CONFIDENCE IN CANADA OTTAWA—Demands from dealers and investment houses in the United States for the issue of new \$40,000,000 Dominion thirty-year three percent bonds in New York last week indicate the confidence of the financial world in the economic soundness of Canada, Hon. Chasles A. Dunning, minister of finance, said today.

134-YEAR SENTENCE NEW YORK—Robert Irwin, eccentric young sculptor, who pleaded guilty to the Easter 1937 triple-slaying of Veronica Gideon, attractive model, her mother and Frank Byrnes, a boarder, was sentenced today to 134 years in state prison.

FORDHAM-JOHNSON DIES VANCOUVER—Hon. J. W. Fordham Johnson, Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia from 1931 to 1936, died today on his seventy-second birthday. He had been in poor health for some time. Fordham - Johnson was president and managing director of the British Columbia Sugar Refining Co. for many years.

CHINESE INFLICT DAMAGE SHANGHAI—The Chinese are reported to have inflicted heavy damage through fires and explosions on Japanese arsenals and munitions plants in China.

GUILTY OF KIDNAPPING

OLYMPIA, Washington Nov. 28: (CP)—After ten hours deliberation, a jury yesterday found Dr. Kent Barry, aged 50, and three other men, William McAloon, James Reddick and Robert Smith, guilty of first degree kidnapping in connection with the abduction and torturing of Irving Baker in a gravel pit here last August. The jury recommended life imprisonment. The death penalty could be imposed for this offence. In jealousy, Dr. Barry was alleged to have plotted the kidnapping of the handsome automobile salesman after accusing Baker of raping his wife following a party last July.

STRIKE IS NOT OVER

Both Sides Moving in Connection With French Labor Uprising PARIS, Nov. 28: (CP)—The General Confederation of Labor is still planning to proceed with its general strike call on Wednesday in protest at the Daladier government's labor decrees. At the same time, the government is contemplating counter moves. Railway workers are offering to compromise in their demands as the government moves to mobilize half a million of them under military service in order to prevent a tie-up. Thirty-five thousand metal workers at Dunkerque have been called out in a new strike as government continues. Labor Minister Pomaret announced today that he had received assurances that department stores, banks and insurance companies would all remain open despite the general strike call.

John Queen Has 3,300 Majority

Labor Man Re-elected Mayor Of Winnipeg By Substantial Margin WINNIPEG, Nov. 28: (CP)—The final count from Winnipeg's mayoralty election gives John Queen a majority of 3300 for re-election for a two year term as mayor of Winnipeg. Already he has been mayor for three years. Queen ran as the candidate of the Independent Labor Party and received the support of the C. C. F. with which the Labor Party is affiliated.

Garden Society Is Distributing Japanese Trees

Distribution of some 200 Japanese flowering cherry trees which were recently presented to the city has been undertaken by the Prince Rupert Horticultural Society with its president, Charles P. Balagno, in charge. The idea is to give the trees out as far as possible to gardeners who will use them to good advantage in a general community decorative scheme. In some cases it is thought there may be co-operation in boulevard development.

Cathedral Has Choral Recital

Music Featured at Evening Service Yesterday With Good-Sized Congregation Present Evening service at St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral yesterday was featured by a special song service by the Senior Choir under the direction of Choirmaster A. J. Lancaster with Peter Lien as organist. In addition to acceptable choral numbers by the choir, popular hymns were sung with the large congregation taking part. General appreciation was expressed by all present. It is planned to have such a choral service once a month, a shortened form of prayer being used with the music substituted for the sermon. The service was conducted by the dean, Very Rev. Jmaes B. Gibson.

LONDON, Nov. 28: (CP)—The Duke of Windsor yesterday authorized denial that he might return to England for a Royal Family reunion at Christmas. Through his equerry the Duke said that he would spend the holidays with the Duchess and a small party at Cap d'Antibes.

