use.

People who have been looking for houses in the city recently have been unable to get them and it is expected that, during the year there will be a considerable influx of people whose needs must be provided for. Mostly the demand is for small places at moderate prices. There is also a demand for very small homes such as four-room cottages. These must have good plumbing and convenient clothes closets and must be built on concrete or stone foundations. These are minimum requirements for any homes erected under the plan.

It is probable that in Prince Rupert, if the loans can be secured, a good many loans would be asked on houses costing approximately \$2,500. The loans on such a home would be \$2,000 on which the monthly payments would amount to \$13.08 and taxes and insurance. Any person building under this act should have at least \$500 and possibly a little more.

The mortgages under the scheme are made out for ten years only but are renewable for another ten under which all payments will have been made. Those wishing to make larger repayments than required by the Act can do so by arrangement, thus shortening the term under which the loan is made and reducing the amount of interest charges. Since the announcement made by the commissioner that applications would be taken for loans, there has been a great deal of interest shown in the scheme. Many people have declared their intention of applying for loans. What is required is to secure forty or more good applications to place before the loan companies and the Home Building Committee in order that they may be given consideration.

A Good Applicant

A good application is one from a person who is able to comply with the requirements, who is likely to repay the loan who has a good record in the past in regard to financial matters and whose income is such that it seems probable he or she may be able to complete the payments.

It is probable that the building may be restricted to certain areas in which there are streets and sidewalks and where in case the payments should not be made there would be a ready demand for houses of the kind.

The loan company in each case puts up sixty per cent of the money and the Government of Canada twenty per cent, the interest rate being five per cent per annum. A number of communities outside the large centres are applying for loans and it is absolutely essential that Prince Rupert if she wishes to take advantage of the provisions of the act, send in a large number of applications, so that it may be worth while for the company operating here to appoint an inspector to have an oversight of the work to protect the loan company against possible fraud.

It is said that eighty per cent of the cost of a house is directly or indirectly paid for labor, so the spending of \$100,000 in this community would be a great help to improving labor conditions.

