## JUDGE MABEE ORDERS OPENING OF CAMERON COVE

### CAMERON COVE MUST BE OPENED

Judge Mabee Hands Down Judgment in the Suit of Rochester and Others This Morning in Famous Cameron Cove Case

#### A CLEAN VICTORY FOR MR. ROCHESTER

Chairman Mabee Says the Company Had No Title to the Lands Across the Mouth of the Cove and That Rochester's Business Has Suffered in Consequence—Is Given Six Weeks to Pay Damages or Must Tear up the Fill

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
Ottawa, Jan. 3.—Judge Mabee this morning gave judgment in favor of J. Y. Rochester and others on the Cameron Cove question. He said that the G. T. P. filled up the cove without any authority and that the loss of the cove is a serious inconvenience to tenants.  
The judgment reads: (1) The Board finds Rochester and the other applicants took leases and paid rents which gave them riparian rights.  
(2) The company cut off the use of the cove.  
(3) The company had no title to the land across the cove, and the statement that it was constructing the line across its own lands is not true.  
(4) Even if the company had a title it had no right to fill up the cove without the consent of the minister governing it.  
(5) The applicants' lands and business were injured in consequence.  
(6) An opening thirty feet wide should have been left to let scows in. A swing bridge is not necessary, says Judge Mabee. An order will go into effect before May 1st, 1912, ordering the G. T. P. to make a thirty-foot opening for scows and the plan must be filed by January 15th and approved by the engineer of the Commission.

In more than one circle the name of Alderman Hilditch is mentioned in this connection, but he himself and all in authority about him maintain insurmountable silence on the subject.  
Following are the names of those who are believed to be ready to run as aldermen on the Newton ticket: A. W. Edge, Tom Maitland, W. E. Collison, H. F. McRae and L. Bullock-Webster.

### HAS WITHDRAWN FROM CONTEST

Mr. Frank Mobley Makes Definite Announcement Concerning the Contest---Gives His Reasons for Action

#### DIFFICULTIES OVER SECURING A COUNCIL

"My Past Experience of Municipal Affairs Has Taught Me That it Takes the Concerted Efforts of All to Make a Success," He Says—Unless Council Work Agreeably With Mayor the Result is Unsatisfactory

Frank Mobley has withdrawn from the mayoralty contest. The petitions and persuasions of a large number of citizens have not prevailed with him. While keenly appreciative of the confidence shown in him by so many supporters, Mr. Mobley prefers not to contest the mayoralty. His reason is first and foremost that there is not the assurance of sufficient union on the part of the citizens generally to support a council of aldermen to work with the Mayor, nor is there the promise of a sufficiently united council of aldermen to ensure the smooth

running of the city's affairs. "I wish to thank most sincerely and cordially all those who signed the large petition presented me and all who used their efforts to persuade me to run in this contest," said Mr. Mobley this morning. "I thoroughly and heartily appreciate their confidence thus shown in me. But past experience of municipal affairs and business in Prince Rupert has taught me that it takes the concerted effort of all to make success on any large scale in this place. Since this does not prevail in the present matter I deem

it necessary to withdraw from the contest. The responsibility for the good working of municipal affairs rests not only with the Mayor, but with his council, and unless there is a council whose members can work agreeably with the Mayor, while the citizens unite to support both, there will be only an unsatisfactory result for all parties."

### EMPRESS DOWAGER HAS FLED BEFORE THE REBEL TROOPS

DR. SUN YAT SEN HAS TAKEN MINISTER WU TING FANG INTO HIS CABINET—MARCH ON PEKIN BY REBELS HAS BEGUN.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
Shanghai, Jan. 3.—Fighting is still taking place in Hankow today and the rebels are greatly outnumbered. Sun Yat Sen has inaugurated provisional president today and has named his cabinet, which includes Wu Ting Fang. Reports from Peking state that the Empress Dowager and the Imperial court has fled to Jehol.  
Practically the whole of the Imperial army in Shan Su has deserted to the rebels and a march on Peking has already started. The general opinion is there will be no opposition until the walls of the capital are reached.