DROWNING TRAGEDY

Four Men Lose Their Lives In Great Central Lake Following Week-end Party PORT ALBERNI, Nov. 28: (CP)—Four mill workers were drowned early Sunday morning when their small rowboat capsized in Great Central Lake while they were returning from a week-end party on a nearby houseboat. John Ferguson, aged 65; Edward Benson, 53; Andrew McPherson, 48, and Clarence Brenne, chilled by the cold water and unable to cling longer to the overturned craft, slipped to their death while Clifford Gowler and Pard Miles, the only swimmers in the party, made for shore for aid. On their return, however, the others were gone. The bodies were later recovered by the police.

Regulations Are Awaited

Orders in Connection With Turner Valley Productions To Be Issued Soon CALGARY, Nov. 28: (CP)—Turner Valley oil operators are waiting for the first orders of the new Fuel and Petroleum Board which was set up at the special session of the Alberta Legislature which prorogued last week. A production quota is expected to be set up as well as measures to prevent wastage at the wells.

Arab Revolt In Palestine Said To Be Weakening

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28: (CP)—Under the continued British military campaign, the Arab revolt in Palestine appears to be weakening, although the expectation is that it will be some time before order is completely restored, probably not before the forthcoming proposed Arab-Jewish conference in London if then.

Repentance Is Sermon Subject

Implied Revaluation of Life In Addition to Change of Heart—Not Alone Personal True repentance, about which one heard a good deal these days, consisted not only of a change of heart but of a revaluation of life in the light, not of what other people were doing, but in the light of God. Rev. H. G. Funston told his morning congregation in First Presbyterian Church yesterday. He warned against being caught up merely in a wave of individual emotion or demonstration as at a camp meeting and asserted that "doing something for God" implied something more than personal surrender but should involve sacrifice and leadership so that repentance might be a community movement and not merely a personal change.

NEW TRIPLE ALLIANCE—GERMANY, ITALY, JAPAN—IS READY FOR SIGNING

Premier Chamberlain and Foreign Secretary Halifax to Visit Italy Next—No Military Commitment to Protect France LONDON, November 28: (CP)—The News-Chronicle (Liberal) said today that a new triple alliance was now ready for signature between Germany, Italy and Japan. It continues that "these three powers have been carrying on negotiations for transformation of their anti-Communism pact into a close alliance of great military significance."

Prevalence Of Scarlet Fever Is Exaggerated

There are six cases of scarlet fever at present in the city, Dr. J. P. Cade, medical health officer, stated yesterday afternoon. Rumors of the widespread prevalence of the malady are "greatly exaggerated," Dr. Cade said. The type is very mild and, in some cases, has been difficult or impossible to definitely diagnose, consisting merely of sore throat and almost imperceptible rash. Every precaution is being taken to prevent spread and, ever since the first case developed, immunization facilities have been available. Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Great Britain, in the recent talks at Paris with Premier Edouard Daladier, had not committed herself to send an expeditionary force to France in the event of war.

MARITIMES HIT AGAIN

Week-End Storm Was Not as Bad As Friday—Norwegian Freighter May Not Float HALIFAX, Nov. 28: (CP)—The Maritime provinces were swept yesterday by the second severe snow and windstorm within forty-eight hours. However, damage was not as extensive as in the first storm on Friday. Yesterday's blow was a strong easterly wind of almost gale proportions. Two small fishing boats were blown ashore. There is some question as to whether a Norwegian freighter, which went ashore in Northumberland Straits on Friday, can be refloated. Five inches more snow was reported yesterday in New England states and New York and there were storm warnings last night on the Atlantic coast.

Pope Pius Is Able To Pray

Heart Injections Suspended Although Doctor Still Visits Pontiff Frequently VATICAN CITY, Nov. 28: (CP)—Pope Pius took part in special prayers at his private chapel at opening of the week spiritual devotions at the Vatican. Heart injections have been suspended although a doctor visits the Pope several times daily.

