Nature Takes Hand In China War

Still Permitting British Ships Floods Threaten To Submerge Battlefields And Thus Impede Nipponese Military Operations

Three Vessels Struck By Insurgent Bombers In Spain Ports Today

Insurgent Army Has Launched General Offensive Against Valencia Along Fifty-Mile Front Between Teruel And Mediterranean

ALICANTE, Spain, June 7: (CP) — The British freighter Thorpehaven was hit by three bombs and badly damaged during another air raid today against the loyalist port of Alicante. Another British craft in the harbor is reported to have been set afire. It was not immediately ascertained if there had been any casualties.

Hendaye reports said that the insurgent army has launched a general offensive against Valencia along a fifty mile front between Teruel and the Mediterranean.

A small British ship was hit at Valencia.

IS UP TO PROVINCE

Chamber of Commerce Hears From Minister of National Defence Regarding Highway

Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, has communicated with the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce suggesting that representations in regard to the road to Hazelton and Terrace should be directed to the provincial rather than the federal government. However, Capt. Mackenzie gives assurance that he will continue in the future, as he has done in the past, to co-operate to the fullest extent possible in dealing between the provincial and federal governments in such matters.

Capt. Mackenzie writes: "It is fully realized by my department that the question of communication between the interior and the Pacific Coast might be of extreme importance in an emergency but it is not the policy of the Dominion government to interfere with provincial government policy in the matter of road construction.

"As you know, the Dominion has assisted the province financially from time to time in highway construction projects for the purpose of alleviating unemployment and, in such cases, it has been for the provincial government to decide what work should be undertaken subject, of course, to approval by the Dominion."

VICTORIA, June 7: (CP) — With continued warm weather, there is still a general high fire hazard in British Columbia with a number of extensive fires in various parts of the province.

NIPPONESE KNOW MORE

American Fisheries Expert Says Japs Are Better Acquainted With Alaska Fisheries Than Are Americans

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 7: (CP) — United States Congress heard today that Japan's government "undoubtedly" knows more than most Americans know about the red salmon which are the basis of a \$12,000,000 industry in the Bristol Bay area of Alaska.

The House appropriations committee made public this statement by Ward Bower, chief of the Bureau of Fisheries, Alaska Division.

Bower said: "The Bureau needs \$76,000 so we may round out wholly inadequate information now available and be able to negotiate with others on a proper basis regarding off-shore salmon fishing."

Bower added that observers had seen Japanese vessels taking salmon about 25 miles off-shore from Alaska last year.

CLEVELAND, June 7: (CP) — Alexander Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, said today that if the railroads of the United States insist upon the proposed fifteen per cent wage cut, "we'll strike and we'll do it the minute the railroads announce they'll put it into effect."

Czecho Slovakian Situation Is Not Involving Britain

LONDON, June 7: — Great Britain will not go to war in any crisis which can at present be foreseen resulting in the dismemberment of Czecho-Slovakia, it was stated in high circles yesterday in the course of comment on demands for autonomy being made by minority elements in that country.

Using Dry Dock For Airplanes

A communication received from the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce from Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, indicates that possibility of using the local dry dock for the construction of airplanes is being investigated. Mr. Hanson has been taking the matter up with the Department of National Defense.

Alleged To Have Had Big Quantity Of Yankee Booze

Arrested at Arrandale where he is alleged to have been in possession of a large quantity of American whiskey and rum, Jack (Frenchy) Lambert of Stewart has been brought to the city and is now being held at the city jail pending prosecution of his case by the customs and excise department. Lambert was taken in custody by Provincial Constable Currie. The liquor was aboard the boat Josephine.

SHANGHAI, June 7: (CP) — Yellow River floods threatened today to submerge Central China battlefields as the Japanese Army began the eleventh month of the war by forging deeper toward the heart of China including the provisional capital of Hankow. Chinese dispatches said that the floods would probably impede military operations.

Scare Thrown Into Commons Over Jobless

OTTAWA, June 7: (CP) — Warnings that bloodshed and death were likely to result from the Vancouver unemployment situation unless the federal government moved quickly marked an otherwise quiet session of the House of Commons on Monday. There was no evidence forthcoming, however, that the government would recede from its previous stand that transients should accept the offer of the provincial government to return them to their home provinces to take chances with other employment.

Rivers Rising But No More Damage In South Is Expected

PORTLAND, Oregon, June 7: — Columbia and Willamette Rivers were rising again yesterday but no further flood damage is anticipated.

Son Shoots His Nagging Father

STOCKTON, Cal., June 7: — An eighteen-year-old ranch boy walked into the police station here yesterday and told officers that he had shot and killed his father. They were working in a watermelon patch when the boy went to the house, got a shotgun and fired four times at his father. The youth said that his father was not satisfied with giving an order but "nagged and nagged."

Robert R. Reynolds Again To Be Senatorial Candidate in North Carolina

RALEIGH, North Carolina, June 7: — Senator Robert R. Reynolds, a strong New Deal supporter, won with a large majority over Congressman F. W. Hancock jr. in the Democratic senatorial primary.

War is always horrible and Canadians of all people are least inclined to enter into a conflagration which may engulf the world but, if they have to fight, they will spare no effort in making their influence felt. Evidently, there is fear at Ottawa that war will come and that Canada will find it her duty to take part. We all hope it may not be so.