### THE GROCERS REPLY TO THE CHARGE OF HIGH PRICES

John A. Green, Secretary of the Retail Grocers Association, Says that the Cost of Keeping Store is Greater Today than Ever Before

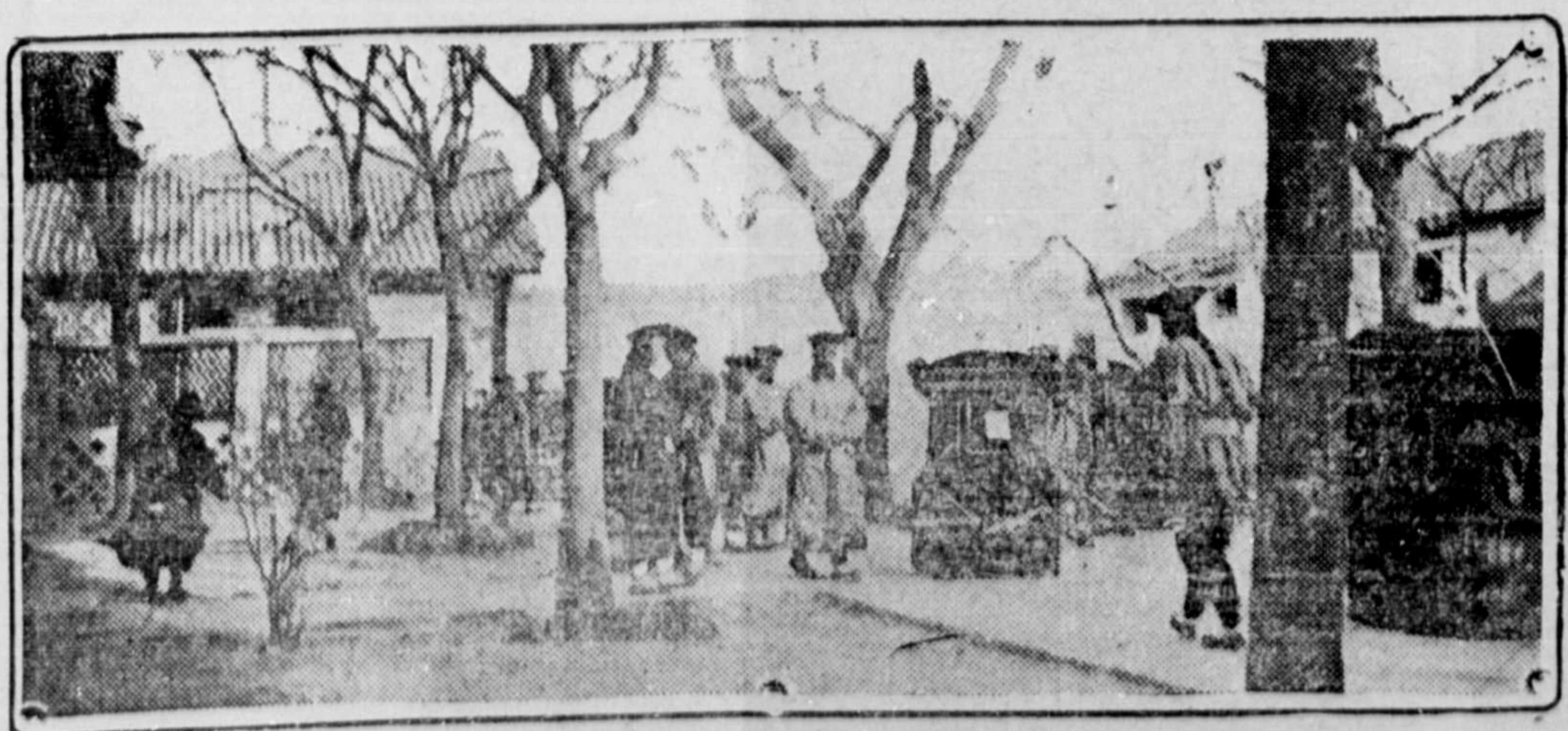
Editor's Note—Some people blame the grocer for a part, at least, of the high cost of food. The writer of the following article represents thousands of retail dealers and tells Daily News readers their side of the story.

is the medium in placing the manufacturers' goods to the wholesaler, so is the wholesaler the one who can most economically distribute to the retailer.  
Instead of the retailer dealing with each individual manufacturer or producer, he goes to one place and draws from that general stock what he needs to supply his trade.