Baby Boy Drinks Gasoline—Dies

Tragedy Takes Little Son of Mr. and Mrs. Strom of Willow River Drinking gasoline from a bottle which had been placed on a window sill after the liquid had been used for cleaning proved fatal a few days ago to Frederick, fifteen-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Strom, of Willow River near Prince George. The child expired before medical aid could be summoned.

WRECK OF AIR LINER

One Dead, Three Missing and Two Injured as Result of British Flying Boat Crash in Iraq LONDON, Nov. 28: (CP)—Imperial Airways announces that the flying boat Calpurnia has been found wrecked on Lake Ramadi in Iraq with one of the crew dead, three missing and two hurt.

Sees Signs Of Better Business

G. W. Laidler of the Malkin Firm Says That Change in Ownership Will Not Affect Prince Rupert "Now that the European situation seems to be settling down I see signs of improvement after the beginning of the new year," said G. W. Laidler, sales manager for W. H. Malkin & Co. Ltd., who is in the city for a few days in connection with the change of control in the business of the firm. Asked how the change might affect the local branch, Mr. Laidler said there would be no change. The business would be carried on just as usual with the same personnel. The three Malkin brothers had simply decided to sell their interest in the business to the Western Grocers, an independent concern, not in any way connected with any other wholesale business in British Columbia. All branches of the Malkin business, including that at Prince Rupert, would carry on as usual.

AROUSING FEARS

In connection with a letter published Saturday defending public health campaigns, possibly we may be allowed to quote Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association, in regard to a proposal to expend large sums in a public health program aimed at preventing infantile paralysis. He says: "Until we learn more about it, any program which contemplates prevention of infantile paralysis by medical methods is a bogus campaign." In this connection doctors do not seem to know enough about cause and prevention of common colds to enable them to give specific effective directions to patients, either how to avoid or cure them.

We would not think of making light of the value to the community of a reasonable amount of preventive education and of the excellent work done by many medical men. Much of it is necessary but some seems unnecessary. What we object to is propaganda which makes people continually conscious of ills or prospective ills. This fear, it is contended by many, tends to cause the spread of illness rather than its prevention. Mental illness seems to be just as real as physical illness, else why is it that so many people who seem to be ill can be suddenly returned to health through the mental helpfulness, or shall we say the spiritual helpfulness of a strong-minded or psychically minded person- If it is true that many doctors use mental treatment as an aid to medicine, might it not be equally true that many are made ill by mental suggestion?

Friends Of Street And Not Of Heart

Weakness of Church In Too Many Of Its People Not Being Real Followers

The subject of the morning sermon in the First United Church yesterday was a character sketch of Ananias, the man whose name is known throughout the world as a synonym for falsehood. "Too many of our friends are friends of the street, of a social party and not of the heart," said the pastor, Rev. J. C. Jackson. "It is the heart that counts. The weakness of the church is partly the result of so many of its adherents not being made followers of it in their hearts. Ananias was more than an average citizen. But he failed to live up to the high standard of God. That standard demands everything in a man or a woman. Ananias kept something back and he died. If we would be true followers of God we shall keep nothing back."

In the evening Mr. Jackson spoke on "The Worship of an Extinct Fire." Too many people kept up the form of a religion but there was no force in it. How many could repeat the Lord's Prayer and be thinking of something else all the time? Too often people found "thrills" palling. Faith in God never failed. It never lost its thrill. Religion had not lost its power but too often too much thought was given to the form, to theologies—an impersonal discussion of modernism versus fundamentalism. Christianity was not a proxy religion. It was a living vital force. Christ lived it daily in all his contacts and, when He said "Follow Me," he meant people to live similarly. The special anthem by the

Junior Choir in the morning was W. H. Jude's setting of "There is a Happy Land." In the evening Dr. R. G. Large sang "How Lovely are Thy Dwellings" in fine style. The choir sang "The Lord God Will Wipe Away All Tears" and "Hear Then, in Love, O Lord the Cry."