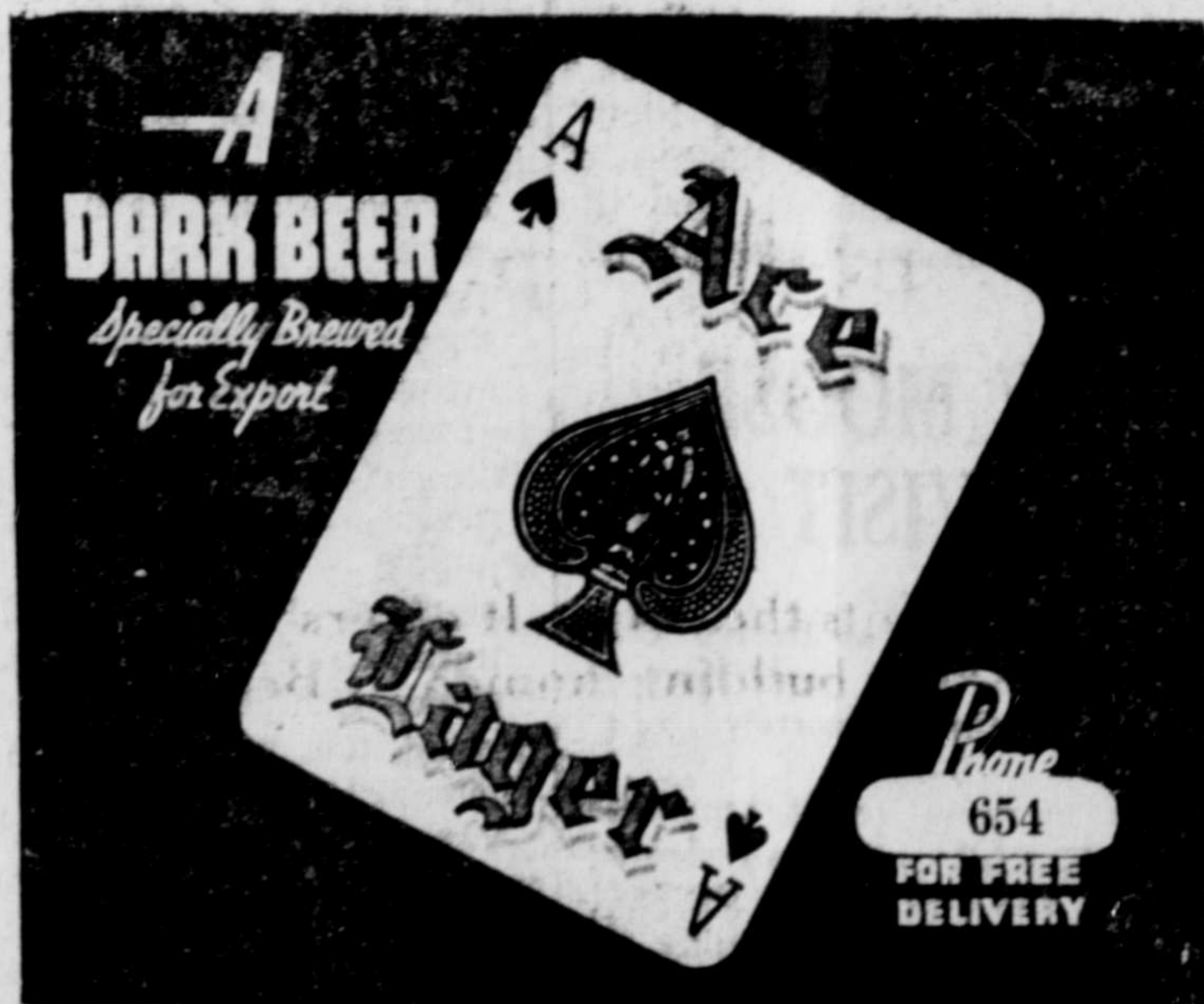

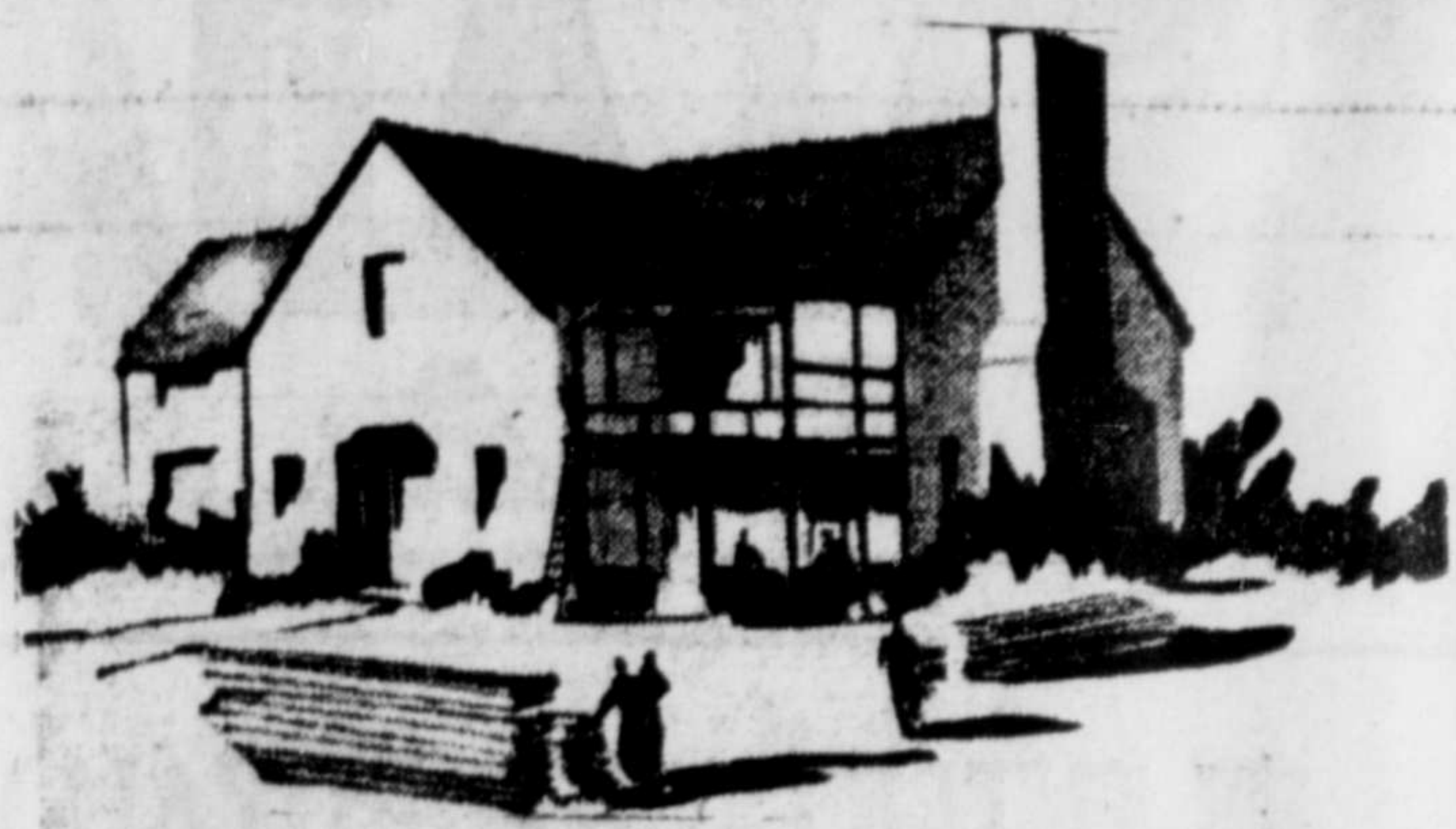

Build For Yourself And Own Your Home

It is Unpleasant to Be Moving All the Time and To Be Afraid to Improve Your Premises On A Rented Place

New Home May Be Secured By Small Monthly Payment With Only 20 Per Cent Of Cost Down

Under the Dominion government home building scheme loans may be secured from approved loan companies up to as high as eighty per cent of the value of the property and the rate of interest on the outstanding amount is only five per cent.

For instance, a person can erect a house which with the lot may be valued at \$5,000. On this a loan may be secured of possibly \$4,000 repayable at \$26.15 a month. The company also arranges to pay the taxes on the property and collects an estimated amount monthly to cover all charges of that kind.

At this rate the property will be paid for in twenty years.

On a small cottage, half the price of the one mentioned, the monthly payments would be only slightly over \$13 a month and taxes. Other sizes are in proportion according to the needs of the person building and size of the income.

The mortgage company would want to know that the person to whom they are loaning is likely to make the payments because the company does not want the property. All it wants is the interest on the money and the repayments of principal. The monthly payments include the interest and part of the principal, the adjustments being made every half year.

On a loan of \$4,000 the amount still owing in ten years would be \$2,573.44. A table can be secured which shows exactly how the borrower stands at the end of any year and he may if he wishes pay off the remaining principal at any time.

School Changes Are Explained