The greatest topic agitating the minds of the consuming public today—the increased cost of living—brings up the question, "Where, if at all, can the expenses of the delivery of goods from the manufacturer and producer to the consumer be cheapened, or can any part of the distributing force, as now organized, be eliminated?"  
A few years ago each manufacturer was represented by a resident agent. As the elimination of expense or cost of delivery is a constant study to the manufacturer it was found that by employing a broker or agent who could represent many firms that this cost could be reduced to a minimum. Through these brokers the manufacturer reaches the wholesaler.  
As the broker is the man who

The cost of doing business in the most improved and economical way is from 15 to 20 per cent.  
The individual grocer conducting his own store often works as long as 16 hours a day.  
Service demanded by the public at the present time would not have been thought of a few years ago. The telephone plays a very important part and the special daily delivery of goods enters largely into the expense.  
The public, educated to more artistic surroundings, demands better store fixtures than formerly, better service wagons. Rents and wages have increased.  
The average retail grocer will not make 20 per cent gross on his total sales, and his profits on the necessities are materially less than the actual cost of handling. Competition has eliminated

# IRISH HOME RULE TO GO THROUGH NEXT PARLIAMENT

JOHN REDMOND, IRELAND'S NEW PARNELL, HAS PRACTICALLY ACHIEVED THE OBJECT HE HAS BEEN STRUGGLING FOR—LIBERALS ARE NOW WON OVER.

The financial question is the crux of the Home Rule struggle. One hundred and ten years after the abolition of the Irish Parliament its taxes had been doubled while its population had been reduced one-half. Ireland, a poor country, must bear an unjust share of the enormous levies made necessary by England's imperial policies and her fear of Germany. Ireland must pay the enormous cost of maintaining the police that patrols the island, not as ordinary police, but as an army of occupation. Ireland is tired of being milked to build British battleships. That's why Ireland wants Home Rule.—John Redmond.

London, Dec. 23.—Parliament closes with Home Rule the big issue of the hour. When Parliament assembles again the last battle for Home Rule will be on. For it is a foregone conclusion that Home Rule will win.

For now all liberal England has been won over to the side of the Irish. Indeed Ireland and the Irish have become actually popular with the English majority. Not since the days of Gladstone and Parnell has the cause of Ireland been accorded such sympathetic support among English people.

The measure has already been roughed out. A cabinet committee has been working upon the bill in general, while a committee of financial experts has been working on the specific question of the financial relation between Ireland and England—one of the knottiest problems to be solved. Just what form the bill will assume can't well be forecasted. Some of the papers are publishing what purport to be outlines of the bill, but none of these is regarded as more than a guess.

One of the first questions to be faced is that of Federal Home Rule vs. Irish Home Rule. There is a large class of home-rulers, especially Welsh and Scotch, who

favor home rule only in blanket form—they want Welsh and Scotch home rule, too.

Of course the plea is logical, but there is grave question as to whether Federal Home Rule can be put over now. Consequently many of the Irish leaders, while not objecting to Federal Home Rule in principle, urge that the fight be made for Irish Home Rule, now as in the past, since there is every indication that Irish Home Rule can be secured, while there is some question as to the success of Federal Home Rule. They tell the Federal Home Rulers that they can accomplish more by fighting for Irish Home Rule as an entering wedge than by fighting the battle along the whole line at once.

The Tories will base their fight against Home rule on the question of the financial relation of Ireland with the rest of the kingdom and on that of religion. The non-conformists of the north of Ireland will do all in their power to aid them.

But it may be taken for granted that the opposition will be vain. For the fact is that now the fight for Home Rule is practically over. There only remains to go through a sort of a sham battle before the shouting begins.