MAKE NEW FRIENDS

People in business realize more and more how necessary it is to continually make new friends, attract new customers, continue to expand. If they let up on their missionary work they begin to lose some of the old ones and drop behind.

What is true of business is true of every profession, organization, church, or welfare group. There is no such thing as standing still in this world. It is a world of action and those who do not make progress will eventually drop out of the race.

A LEAGUE OF NATIONS

It is reported on pretty good authority that it was a league of three nations that prevented an attack on Czecho-Slovakia recently—France, Great Britain and Russia. But for the fact that these nations were united, the Germans would now be fighting for or have taken that country that is partly surrounded by German territory. The lesson to be learned from this is that, if a small league of nations can prevent war, how much more effective would be a larger league if the nations were really in earnest in sticking together and forgetting what the consequences might mean. It is the timid people such as those who urge intervention in Spain and then speak against intervention elsewhere that are likely to lead a country into war.

We do not think they will get it.

Having been delayed by heavy freights and extra calls, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, is not due until 3:30 this afternoon from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and will be sailing soon thereafter for Vancouver and waypoints. In addition to Wales Island and Port Simpson, the Catala called this morning at Big Bay to load box sheeks from the Georgetown Lumber & Box Co.'s mill.

Fred Coram, well known as a purser of Canadian National Steamships, was able to leave the Prince Rupert General Hospital yesterday after having been a patient there for two weeks and assume his duties for the summer as cruise director aboard the steamer Prince Robert.

Eight halibut vessels sold catches totalling 179,500 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Pacific, 40,000 pounds, Whiz, 7½c and 6½c; Akutan, 40,000, Sebastian, 7½c and 6½c; Argo, 18,000, Booth, 6½c and 6c; Unimak, 15,000, San Juan, 8½c and 6c; June, 15,500, New England, 6½c and 6c; Thelma II, 15,500, San Juan, 7½c and 6c; La Paloma, 20,000 Washington, 7½c and 6c; Aloha, 15,500, McCallum, 6½c and 6c. The Unimak, June, Thelma II and La Paloma had catches of cod for which 2c per pound was paid. The Unimak received 6c per pound for 1000 pounds of sablefish.

For the first time a large catch of halibut was sold yesterday at Anchorage, Alaska, when the American schooner McKinley disposed of 30,000 pounds there.

The Blue Fox Packing Co. has acquired a two-thirds interest in the well known American halibut boat Albatross and will operate the vessel as a tender out of its Alaska packing plant.

John Danielson, father of Edward Danielson, now on the fishing grounds with the halibut vessel Hoover, died in Seattle yesterday. The funeral is to be held the latter part of the week. Deceased is survived by three sons and five daughters.

No less than five passenger liners were in Ketchikan yesterday including the two Canadian ships Prince Robert and Princess Louise.

Motorship Beloit was in from Ketchikan this morning, having brought a carload of fresh halibut for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways.

The Massett fish boat Attabay arrived in port at noon yesterday. On board are Josiah Brown, skipper, Alfred Adams, and Alex Yeomans of Massett who is at patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital and will be leaving for home possibly tomorrow if weather improves. The Attabay brought in some halibut.

The Letter Box

ACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOLS

Editor, Daily News:

A number of parents, who have read in the press about Accredited High Schools have asked me what this means and whether our High School will be accredited. On the front page of last Thursday's Vancouver Province, which I received last night, is an article dealing with Accredited High Schools which I think is misleading. Therefore, may I give a brief explanation through the medium of your paper as to what accrediting means and the requirements as drawn up by the High School Accrediting Board.

In December 1930, the High School Teachers' Association unanimously passed a resolution endorsing the principle of High School Accrediting and set up a committee to study the whole question in all possible detail. Since that time this question has been investigated and studied thoroughly by High School Teachers and University Professors and accrediting came into effect this school year 1931-32, concurrently with the new program of studies for Senior High Schools.

In brief, an Accredited High School is one whose records are taken at their face value so that it may grant High School graduation certificates to its students which qualify them to enter University without passing an external examination set by the Matriculation Board of Examiners. Behind this is the idea that the high school teacher's intimate knowledge of a pupil, based upon the record of at least four years of high school studies, provides data which is more reliable than that provided by writing external examinations.

However, my purpose in writing this letter is to point out the inadequacy of the article in the Province. Quoting from the Province: "It is expected that eventually nearly all schools in the province will be placed in the same position depending on the academic standing of their teachers."

The academic standing of the high school staff is only one factor in gaining the privilege of accrediting. The local high school meets this requirement. Other requirements which the Province does not mention are as follows:

1. The high school shall have a gymnasium suitable for physical education and shall have adequate equipment for gymnastic work and games.

2. There shall be a library of reference and other books adequate to the needs of the school. These books shall be properly classified and the library shall be conducted upon approved library skills.

3. The school must, in general, make due provision for varying individual needs and abilities of its students, and shall provide courses not only in traditional academic subjects but also in Practical Arts and Technical and Vocational subjects.

As high schools meet these requirements, they will be given the privilege of accrediting which does away with Matriculation Examinations set by an external board of examiners.

Thank you for co-operating with me in this matter.