Character, Culture and Citizenship Are Modern Essentials

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., March 18: (CP)—Education is changing from the three R's to the three C's, W. J. Judd, public school inspector said in an address here. Reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic were essentials in education but there were more important things—"character, culture and citizenship"—he said.

Only the foundation of this training could be given in elementary schools but the new courses introduced in schools in 1937 sought to develop boys and girls by teaching them how to live.

Ontario's education system received a terrible setback in the nineties when its program won a first prize at a fair, he said. Instead of being a blessing, it turned out to be a curse. "It made us smug."

He quoted a saying "Ontario's education system is second to none" and added "that may have been true in the nineties but it was not the case in 1936."

Minimum Standard Of Construction In New Housing Act

Under the Dominion Housing Act a minimum standard of construction is required.

Every house must be built upon a concrete or masonry foundation, either piers or continuous walls.

Proper drainage must be provided for basements and if there is no basement proper ventilation beneath the floors must be provided.

An apartment house may be financed under the act but, until the building is rented, 25 per cent of the amount of the loan will be withheld.

The area of the house must not cover more than 33 per cent of an inside lot or more than 40 per cent of a corner lot.

An apartment house must not cover more than 60 per cent of the area of an inside lot or 75 per cent of the area of a corner lot.

No living room must be less in area than 150 square feet with a minimum of 11 feet wide.

