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A CREDIT UNION

The credit unions are co-operative organizations formed by ten or more persons in any part of the country for the purpose of enabling its members to become capitalists. Often people who owe a number of bills around town join a credit union and borrow enough money to pay off all their debts, paying the money back to the credit union in monthly or weekly payments. If they do this they have to pledge themselves to refrain from getting any responding period of 1937. PURPOSE OF SAVING

While a few people save money for the purpose of taking a holiday, most of those who join a credit union do so for the purpose of owning their own home, their own cession. fishing boat or something else of a substantial nature. The man who has no money and no debts, starting from base, usually begins by paying in five, ten, fifteen or twenty dollars a month for a certain number of shares in the credit union. When he accumulates enough ment share prices on Canadian to make a substantial down payment, he arranges for a loan with which to build himself a house. This loan is repayable in monthly payments, just as was the payment for the shares in the credit union.

This is a very hazardous way of living because, if anything hanpens to stop the salary, the nerson is left with a load of debt and nothing to pay it with.

NOT AN EXPERIMENT

Credit unions have proven very useful in the maritime provinces and the movement is spreading rapidly to other provinces. They were introduced into the Monitimes by people connected with St. Francis Xavier University and have changed the whole outlook of the people of the Eastern provinces. Gradually the unions are working their way westward and it is understood the fishermen of Prince Runert plan to form a credit union among their members. Other groups will probably do the same as soon as they have provincial authority to do so and the benefits of the organization have been explained. Occasionally members of a single industry or a branch of an industry establish a credit union among the employees. It encourages thrift and makes for stability and a general improvement of the standard of living. Merchants benefit because they have fewer bad accounts. The communitv benefits because of the increase in the number of home owners. The members benefit chiefly because of the changed outlook on life brought about by the fact that they are owners of property or capital and cease to regard themselves as wage slaves.

INDEX OF BUSINESS

Slight Decline During October Recorded by Statistics Bureau

OTTAWA, December 5 - Wholesale commodity prices in Canada drifted lower during October and the Dominion Bureau of Stastics index fell from 74.5 for the week ending September 30 to 73.9 for the week ending October 28. This was a new low since July 1936 and slightly more than 12.5 per cent below the corresponding period of last year. Five of the eight major groups receded while advances predominated in wood, non-ferrous metals and chemicals. The grain index declined from 47.1 to 43.2 which compared with 92.7 for the final week of October, 1937 Exports were light and the favorable Argentine crop outlook, together with the present large world stocks' weighted heavily upon price structure. Livestock values were lower also as demand dragged, and the livestock index dropped 6.0 points to 69.9. Meats became cor-25 respondingly cheaper and lard showed a moderate reduction. On 00 the other hand, increasing arma-12 ment programs and growing in-50 dustrial activity stiuulated nonferrous metals whiel raw rubber on registered a moderate gain as reprospects of a boom in automobile nite. Seasonal advances in prices of coal and coke caused the fuel index to move up from 85.3 to 85.7. The general level of coal prices during the past six months has been higher than for the coring from 1921, at which time the index stood at 109.2. After having recorded a steady advance since the spring of 1934, rentals reversed direction and registered a slight decline from 90,3 to 90.1. 



The ancient game of chess has been 'reorganized' to conform to present day German standards of militarism, and the photograph above explains the changes better than we could in a column of Instead of the familiar bishops, queens, rooks and pawns, the new German edition of chess, called "Tak-Tik," has figures representing infantry men, tanks, artillery batteries, bombing aeroplanes and fighting aeroplanes. The board is divided by diagonal lines, representing a road and a river and two other lines marking off red and blue territory. 


