KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 4: (CP)—Labor troubles have broken out anew in Jamaica. Yesterday two persons were killed and three wounded when police fired upon shop looters in a neighboring vililage.

Today the death list mounted to ten as rioting and looting continued in the interior, continuing the disorders which began months ago. Reports reaching here said that mobs were forming in many sections of the British colony for looting Chinese grocery stores.







As Benson's plane crashes, Jim (Clark Gable) turns to his mechanic, Gunner (Spencer Tracy), and tells him to rush Ann (Myrna Loy) away from the scene. Without realizing it, Jim fears the effect it will have on her, which, in turn, will affect his own fears.