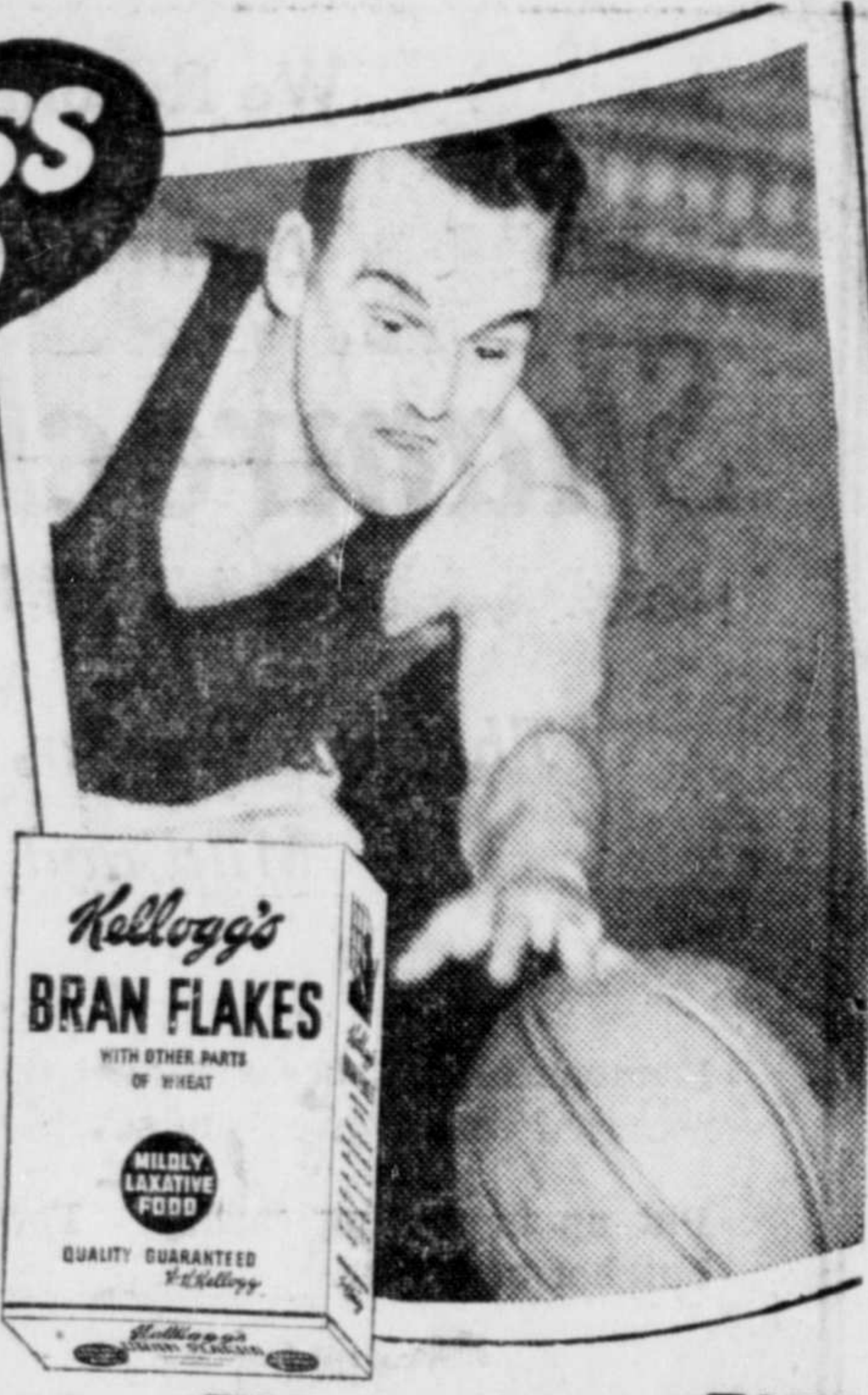

CONFORM TO STYLE

Locality of New Homes Must Be Considered in Preparing Plans For Loan

The relation between external design and lot location constitutes a factor, the importance of which is seldom fully appreciated by prospective home owners applying for building loans under the Dominion Housing Act.

As a consequence applicants are often puzzled to know why plans, well drawn and structurally sound, are sometimes rejected by the loan companies although they conform in all respects to the minimum standards of construction set up under the Act.

The answer is simple. While the plans may be admirable in every respect, the type of home planned is out of step with the class or style of dwellings already erected in the block or neighborhood concerned. The projected home may be in a higher or lower price class than that prevailing in the area, or again, it may be of so radically different design as to render it conspicuous even among other houses in its own price range. All these possibilities which are taken under consideration by the lending institution as affecting its future resale value.

Ultra-modernity in exterior design constitutes a barrier difficult to hurdle in the experience of other applicants, who have found lending companies chary of accepting plans which deviate too decidedly from the generally accepted treatment of external lines and the conventional distribution of wall spaces and window openings.

Low Cost Housing Needed The need for new housing in Prince Rupert, particularly low-cost housing is recognized by the companies who direct the flow of a large proportion of the country's investment funds.

"The Dominion Housing Act was put into force to remedy this situation and to enable the Canadian people to own their own homes. Unfortunately, too many people have been unaware of the opportunities that are presented by this legislation. Should the construction industry give their full co-operation, and should this housing movement gain the popular favor which it deserves, it would be difficult to set any limit to its possible future. Its results would be bounded only by the ability of builders to build fast enough."
