EMPRESS DOWAGER HAS FLED BEFORE THE REBEL TROOPS

DR. SUN YAT SEN HAS TAKEN MINISTER WU TING FANG INTO HIS CABINET-MARCH ON PEKIN BY REBELS HAS BEGUN.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Shanghai, Jan. 3 .- Fighting is still taking place in Hankow today and the rebels are greatly outnumbered. Sun Yat Sen was naugurated provisional president today and has named his cabinet, which includes Wu Ting Fang. Reports from Pekin state that the Empress Dowager and the Imperial court has fled to Jehol.

Practically the whole of the Imperial army in Shan Su has deserted to the rebels and a march on Pekin has already started. The general opinion is there will be no opposition until the walls of the capital are reached.



MR. MOBLEY'S RETIREMENT.

It is a matter for sincere regret that after preparing to make the necessary financial sacrifice Mr. Frank Mobley has felt obliged to withdraw his name from nomination for Mayor. The cause for regret is the greater because his objections are so well founded. It would be a mistake for himself or any other man to enter upon a position of authority without the necessary support to enable him to realise the program of reforms he had set out to secure.

The tragedy that stalks in the wake of the average American municipality is apparent in smaller degree here in Prince Rupert. Our ablest men are engrossed in their private affairs, and the corporate business cannot secure their services. The men of marked administrative ability plead that they cannot afford to neglect their own affairs to enter public life. The civic administration is left to take its chance. Very often the chance lies only between a fool and a knave.

Under these circumstances it is often the habit to scold the business men and accuse them of a lack of public spirit. This is hardly fair. Charity begins at home. William Pitt saved Europe and ran himself into the bankruptcy courts. But Pitt was not a married man, and then Pitt was Pitt. Cobden built up a great weaving business before he entered Parliament to repeal the Corn laws. He repealed the Corn laws, but lost his business and had to accept a public purse from the people of England. The civic corporation cannot expect to secure the service of first-class administrators for a salary less than a decent bellhop's tips, and it will be several years before we have a leisured class of retired business men who will be available to offer their abilities to the city for the sake of serving the public.

It is superfluous here to point the lesson of the one way to guarantee expert business administration to the city, or to express regrets that the one candidate whose business experience and municipal experience made him especially desirable at this juncture, has been obliged for lack of proper aldermanic support to decline the honor offered him.

A Mayor may be useful in initiating policies. He can become effective at blocking policies. But he cannot pass legislation or even vote on measures except on those rare occasions when he is called upon to give a casting vote. Under the circumstances Mr. Mobley is probably well advised in deciding that if Alderman Newton's followers are to form the Council the best person to preside over them is Alderman Newton himself.