GROCER'S REPLY TO HIGH PRICES

(Continued from page 1) pretty much everything in the way of excess expenses. In former years the farmer took his eggs to the country store and received groceries, etc., in trade. The grocer sent his eggs to a commission man in the market. The commission man disposed of them and remitted part of the proceeds to the grocer. Today buyers go through the country and pay cash for all of the eggs offered. Competition is keen, and if a buyer doesn't pay a fair price based on the market he doesn't get the eggs. Years ago nearly everything was handled by grocers in bulk, weighed out and sold by the pound. Today most everything is put up and sold in packages,

cartons, cans, glasses. No matter what the disposition of the retailer may be, he must meet this growing demand for better goods. The average grocer does not speculate. He buys for his legitimate wants, and, generally speaking, dislikes to see goods advance in price. He is unable to obtain a better margin of profit and it takes more capital to conduct his business. Many food manufacturers are today considering the advisability of placing a selling price on their commodity at which it shall reach the consumer, giving to the wholesaler and retailer a fair percent. While pure food, honest weight, collection laws and other matters which vitally concern the consumer as well as the dealer, and which our association is trying to

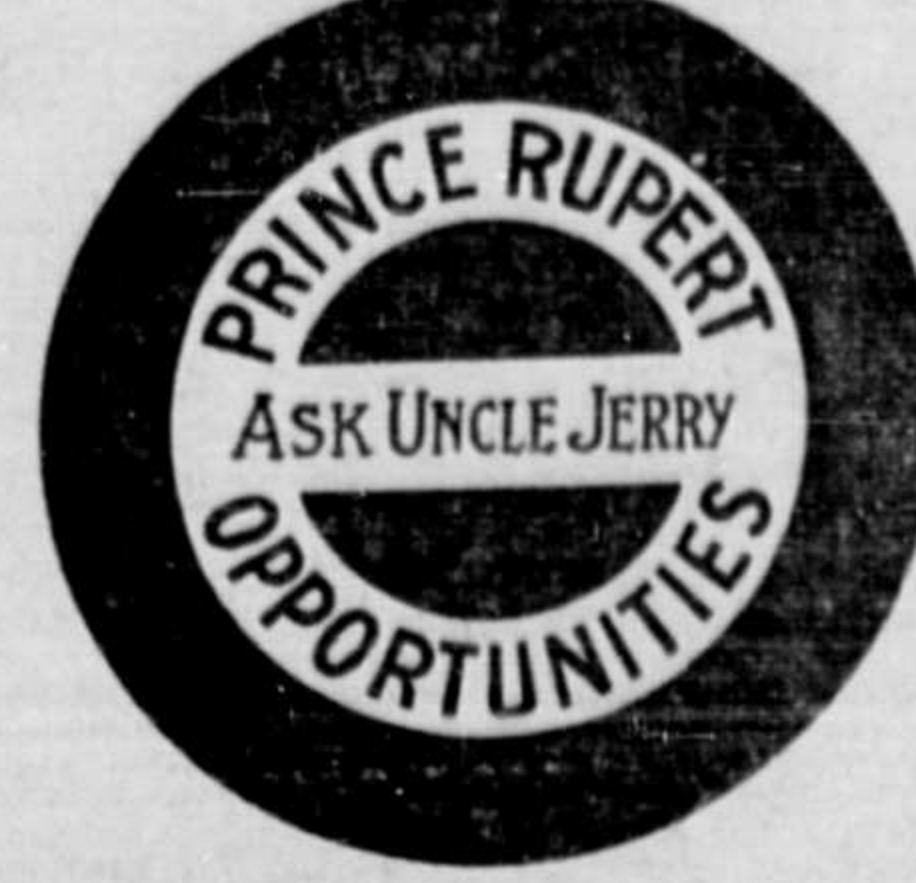
ARE GROPING AFTER PEACE

Peking Government and Revolutionists Agree to Temporary Armistice Until Final Form of Government is Decided.

(Special to Daily News.)

Shanghai, Jan. 2.—It was decided today between the Peking Government and the revolutionists that the future form of government for China will be left to the decision of a national convention, whose choice will be binding on both parties.

In the meantime the Manchus agree to withdraw certain troops, not to renew the fighting and not to accept or endeavor to secure any foreign loan of money.
