### The Letter Box

HERRING FOR FISH MEAL

Editor, Daily News: With reference to the letter published in the Daily News of June regarding herring reduction we feel that those responsible for the letter, the fishermen's committee of the Langara Island Trollers' Association, would not take such an antagonistic attitude towards the reduction of herring if they were aware of all the facts of the situation. We would like to take this opportunity to enlighten those interested on several points on which they have been particularly minin-

formed.

First the meal which is one product of the reduction of herring is not used as fertilizer. This point cannot be too strongly emphasized for it seems to be the conception held by most people. It was no doubt derived from the early reduction industry when methods and machinery used were so primitive that nothing but fertilizer could be made. In this day and age many ing. advancements have been made, so many, in fact, that the modern reduction plants of British Columbia are making what is termed that, in the treatment of the fish only the excess oil is removed and the residue dehydrated, thus keeping intact the goodness and protein value of the fish in much the same way as in the dehydration of fruit and the evaporation of milk, etc. The valuable proteins of the fish can then be utilized to great advantage for the feeding of poultry and stock. 
