Of Four-Power Conference

MUNICH, September 29: (CP)—As the German delegation saw it today, the following would likely be the outcome of the four-power peace conference on the German-Czechoslovakian issue:

1. The German army to be allowed to enter the Sudeten areas of Asch and Eger October 1 and 2 and the remainder gradually.

2. In doubtful areas, where population is divided about equally, plebiscites to be held under policing by an international army.

3. Plebiscites also to be conducted in districts where population is preponderantly Polish or Hungarian.

4. Results of all plebiscites to be binding on the Czechoslovak government.

5. Germany to become co-guarantor with other powers concerned of the independence of what is then left of Czechoslovakia.

5. Hitler will not insist upon the resignation of President Benes.

7. Germany to reaffirm the guarantee given by Hitler in his Sportspalast address Monday night that no further demands will be made by him in Europe.

DIFFERENT REACTIONS

It is interesting to note the different reactions to the international news that comes from Europe. While some! people give every evidence of pleasure at the possibility of a settlement of the Sudeten question without actual fighting, there are a great many who feel that Hitler will never be satisfied until he is stopped by force and that the best time to stop him is right now. The assumption seems to be that war is inevitable sooner or later.

We feel that a war such as that which threatened is too! big a thing for people to enter upon if there is any possible way of escape. In the meantime something may happen to Hitler or something may happen in Germany which may cause a different outlook on the part of that . country. At any rate it is worth trying. In that we agree with Chamberlain.

AFTER HITLER WHAT?

Toronto Saturday night in one of its front page articles discusses the danger of destroying Hitler. The Nazi regime, built upon force and terrorism, would collapse immediately and then what would happen? While it is possible that the army high command might be able to carry on, it is also possible that it might not and that the country would break up into numerous factions which would! be a danger to the rest of Europe. By keeping the Nazis in power for a few years the country may evolve intoj something which may be less of a menace to Europe either in its existence or its collapse.

The dangers in all these experimental systems of government is in the lack of permanence of the system. History has shown that there is no permanence in an autocracy not matter how benevolent. That is why the German, the Italian and the Russian systems will all be a dan-! ger for years to come. So far as can be seen the Italian government is the only one that has made provision for future eventualities.
